SHOOTING AFFRAY

Between a Man and An Officer.

FROM PORTLAND.
Lively Shooting Affray in the Streets.
PORTLAND, March 17.—L. Mc Mahon was shot and seriously wounded this afternoon by Police Officer Hutchins while resisting arrest. The officer who had a warrant for Mc Mahon, who was charged with obtaining money on false pretences, attempted to serve it on one of the principal streets, Mc Mahon broke away from the officer and started to run down the street with a large crowd in pursuit. Jumping into an express wagon he drew a revolver and fired indiscriminately into the crowd but without inflicting any damage. Officer Hutchins drew a revolver and fired at the fugitive, the bullet passing through the base of his skull. Mc Mahon was then captured. Hutchins was also taken into custody. It is thought Mc Mahon's wounds will not prove fatal.

Still Continues in Texas and Arkansas.

WAS A SWINDLER.

When He Was Arrested He Shot Himself.

NEW ORLEANS, March 17.—A handsome, well-dressed man arrived here recently and gave the name of House, a member of a commercial firm of San Francisco. He called on Mr. Roush, a local manufacturer, whom he had met in New York, who introduced him to M. S. Rogers, jeweler; D. H. Holmes, dry goods merchant; and others, to whom he gave drafts on the Nevada bank of San Francisco, and the East River bank of New York, for several hundred dollars, which they cashed. Subsequently the parties discovered that the drafts were worthless, and notified the chief of police. Meantime, Rouse had purchased a cut-rate ticket for New York. The chief telegraphed to Atlanta to arrest Rouse. He received a dispatch informing him that the culprit had been arrested there, but on being taken into custody he drew a pistol and shot himself through the head. Mr. Roush, who had been told that Rouse had been a member of a firm in San Francisco, while in New York his niece, who is at present in the city, associated with Rouse's family, who are highly connected and are in the best society. He never took the trouble to inquire about Rouse's business. Besides himself and niece, several friends who knew Rouse were of the opinion that he was connected with the San Francisco firm, but since have learned differently.

CAUGHT AT LAST.

The People's Party at Oregon City.

"JACK THE RIPPER" CAUGHT.
A Theory That He Is the Right Man.

LIVERPOOL, March 17.—The police have been pursuing an inquiry into the disappearance of a woman and children who formerly lived at Hain Hill, a part of Liverpool. The inquiry started in connection with the arrest at Melbourne, Australia, of a man named Williams, charged with murdering a woman. This morning the hearthstone where he formerly lived was raised and the bodies of a woman and three children partly covered with quicklime were unearthed. A plausible theory has sprung from the discoveries. The further the affair is investigated, the stronger grows the belief that Williams is none other than the world known "Jack the Ripper." Williams was frequent visitor to London. The police traced his movements between the two places, and found his visits to London corresponded with the times the unfortunate women in Whitechapel district were found with throats cut and bodies mutilated in the shocking manner which characterized the crimes of "Jack the Ripper." It recalled the description given the police of the appearance of the man seen in company with several of the unfortunate women whose bodies were subsequently found lying in pools of blood in the streets of Whitechapel. This description tallies exactly with the appearance of Williams as given by people of Liverpool well acquainted with him.

PEOPLES PARTY.

Rork Nominated for Congressman.

OREGON CITY, Or., March 16.—The convention spent most of the afternoon in listening to speeches by various members, as the committee on credentials had a big task inspecting credentials from precincts and labor organizations. At 4 o'clock this committee reported, the roll calling 105 delegates present. A committee on platform, consisting of one from each county was appointed at once, and retired to begin their labors, which were protracted till 10 p. m. The platform embraces the following leading features: It demands direct loan by the government at 2 per cent, free and unlimited currency of silver, increased circulating medium to \$50 per capita, postal saving banks, no alien land owners, corporation ownership restricted to actual land used, government ownership of railroads, abolishment of railroad commission and maximum rates, reducing rates one-third, government ownership of telegraph and telephone lines, improvement of Columbia river by building parallel railroad to be operated by the government.

