FRIENDS' COLLEGE.—A college for the sciences a manual training, defined as a polytechnic institute in the articles of incorporation, is the plan upon which the church of Friends is engaged at Salem. At a meeting this week a board of directors was chosen composed of F. M. George, J. A. Cook, C. C. Johnson, B. S. Cook, W. J. Hadley and Dr. H. J. Minthorn. This meeting elected Prof. Morrison, now at the head of a large school of this character in Indiana, as president of this school. The committee on plan of building and location of same will report to the directors, and the school is to be turned over to the Friends' yearly meeting, or conference, when it is organized for Oregon. The stock of \$2500 is already subscribed. The work of raising \$5000 at Salem for this college will begin next week. A subscription of \$2500 is to be raised at other points in the valley. Work on the building is to begin in June. If this enterprise succeeds it will add not a little to the reputation of Salem as a school city.

STREET GRADING.—The city surveyor has run the grades on Cheneketa street, and work will be pushed to get the street graded. The JOURNAL thinks the city should have the work done by laborers at fair wages, instead of letting it to contractors. It is all plain dirt and gravel work, and there is no reason why it cannot be done under supervision of the city officers, and let all money expended go to the laboring men of the city.

COMMITTEE MEETING.—This week Saturday the Republican county central committee meets to make the apportionment of delegates and select place and time for holding an annual county convention. As there will be a county ticket to nominate and about five sets of delegates to select, the work of the committee and convention, will be very important.

BIG BALL FOR SALEM.

The Capital City in the Pacific Northwest League—Officers Elected.
The organization of the Salem League Baseball Association was perfected at the meeting Tuesday night, incorporated and officers chosen as follows:
Directors—J. C. Smith, E. C. Cross, Geo. Meyers, President, J. C. Smith; secretary, Chas. Kelly; treasurer, Williams & England Banking Co.; manager, E. B. Lytle. The latter is a good player and starts East Thursday to secure players.

Stock is still being taken and cash subscriptions are being received. It has been decided to pay no salaries to anyone but the team and support them well on a cash basis. The directors are pursuing a careful and commendable course. The grounds are to be put in order at once, the players are to be here about April 1, and games will begin April 15. These games will bring thousands of people to Salem every month this year. The directors have gone to Portland to meet the league officers from other cities. Salem will have first class games for 1892.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION have been filed by Frank Hodgkin, E. C. Cross, and Chas. A. Gray as incorporators of the Salem Baseball club, stock \$10,000, shares \$50 each par value, for general purpose of managing a baseball league association at Salem.

CIRCUIT COURT.—In case of John Savage, Jr., vs. City, suit for destroying his water tanks for street sprinkling, jury awarded Mr. Savage \$100 damages and costs. BUILDING TRADES.

Salem Busy With Many New Enterprises—Capitol Dome—The Viaduct.

Work has begun on the new bridge on North High street by Contractor Royal and a large force.

The old residents of South Salem are excited over the way the Electric road is being rushed through there. Nearly a hundred men and teams are at work.

The bids on the new dome and rebuilding representatives hall at the state house will be opened Feb. 29. Supt. Wilson has a force grubbing on the state fair grounds and preparing to erect a large machinery hall of a permanent character. It should be built of brick and corrugated iron.

The Salem Iron works has the contract for the iron columns of the new Hughes block.

The German Baptist church is nearly completed. First Baptists are moving to get a larger house of worship. The summer will see the completion of the Friends' polytechnic institute. E. F. Parkhurst's residence, at about \$4000, E. S. Lampport's at \$4700, Dr. Golden's at about \$3500, and a number of others show the way improvements are going forward.
