UNFOTUNATE ACCIDENT.

A Young Man Meets His Doom While Working on the Logs in the River.

Bert Williams was drowned in the Capital Lumbering Co.'s sawmill last Wednesday at 5 p. m. He had been working on the logs, when it is thought he stopped, fell between the logs into the water and coming up under them, he could not get to the surface and sank to the bottom. Even a good swimmer would not have been able to get out under the circumstances.

AT THE SCENE.

A JOURNAL reporter has carefully investigated the scene of the drowning and the facts about young Williams' death. He began work at the mill Friday; was employed on the sawing floor to tend chain on the apron and put a chain around logs when they came up the slide to facilitate handling on the carriage. He sometimes went down on the platform below to do this, but had no occasion to go out on the water, except in his desire and willingness to make himself more useful; no one saw him go under but some boys who gave the alarm. The first man on the scene was Foreman H. C. Tarpel; the spot indicated by the boys as the place where he went down was 30 feet out; if search had begun where his body was found his life might have been saved, as he was not ten feet from the bottom of the slide; the body was got out at 5:30 in sixteen feet of water. He must have swam some distance under water.

His step-father, S. L. Miller, was at the mill almost as soon as the body was recovered, but life was extinct.

The deceased young man was about 18 years old and was formerly a driver for Damon Bros., and at one time in the employ of the Street Car Co. He was a hard worker and well liked by all, and it was his zeal to be useful and do all possible for his employer that led him to go out on the slippery and dangerous logs where he met his death. For him the troubles of life are over.

of Bert Williams will be held at the family home, 420 Winter street at 10 a. m., Friday, Rev. Corwin officiating. The remains will be taken to Rural cemetery.

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RISTS WITH THE PROPERTY OWNERS.

Whether the Commercial street viaduct shall be built or not, whether that old eyesore, the moss-covered and ready to tumble down bridge on South Commercial street, shall remain for an indefinite length of time or be replaced by a full-street-wide stone-arch viaduct remains now with the owners of property for several blocks on each side. If the owners of property immediately benefitted by this improvement make a liberal proposition to assist in defraying the expense, it will be built. They should act at once and make a showing to the city council next Tuesday evening.

The city officials have taken all the steps necessary and are prepared to push the work right through in sixty or ninety days if they are given the authority and the financial arrangements are made. The council is unanimously in favor of the improvement being made. The Electric Railway company is willing and anxious to save the expense of building a separate long trestle. The county road and bridge fund can be drawn upon with the consent of the county court and there are not believed to be any legal difficulties in the way. The track is clear now if the property owners can get together and give it the proper support. They should hold a meeting and decide whether they want this improvement now at this end of the street. It is the only improvement of any magnitude that the city will probably engage in besides street paving, and that is to be done at the expense of abutting property. The property owners on South Commercial street should not let this important public work fall through, as there will never again be so favorable a combination of circumstances to secure it as right at the present time.

KILLS HIS OPPONENTS.

How the President of Guatemala Remains in Office.

SAN SALVADOR, Guatemala, Feb. 25.—The shooting of General Miguel Enriquez at Zacapa, Guatemala, the other day, has created a great deal of bitter comment here, and started stories discreditable to President Barillas. The account sent out by the Guatemala authorities was to the effect that Enriquez was one of the most prominent conservative candidates for the presidency, organized a revolt against the government, was defeated and shot as a traitor. Widely different is the report that has reached this city from the opponents in Guatemala of the present administration. It is alleged by them that President Barillas bore a personal spite toward Enriquez, and in revenge issued secret orders that he be shot at his headquarters under the pretext that he was at the head of a revolutionary faction. The two brothers of General Enriquez were informed of what had been done, and realizing that no time was to be lost, fled and joined him. They armed all the servants on the hacienda with shotguns and revolvers and resolved to sell their lives dearly. The government troops soon arrived upon the scene, and to their surprise met with a most desperate resistance. A regular battle followed. General Enriquez, his two brothers and two servants were killed and three more of their little party wounded before the building in which they were entrenched was carried by the troops. How gallantly the Enriquez people fought is shown by the loss of the government forces of two officers and the killing or wounding of eleven soldiers. It is also rumored here that it would not be unexpected if Barillas should dispose of all the presidential candidates in the same way including General Reina Barrios. Salvador is perfectly quiet.

Judge Gilbert.

PORTLAND, Feb. 25.—Mr. Gilbert was asked yesterday morning when he would have to commence work, providing his nomination was confirmed.

"I do not know the exact time. It depends on how long the nomination is held by the senate. Judge Deady has some work here, and I may take it up and hold court for the first time in Portland. After that the circuit court of appeals convenes in San Francisco in April, and I would probably go down there."

"The jurisdiction includes the six states—Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada and California—in which district there are two judges. Mr. McKenna is one and I may be the other. We will divide the business between us, except when sitting as a court of appeals together."

Reciprocity With Canada.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—In the senate yesterday Mr. Sherman of the foreign relations committee, reported back favorably the resolution calling upon the president, if not inconsistent with public interests, to communicate to the senate the fact in regard to the negotiations between the British government and the United States in regard to a reciprocal treaty between Canada and the United States. The resolution was adopted.
