HILL HAS NEW YORK.

Dolph was Smart—The Creede Mines—Hunting for A. J. Hill.

NEW YORK DEMOCRATS.

Tammany is in Full Control—Continuation of Yesterday.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 23.—The following resolution was adopted yesterday in regard to the committee on delegates and electors:

"That delegates from the several congressional districts select one delegate from each congressional district to constitute committee on delegates and electors, and the committee so constituted is hereby directed to report to this convention for its approval of the names of four delegates and four alternates, who shall be delegates and alternates from the state at large to the Democratic national convention to be held at Chicago June 21, 1892; also two delegates and two alternates to the said convention from each congressional district to be nominated to said committee by delegates from the several congressional districts; also the names of two presidential electors from the state at large, and one elector from each congressional district, said district elector to be nominated to said committee by the delegates from the several congressional districts, and in any case where the delegates from a congressional district are unable to agree upon a choice for district delegates or presidential electors they shall report that fact to the committee on delegates and electors, which shall determine a selection, subject to the approval of the convention."

The delegates from the twenty-first congressional district are reported to be evenly divided and unable to agree upon members of the committee or national delegates. Under the resolution already adopted the question was referred to the committee on delegates and electors for determination.

General Sickles was made permanent chairman, and spoke at some length.

The report of the committee on resolutions was then read, as follows: The Democratic party of New York renews the pledge of fidelity to tariff reform and the Democratic faith to tradition as affirmed in national platforms from 1876 to 1888, as well as in the state platforms concurrent with the opening of Governor Tilden's and the close of Governor Hill's long, thrice approved, and alike illustrious service in the chief magistracy of the state.

The platform of 1874 is epitomized, and the Democratic platform continued: We now, as then, steadfastly adhere to the principles of sound finance. We are against the coinage of any silver dollar which is not of the intrinsic value of every other dollar of the United States.

We therefore denounce the Sherman silver law under which our silver output is dammed up at home as a false pretense, but an actual hindrance of the return to free bimetallic coinage, as tending only to produce a change from one kind of monometallic to another. We therefore unite with the friends of honest money every where in stigmatizing the Sherman silver law as no solution of the gold and silver question, and as a fit appendage to the subsidy and bounty swindle.

The McKinley bill is worse than the war tariff, the Blaine reciprocity humbug, squandering the surplus, the advancing deficit, defective census, and falsified representation, and the revolutionary proceedings of the billion dollar congress, are all justly condemned by the people's great uprising.

The platform refers with grateful pride to the inflexibility and the sound finance of Governor Hill. The Democrats of New York, says the platform, point to the nomination of Hill to the office of president as a fit expression of Democratic faith and tradition and of our settled purpose to rescue this perverted government from the clutch of autocrats and plutocrats, from a spendthrift administration, excessive tax, a debased money, and the delegates selected by this convention are instructed to present to the national Democratic convention the name of David B. Hill, a Democrat who has led his party from victory to victory for several successive years, and who has never known defeat, as a candidate for president of the United States. The delegates are further instructed to vote as a unit.

When the passage instructing for Hill was read the air was shaken by a tremendous outburst of applause, and after the resolutions were unanimously adopted, a committee was appointed to wait upon Hill and request him to address the convention. He soon arrived, and General Sickles presented him to the audience in these words: "I present to you, gentlemen of the convention, the Young Hickory of Democracy, the next presidential candidate, David B. Hill." When the noise subsided sufficiently, Senator Hill spoke at considerable length.

Referring to the silver question, he said the Sherman silver law transforms the federal coinage power of silver and gold into an instrument for the gradual expulsion of our gold for the establishment of an exclusive basis and permanent reduction of every American dollar by 30 per cent, or more below the level of its true value during the whole period of our free bimetallic coinage.

from 1792 to 1883. Turning his attention to the tariff, the senator said the cause of tariff reform had lately made great practical advance. Secretary Manning, in his report of 1880, advised congress to begin practical tariff reform by a single act for free wool. One year later the secretary's report was "write large" in the message of President Cleveland. Now, five years later, one of the most eminent economists, David A. Welch, writes to the chairman of the ways and means committee of the path to progress which Secretary Manning blazed first and alone, its true path, the maxim of sound policy better fitted to win elections than loss them, better dividing into chapters lessons of a long campaign of education, abolish whenever you can one indefensible tax at a time, this is true progress.

The speech was loudly cheered, and at 5:30 p. m. the convention adjourned sine die.

HUNTING FOR HILL.

Fuller Account of What is Being Effected.

ALBANY, Or., Feb. 22.—A. J. Hill, brother of the unfortunate youth, J. F. Hill, who was lost in the mountains and perished in the snow, attempting to go from Galesville to the Santiam mines in December last, returned today from the search for his remains. All they found were the snow shoes of the missing young man. They were leaned up against a tree, and on the other side was written: "Dec. 22, 1891, 3:30 p. m. I have missed the trail, and it is storming so I fear I can't find it. I can't use my snow shoes any further. I don't think I am far from the trail. If I can't find it I will try and follow this out. If I fall, hunt for me down the stream. May God help me through to my friends. (Signed) J. F. Hill." It is thought he perished near by, but the snow is yet five feet deep, and the remains could not be found. His father, B. J. Hill, has arrived from Illinois, and will renew the search as soon as the snow disappears somewhat.

THE CREEDE MINES.

Rich Silver Mines Discovered by a Prospector.

CREEDE, Cal., Feb. 23.—Prospector Brandt, while working over Batchelor mountain, which raised him in a moment from comparative poverty to opulence. He had ascended an almost perpendicular wall and was nearly at the top when he noticed a crevice-like opening closed by a boulder. He pushed away the stone and found an opening large enough to admit his body. He entered and pushed forward, and after a few steps, was within a cavern, the roof of which was vaulted and hanging with stalactites, which showed croppings of silver ore running \$10,000 to the ton. This chamber is fifty feet wide and 200 feet long, and contains enough ore on the surface to make Brandt a millionaire. Besides silver, the cavern contains utensils and skeletons, and are evidently those of old dwellers, but antiquarian discovery is lost in the interest of the phenomenal silver find. Brandt reported the find here, and the town went wild. Hundreds left for the Cliff-Dweller's claim, as it is called. Brandt and his backer, Colonel Morton, were offered \$100,000 cash for the claim by a syndicate of California capitalists, but they refused.