The only tax for the support of government, the 2 per cent. on loans by the government and graduated land tax. No exemption for indebtedness without corresponding rendering of taxable credit, liquor sold by state agent and not drank within sixty feet of purchase place, no license by national government, equal suffrage, anti-Chinese, state publish school books, county officers restricted to salary, eight hours a day's labor in factories, mines and shops. Recognize Knights of Labor labels. Against Pinkerton detectives. Against Nicaragua canal, unless owned by the government and operated at cost; direct vote for all officers. To issue legal tender notes and pay Union soldiers the loss occasioned by depreciated currency.

A preliminary vote being taken in the first district for congressmen it gave Rork 48, Polk 37, Hayes 16. Pending the vote for congressmen the convention discovered that it lacked sufficient votes to make nominations in conformity with the election law. On the first formal ballot Rork received 55 votes, and S. H. Holt 30. The nomination was made unanimous.

THAT PRIZE FIGHT.
Young Bell Exonerated from All Blame.

PORTLAND, March 17.—The corner yesterday afternoon held an inquest over the remains of Pearl Henderson, the 17-year-old boy who was killed in a prize fight on Sunday with Charles Bell, a boy 15 years old. The jury returned a verdict that Henderson came to his death from over exertion while engaged in a prize fight with Bell. Young Bell was exonerated from all criminal intent.

Exciting in the Coal Exchange.
LONDON, March 17.—There was an exciting scene at the coal exchange yesterday. It became apparent that the pinnacle was reached by pushing the price of coal, and everybody was waiting to see who would strike the keynote for the downward movement. At length one of the leading firm offered coal at 4 shillings under the ruling price. It was as if a firebrand had been cast into the crowd. There was a wild rush to follow the leader, and coal took a rapid fall. Representatives of Belgian mine owners, who had flocked in dozens to the city to take advantage of the situation, are going back to Belgium disgusted. They find the miners' stoppage has

ALONE AND PENNILESS.

An Oregon Girl Commits Suicide in Seattle.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 17.—Miss Lillian Stewart, a pretty 18-year-old maiden, committed suicide early yesterday at a lodging-house on Main street by taking "Rough on Rats." The girl's parents live in Southern Oregon on a farm, and she herself for some years has attended a school in Eugene. A year ago she left her parents' roof and came to Seattle to join a young man named C. C. Castair, with whom she fell in love at Eugene. Castair was a waiter in a restaurant at Eugene, and the parents of the girl objected to her engagement. Castair came to Seattle, and was employed as purser on a steamer. Then he sent for his sweetheart, and she left home against her parents' wishes. That was a year ago. The day she arrived in Seattle news reached her of Castair's death. He had fallen overboard from his steamer near Port Townsend the same day that he telegraphed for her to join him, and his body has never been recovered. The girl was too proud to return to her home, and so far as known, her parents are not yet aware of the tragic death of their daughter or her lover. Lillian worked as a waitress in a restaurant for several months, but last November she took sick, and since then has subsisted upon the charity of her friends, the other waitresses. Yesterday morning she was found dead. Her body may be sent to Oregon for burial.

AFFAIRS IN CUBA.

Customs Receipts Show a Large Falling Off.

HAVANA, Cuba, March 17.—Receipts at the custom house show a large falling off as compared with last year, and the government is constantly occupied devising ways to increase the revenues. Many anticipate the adoption of a new tariff in the near future, and properly the suppression of the present reciprocity treaty with the United States. Popular feeling against the treaty is very strong on account of the disastrous results to Spanish millers and on account of the levy levied by the United States on early vegetables, while the United States has the privilege of shipping garden products to Cuba free of duty. The sugar trade in the North is bearing the Cuban sugar market and business is practically suspended in consequence. Planters are greatly discouraged, as they are also contending with heavy storms, fires, lack of field hands, and breaking of machinery.
