MAUDE GRANGER.—Among Maude Granger's earliest experiences on the stage, was her appearance as one of the six Julietts in the famous benefit performance, given the English actor, George Rignold, at Booth's Theatre, New York. Seven Julietts had been announced, but Adelaide Neilson had become suddenly indisposed and could not appear. The part was opened by Fanny Davenport, who disposed of the balcony scene, and who made way for Ada Dias, who interpreted the "nurse and nuptial" scene. Then came Minnie Cummings in the "banishment" scene, and next Marie Walring appeared in the "parting" scene, and Grace D'Urley in the "tomb" scene. "The draught" scene was played by Miss Granger, said the N. Y. Tribune, "who proved a genuine surprise and revealed the remarkable dramatic ability of the lady. She was deservedly recalled twice, and unquestionably carried off the honors of this singular performance." At opera house Saturday night.

NEW CARRIERS.—Salem will hereafter have five mail carriers, thanks to the efforts of Postmaster Gilbert. The city proper could employ ten, as THE JOURNAL requires five carriers to distribute its evening edition. For the information of persons wishing to apply for positions as carriers we print following section of the postal laws: "Application for appointment should be written and signed by the applicant himself, giving his name in full, his age, previous residence for the last five years and occupation during that time. The physical fitness of the applicant must be certified by a reputable physician."

FRIENDS POLYTECHNIC INSTITUTE.—All the preliminary steps have been taken to establish this institution of learning at the capital city. Articles have been filed by Dr. H. J. Minthorn, W. J. Hadley, J. W. Winslow and B. F. Hushaw, incorporating the "Friends Polytechnic Institute of Oregon." It is expected to have enough stock taken by Monday to elect trustees. This enterprise should meet with liberal encouragement.

Richardson, L. Donald Mackay have organized the Trinidad Asphalt Paving company, of Portland, stock \$100,000.

HELD FOR GRAND LARCENY

A Man and Woman from Seattle Arrested by Salem Police.

CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Report of the Grand Jury—Other Matters of the Day of Criminal Nature.

The following telegrams from a sheriff at Seattle were received by the police department at Salem: QUINN, ALIAS WELCH-JOYCE. "Arrest Henry Quinn, known as Pat Welch; five foot eight, weight 125, light complexion, opium fiend, dresses well. Left here Wednesday night. Charge, grand larceny. I hold warrant. Smooth faced, very light complexion, looked like a fiend, dressed well, stiff hat, dark suit, round shouldered; large, rather stout woman with bleached hair and one front tooth gold, with him."

Chief of Police Minto located his man who had rooms on Commercial street, and passed as Joyce here. He was arrested, and spent Thursday night in the city jail.

THE POLICE. say the bird is a professional gambler, and what he is wanted for is a gambling proposition, and not grand larceny. The sheriff is expected here to get him on the evening train Joyce, and a woman who is a niece of one of the Swartz brothers, but who has been away from here was a young girl, had a room over the Red Corner drug store. She does not deny that he is a professional and anticipated his departure by leaving on the afternoon train.

CIRCUIT COURT. 106.—State vs. John Boewick, larceny from person, Plea of not guilty. Wm. Kaiser to defend.

99.—State vs. Theo. Heiringer, larceny by embezzlement. On trial to jury. Wm. Kaiser for defense.

GRAND JURY REPORT. The grand jury has concluded its work and filed its report. It sets forth that this body of public officials inquired into all the cases before it and visited all the public institutions as required by law, and says: "So far as we could determine they are fairly well conducted."

"We recommend that the court house be repaired, especially the east end where the cement on the outer wall has fallen off, exposing the same to damage by weather."

They found the county and city jails "as neatly and orderly kept as we could expect of such institutions."

THE POST OFFICE. This jury say they find "in a somewhat dilapidated condition without adequate appliances for the suppression of fire and a very inefficient system of sewerage."

"The management of the premises seems to be as well as we could expect from the contract system. We would recommend the sale of the present farm and the selection of a more healthy and suitable location."

They find the school for the mutes "fairly well conducted."

"It seems to be well managed, but the buildings are in need of some repair." They recommend additional provisions for fire, there being no protection at present but a Babbcock extinguisher. (The grand jury seems to have forgotten that we have city hydrants and a fire department.)

OTHER PLACES. come in for compliments. They find the penitentiary, asylum and reform school "neatly and orderly kept, and the inmates apparently well cared for." On the asylum farm they find the "improvements as they stand do not justify the expenditure. The log building is of no utility without a considerable outlay to remodel it. The cottage is without necessary provisions for winter cloths. Otherwise it is a good building."

ORPHAN'S HOME. They find this institution com-

ducted in a neat and systematic manner, compliment the matron, and recommend some improvements in the heating arrangements.

NEW ASYLUM WING.

The most important part of the grand jury report is the closing statement about the state asylum, for the insane. They say: "We find it badly crowded. Wards having been originally designed to accommodate thirty-five patients; now have in male wards an average of 42, and female wards 38 and 5-6ths. We therefore recommend the further construction of stone or brick buildings, to accommodate the increasing population of that institution, and that no wooden buildings be constructed. Also that those wooden structures already on the premises be dismantled with at the earliest convenient date." Signed: J. M. Payne, foreman; J. W. Hobart, clerk; other members: Alex. Esson, H. T. Mauding, A. J. Miller, Wm. Clark, S. R. T. Jones. The report is well drawn.

WAS HE HYPNOTIZED?

A World's Fair Convention Call That Was Mysteriously Issued.

The following item is taken from the Athens Press and has appeared in a number of Oregon papers:

WORLD'S FAIR CONVENTION.

His excellency, Governor Penoyer, on the 9th inst., issued a proclamation to all those interested in an Oregon exhibit at the World's fair, to meet at the state house on the 22nd of February for the purpose of appointing a commission to consider the expediency of raising, by subscription, an amount sufficient to defray expenses for a proper exhibit.

As a number of exchanges enlarged upon the enterprise of our chief executive in a glowing manner, a JOURNAL reporter was sent to ascertain the facts about a convention that was first heard of in the above way.

THERE IS NO RECORD

in the governor's office of any such proclamation having been issued. Secretary Munly searched in vain for any minute on the governor's desk and the state printer's office was alike devoid of any trace of such a to be desired, manifesto. The governor was absent from the city and the only remaining theory to explain the mysterious proclamation was that the governor may have been hypnotized by Mr. Osborn of the Portland chamber of commerce. His return to the city and the arrival of delegates to the convention are painfully awaited.

Salem will receive the delegates hospitably, and the governor too, for that matter, if he has any such ideas in his head. He may have planned it all as a huge surprise for the state of Oregon, which has principally been a state of apathy on the world's fair question. A full report of developments in the matter will be found in THE JOURNAL.

STRUCK OIL. Salem at Last Has a Government Building in Sight of the Lower House.

The senate of the United States has repeatedly given Salem a post-office building. But the bill has never reached the house for action. It has never been put to a vote of that body.

A private dispatch from Congressman Hermann indicates that at last there may be some action. It is as follows:

The public buildings committee decided this morning on \$60,000 for government building at Salem. The report was submitted. The whole committee agreed.

Congressman Wilson has just secured a \$175,000 building for Spokane, and it would seem that as the second city of Oregon, Salem should stand some chance of recognition.

Our Republicans and Democrats should now go to work to influence members of congress to give Salem a post-office building.

While the committees and our delegation in congress are unanimous for a Salem public building, it is not certain that the present congress will pass it unless they are labored with to show them the justice of our claim.
