Downing of the penitentiary and others made good speeches, the Democratic club attending in a body. The chairman, Mr. Starr, decided the debate upon points made in favor of the negative. There is a general demand for more such meetings as they are very instructive.

MORE COUNTY COURT.

The Grist Saturday Afternoon—South Salem Road Restoration Deferred Until April.

The county court was so thronged with visitors Saturday that not much business could be done. Late in the day the following entries were made:

F. P. Talkington was allowed \$23.40 rebate on taxes. The application of Geo. W. Davis et al., for right to lay and maintain a railway in South Salem additions and Yew Park, continued to April term.

In matter of relocation and vacation of Morris road near Turner; petitioners having satisfactorily made road it was ordered established.

Ordered that a warrant be drawn in favor of J. B. Shaler, supervisor road district No. 32, for \$29.50, balance of appropriation left over from last year.

The court is preparing instructions to road supervisors which will be made public later on. A delegation of people living along the electric line extension in South Salem appeared before the court to remonstrate against the condition of the road along the route of the electric line. The matter continued to the April term. The electric line people have promised to put the road in good condition.

CHEMEKETA IMPROVEMENT.

Bids Opened on a Twelve Block Section of Chemekeka Street Grading.

The bids for grading and paving with rolled gravel Chemekeka street were opened at 6 a. m., March 14, at the city engineer's office. There were only two bidders as follows: Archie Mason—Proportion to be paid by property owners, \$9813.90; by city \$3475.85; total, \$13,289.75. Goodhue & Cahill—Proportion to be paid by property owners, \$9,744.43; by city, \$4137.50; total, \$13,881.93. This is for completion of twelve blocks according to specifications. The grades as recently established require no change in the surface of present street car lines, except on two blocks, one between Liberty and High where it will have to be lowered about four inches, and the other cut upon the hill between Summer and Capital of three inches.

THE BIDS require a \$10,000 contractor's bond and the matter will come up at the next council meeting. The work is to be finished in sixty days after the contract is closed. The bids are nearly as low as the lowest estimates made by the city engineer.

FOR A DOG SHOW.—There will be a special meeting of the Salem Rod and Gun club at Brooks & Harritt's gun store this evening, (March 14.) Important business on hand. An effort is to be made to have a dog show at the State Poultry and Pet Stock show at Salem March 25, 26. There are a number of thoroughbred dogs in the city and some special effort should be made to have a fine exhibit. It can be done and Salem sports should see to it.

FIRST MEETING.—About one hundred attended the gospel Y. M. C. A. meeting at Insurance hall at 4 p. m. Sunday. J. A. Van Eaton conducted the meeting, and gave the young men a good talk. There was no business done, but interest in the organization keeps up to a high pitch.

Downing; Silver Falls, Samuel Arnold; East Salem, Geo. E. Allen; Fairfield, B. A. Nathanman.

A committee on credentials, was appointed composed of Dr. Jefferys, Henry Parker, Mr. Nathanman, Mr. Allen, Mr. Heindrich, who submitted a report, which is based on the vote cast for Governor Penney in 1890, giving one delegate to every fifteen votes or fraction over one-half. SCHOOL ELECTION.
A Director and Clerk Voted On—Details of The Conflict.

The polling place for the Salem school election was at the opera house from two in the afternoon to six. The following officials were in charge: Adam Ohmart, judge, H. H. Smith and W. B. Gallagher, clerks. The only candidate for director was W. L. Wade, of North Salem, and his election will be unanimous. In the matter of clerk there is considerable strife. Henry Schomaker is the Democratic candidate, and J. H. Bridges is the nominee of the Republican committee, while W. L. Wade is out as an "anti-ring" Republican. The result is uncertain.

AT THE POLLS.

There is a perfect jam around the opera house, and the skill of the clerks is taxed to the utmost, one hundred votes being received in eighteen minutes. No women had offered to vote at 3 p. m. but a large women vote will be offered. Before opening the polls the officers of the election decided to reject any that might be offered. To all appearances the time fixed for the election will be too short for polling all the votes.

THE AFRICAN BUSH.

A Terror Inspiring Land Where Bushes and Heat Are Frightful.

To see this land typically one should outspan one's wagon on the top of a height on a summer's middy. Not a creature stirs anywhere, and the sun pours down its rays on the flaccid, dust covered leaves of the bushes. When the driver has gone to lie down behind the bushes and the leader is gone to take the oxen to water, if you stand up alone on the chest at the front of the wagon and look out you will see as far as your eye can reach over hills and dales the silent, motionless hot bush stretching.

Not a sound is to be heard, and the heat is so intense your hand blisters on the tent of the wagon where you have rested it; only from a clump of bush at your right a cloud sets up its keen shrill cry, glorying in the heat and solitude of the bush. Not less characteristically do you see it when as a little child you travel through it in the night.

The ox wagon creeps slowly along the sandy road. The driver, walking beside it, calls at intervals to his tired oxen; we look out across the wagon chest and see as the wagon moves along how the dark outlines of the bushes on either side seem to move, too; a great clump seems coming nearer and nearer like a vast animal; the shapes are magnified by the dark.

We creep closer down behind the wagon chest and look out across it. Against the dark night sky to our right, on the ridge of the hill, are the gaunt forms of aloes standing like a row of men keeping watch. We remember all the stories we have heard of Kafir wars and men shot and stabbed as they passed along hillsides, and of wild animals, and we creep down lower; then a will-o'-the-wisp comes out from some dried up torrent bed and far above us dances in and out among the clumps of bush, now in sight and now out again.

You are glad when the people in the wagon begin to sing hymns, and more glad yet when at 9:30 the wagon stops, drawn up against a great clump of bush at the roadside. The tired oxen are taken out from the yoke and every one climbs out and a fire is lighted, and you gather from far and wide stumps of dried elephant's food and euphorbia what you can drag with one hand, and bits of branch and dry twig, and throw them on the fire; the flame leaps higher and higher and all sit down beside the ruddy blaze.

Away behind another bush the driver and leader have lighted their fire and are talking to each other in Kafir as they boil the coffee and grill the meat. The blaze of your own fire leaps up and illumines the great and dusty body of the wagon with its white sails, and glints on the horns of the tired oxen, where they lie tied to their yokes, chewing the cud, and on the bush with its dark green leaves behind you, and you laugh and talk and forget the stories of Kafir wars and the great bush stretching about you.—Fortnightly Review.
