STREET SPRINKLING.—What the outcome of the law suit between the city and Mr. Savage, over street sprinkling may be, no one can tell, as the city will carry the case to the supreme court. At all events, arrangements should be made to have all the streets sprinkled thoroughly and well. A number of property owners have been seen, and they say if Mr. Savage makes arrangements to do so, and the streets requiring sprinkling are thoroughly attended to in this matter, all will be well. But on the other hand, it is their opinion, if owing to this litigation or disagreement with property owners, in front of whose property the streets should be sprinkled, the city is to remain partially in the dust as last year, then the city should do its own sprinkling and do it thoroughly and well.

THE SALEM TAMMANY

Listen to an Address from a Eugene Orator—The Cry of Reform.

The Salem Democratic club met Wednesday evening at Grange hall in special session. Martin Rowley was in the chair and there were nearly a hundred men present with quite a sprinkling of Republicans and Alliance men.

Mr. Rowley presented the speaker and he was well received.

The Hon. Lark Bilyeu said he was not prepared to make a set speech. Party lines were being drawn and tickets made up, but so far as Democrats were concerned their lines were always drawn upon the principles necessary to maintain and perpetuate good government, equal and exact justice to all men. The party to which he belonged was a part of the common people and aimed to serve the plain people. The Republican party aimed to throw greater burdens upon the common people. All but the great capitalists had greater burdens thrown upon them. It was premature to discuss the tariff. It took the substance of the laborer and the farmer and transferred it to the pockets of the manufacturer and monopolist. Living cost too much and tariffs must be abolished. Discontent was all over the land. Protective legislation must be curbed. The corporations of the United States were controlling legislation too much. The powers of the corporations must be curbed. Capital would pile itself up and multiply while it rested, while laborers starved if they quit work. Even the courts felt the power of aggregated wealth. We claim to be in favor of the masses. We have always claimed it through all the years of defeat we have suffered. As long as we believe in human liberty we can not go to pieces.

He said the Oregon Pacific was holding 250,000 acres of land in Lane county and refused to pay taxes on it. We needed state legislation.

If the Democratic party will go ahead and do its duty and was right and would stand by them, there would be no Farmers' Alliance in this state. If the party would do its duty by the people it would get there.

Mr. Bilyeu gave the club a deal of good advice and was warmly cheered.

Mr. Dibble moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Bilyeu and it was done with a vim.

Wm. Kaiser was called out and only heartily endorsed the preceding speaker. John P. Robertson was also introduced. He attended W. C. T. U. temperance and Democrat meetings. He was a Jefferson Democrat, but not a Cleveland Democrat—he was a Prohibitionist if anything. He told the Democrats present that their party was originally an anti-bank party but it was now. The Tilden platform was an anti-bank platform and Tilden was elected.

The money power seated Hayes and he paid it back with compound interest by voting the first silver bill. When the Democrats nominated Hancock they dodged the bank question and put on a banker for vice president. Never until the Democrats put up Grover Cleveland, who put in four national bankers in the highest offices, could they get the confidence of Wall street sufficiently to elect a president.

Mr. Robertson did not make very much of a Democratic speech but his remarks were well received. He closed with the injunction that if the Democrats would get back upon Jefferson principles it would sweep the country.

Mr. Bilyeu responded briefly and put all in good feeling. The Democratic party had always been nearer right than other party that had ever existed.

The meeting closed to meet Saturday night at 7:30.

Salem has been well advertised in this matter for her pluck and enterprise, and no harm has been done. This city would have been right to the front with her club and would have taken no back seat. It would have been mortifying in the extreme to the giant cities of the Northwest to have Salem doing them up—but they will have to take their dose some day, and it is only deferred, as Salem is sure to get there and stay there as a city.

Salem will not be a league city this year, but it is not due to the lack of get up and get on the part of base ball people at the capital city. It is due to a jealousy, chicanery and envy on the part of a city that Salem has always treated in a different way.

WHAT THE PEOPLE WANT.—The city council should respect the wishes of the people in the matter of the South Commercial street viaduct. The wish of the people, the expression of the business men and heaviest taxpayers, is in favor of the present opportunity to build a good bridge there. THE JOURNAL favors it because it favors a general policy of permanent public improvements and giving employment to workmen.

S. P. CO. WILL FIGHT.—The Southern Pacific company will make no concession or compromise but will fight the Oregon commission to the highest court. The rates will go into effect on the Union Pacific Mar. 15th, and will cause to the people a saving on grain and stock alone is \$45,000 a year. There have been large quantities of grain held back to get the benefit of the lower rate.
