The Capital City Recognized as an Important Horse Center.

OUR CITY IN THE BASEBALL LEAGUE.

Nearly All the City Subscribed for a \$10,000 Fund.

THE NEW CIRCUIT.
The board of directors of the North Pacific Trotting Horse Breeders' association held three sessions a few days ago in Portland. They decided to organize a trotting circuit, if possible, and the following is the proposed schedule:

Week beginning August 15, Olympia.

Week beginning August 22, Tacoma.

Week beginning August 29, Kent.

Week beginning September 5, Portland.

Week beginning September 12, Salem.

Week beginning September 19, Independence.

Week beginning September 26, Eugene.

Week beginning October 3, Roseburg.

Week beginning October 10, Vancouver.

Week beginning October 17, Walla Walla.

Week beginning October 25, Moscow.

According to this it will be seen that Salem is one of the best horse centers in the state, and it indicates that our horsemen are attending to their business.

Salem has one of the best tracks and race grounds with all accommodations that can be found on the coast. With a racing population in Marion and adjoining counties nearly if not quite half as large as Portland, the week here will be a successful one.

LEAGUE BASEBALL.

The Salem committee on raising a \$10,000 stock subscription for the baseball league organization met with great success. Over half was taken up the first day and their work will be rapidly completed.

In the opinion of good investors the stock will be a very profitable one. The matter will be pushed to success and there will be more interest in baseball than ever before at the capital city, with good management.

TO BE RE-ORGANIZED.

The Salem Fire Department is to be re-organized—A Paid Service at Less Cost.

Salem is liable to have a fire department one of these days.

There is an ordinance now on third reading to take all control over the fire engine teams out of the hands of the street commissioner and place it in the hands of the chief engineer. At present there seems to be a difficulty in fixing responsibility over the control of the engines.

THE GREAT CHANGE.

however is to be affected by plans which the committee on the two deadly hostile elements of fire and water, are considering. If carried out as proposed, one engine house, one engineer, one driver, one horse, and in all about \$171 a month is to be saved. In addition the city will have its electric fire department under one roof, will have two paid hose men, one paid hose cart driver and two engines ready to go at any time, both heated with one heater.

THERE IS ROOM FOR REFORM.

and to spare, for improvement and no end, and for economy to a considerable amount. It is almost impossible for men to draw hose carts to a fire through muddy streets, and get there at the time the engine does. This will be overcome by having a horse hose cart, to go with the first engine. The Salem fire de-

partment cost about \$5000 last year, which it is believed can be reduced some and yet improve the service by some judicious changes in the system. The committee will be upheld in reform of this character to a considerable extent.

POULTRY AND PET STOCK.

Steps Taken to Form a State Ass'n—A Show to be Held at Salem in March.

Twenty chicken fanciers, including one lad, met at the Willamette reading room Wednesday evening to take steps to organize a Poultry Breeder's association. Wm. H. Savage was chosen president pro tem, and Scott Bozarth secretary pro tem.

A committee of three on constitution and bylaws. A. A. Jessup, E. Hofer, Frank Welch, were appointed.

Upon motion the society decided to meet at same place in a week for permanent organization. A show was talked up and it was decided that a show could be held in March as a starter. The 25th was chosen for a three day special show. A committee to report at next meeting, of Messrs. Cottle, Bozarth and Jessup, was appointed.

Mr. Bozarth favored incorporating and organizing a state association. Mr. Ryan spoke of the Nebraska association.

Mr. Van Bockeln spoke of the recent Seattle show, and favored holding a bench show in connection.

Frank Welch also advocated a state organization as the proper thing.

Upon motion it was unanimously decided to make it a state organization and the committee were instructed to draw up articles of incorporation.

A Baking Powder Conspiracy.

A disreputable method of advertising a baking powder came to light in an Ohio court a few days ago. It seems a band of women go from house to house, wherever they can gain entrance, as they say to test baking powders. They carry along samples of other well known and popular brands of baking powders, and these it was shown had been drugged for the purpose of the pretended test for purity.

It was shown that the so-called "testers" were in the employ of a certain baking powder company, and that the parties in practicing such deceptions upon other brands or upon consumers, in order to sell their own goods, were amenable to the law against conspiracies.

Two of the women were locked up to await action of the grand jury.

AWAY TO ST. LOUIS.—Prof. Rork left today for the St. Louis conference, February 22. The conference is made up of delegates from all reform forces. Its business is to determine if there shall be another great national party composed of all those who believe in a government of the people, for the people to the end that labor shall have its dues.

Prof. Rork goes as Oregon's representative of the National Alliance, so he will not only speak for the Oregon Alliance but also for the National Alliance. He says he can be depended upon to vote for the abolition of banks of issue by which the banker loans his debt at 10 per cent. interest while the farmer pays 10 per cent. on his debts, for the government ownership of railroads, for graduated taxation, for government loan of money on any good security at a rate so low as to relieve those mortgaged and to force capital out of loaning on crushing interest into business, giving employment to the unemployed, for the sub-treasury to break gold cornering and to furnish a variable volume of money equal to the varying volume of business, and for pure government whisky at cost without drinking places.

The Order to be Established This Thursday Evening with Great Eclat.

THE STATE COLLEGE Y. M. C. A.

Another Big Convention at Salem—The Program.

THE NEW RED MEN LODGE at Salem, known among the initiated as Great Incoherence, will hereafter have a permanent wigwam at Salem. A strong tribe of forty-two charter members has been organized out of the best young men of the city. It is purely a fraternal and benevolent order, existing since years ago over our country.

THE ORGANIZERS ARRIVED in the forenoon and at once went to the Willamette for lunch. They were met at the morning train from Portland by Hon. T. C. Baker and Geo. E. Goode with a carriage. The delegation consisted of E. J. Ladd, the Portland restaurateur and poultry breeder, with three attendant warriors.

THE PROGRAM.
They came up to assist the brethren here in arranging the hall, etc., for the work of instituting the Salem tribe tonight. On the first evening train the remainder of the team will arrive. The Salem band, as previously announced will call the charter members together this evening at 7 o'clock, who will all proceed to the train and escort the visitors to the hall. Instead of taking all night to confer the degrees, which has been the understanding, not later than 12 o'clock will be necessary. All members are expected to assemble at the State Insurance corner when the band begins to play.

THE REGALIA of this order is very elaborate, if one may judge from the amount of paraphernalia which the Portland Sachems bring along. One part of the initiation consists of administering a dose of chicken bark by the chief medicine man, after which a lunch will be served at Strong's and the pipe of peace smoked.
