A POPULAR CHORD.—The little speech of Councilman Hutton as reported in THE JOURNAL has struck a popular chord. The people do not object to paying for street improvements if they get them. But to go on another year paying a city engineer and city attorney for drawing plans, making surveys, drawing specifications, looking up abstracts, formulating ordinances for street improvements, but getting not a lick of improvement except on paper, is played out. It is but justice to the city engineer and attorney to say that they have done no work but such as the council has ordered them to do, and they have also done their work well and are entitled to pay for it. Much of the work done last year was preparatory and had to be done before any street improvement could be undertaken and was necessary preparatory work. But Mr. Hutton's point, that no more preparatory work be ordered unless some real work is to be done, was well taken. The council has prepared much but done little. The ordering of the South Commercial street bridge and cutting down the hill and widening the street is a good step. But the thousands of dollars expense of preparing for street improvement in the main part of the city should bear fruit or be stopped. Mr. Hutton, right you are!

STEAMER DISABLED.—The river steamer R. C. Young finds a "hard road to travel" in the upper Willamette. The river is quite low at present and in many places between Corvallis and Eugene the water is shallow and very swift. But she has made a few successful trips to Harrisburg and the proprietors are by no means discouraged by their little mishap on Sunday. She was near Peoria, on her way down with a 55-ton cargo when the swift current swung the little craft around with such force as to strike the stump of a tree on the river bank and break every paddle on her wheel. She was tied up for repairs, which can be made without much difficulty, when she will continue to do good service on the upper river.—Corvallis Times.

NEW CHURCH.—Articles of incorporation of the Free Methodist church, of Salem, have been filed with the county clerk by L. L. Welch, J. C. Goode and J. G. Dolan. The amount of the property on hand is \$300. The object is to advance the cause of religion and minister to the wants of the people; erect buildings for such purpose in North Salem; and to own and hold real estate.

THE BAPTIST CONFERENCE.

A Very Profitable Session Held in Portland.

The conference of the Baptist missions closed Tuesday night at the First Baptist church. At the morning session an exposition of Acts xiii. 8, entitled "The Witnessing Church," was given by Rev. J. S. Nunn. Rev. Robert Whitaker, of Salem, made an address on "Pastors and Missions;" Rev. G. W. Hull, of Albany, addressed the conference on "The Use of Missionary Literature."

AFTERNOON SESSION.
At 2 o'clock the chair was taken by Rev. S. P. Davis, and the meeting opened with devotional exercises. The first speaker was Rev. R. McKillop, of McMinnville, who gave an exposition of II Cor. vi. 8, entitled "The Grace of Giving." He said there should be a close connection between the Christian and the Christian's God, and followed up the assertion with a long and conclusive line of argument. Mrs. L. C. Driggs, of Oregon City, presented the history of women's work in missions as it pertains to Oregon. The paper showed that the women were well to the front in mission work. The Oregon society were now supporting Miss Skinner in the foreign field, Miss Williams, who is preparing for the home field at the Chicago training school, and a little Chinese girl at San Francisco. The young people's work in the missions was represented by Miss C. C. Castro, of Portland, in a well-prepared paper. Dr. Sunderland then took the platform and delivered an able address on the evangelization of the world in this generation. At the close of the afternoon session the delegates adjourned to the lower room of the church, where the ladies had prepared attractive and abundant refreshments.

EVENING SESSION.
Rev. J. C. Read was in the chair at the opening of the evening session. The time was given up almost exclusively to Rev. Dr. Mable, who continued his around-the-world address, part of which was given on Sunday evening. He contrasted Christianity and Buddhism, and Christianity and atheism as it is found in India, China and other parts of Asia.

AN ELEGANT HOME.

Merchant Klein is Settled in That Fine New House.

It was the privilege of the writer a few days since to be shown through the new residence of Mr. Klein in University addition, and he cannot resist saying a few words in its praise. The general arrangement, from architecture to finish is certainly well conceived both for practical comfort and artistic effect. The hall at the entrance has a fine inlaid floor with parquet border of walnut, rosewood, maple and oak, while the double parlors and dining room, which are connected with rolling doors, have a similar border, filled in with heavy velvet Brussels. The walls are delicately frescoed, the work of Artists William and Criss, and the wood work is really the most attractive features of the whole house. The doors and all casings, which are of redwood and Oregon pine, are finished in hard oil rubbed down similar to piano finish, in fact some of the panels present as fine a surface as a French plate mirror. The most pleasing feature about this work is that it was done by a Salem artist, E. E. Snow, the natural wood finisher. To say that Mr. Snow is an expert at such is to state it mildly, as the Klein residence will amply testify. He now has a crew at work on the outside of the building, which will be treated to three coats in half a dozen colors, and will be in the latest

THE WOMEN VOTE.

There Be a Contest at Albany—A Point About the Male Vote.

The Eugene Guard says: "Salem would not allow the women to vote at the school election. Albany allowed them to vote and about seventy-five took advantage of the privilege. There will be a contest over the office of clerk at the latter place and it is probable that the question as to the right of women to vote at school elections will be definitely settled in the courts."

School Clerk Simpson, of Salem has received information of the Albany election showing the ruling of the judges of election up there to have been that men were allowed to vote regardless of whether they were taxpayers and women regardless of whether they were widows or not. On these grounds the election is to be contested.

The constitution of Oregon says at all elections not otherwise provided for, male citizens only shall vote, (and the school elections are not otherwise provided for in the constitution) and that has always been the basis of ruling at Salem. The Albany contest will be watched with great interest if it gets into the courts.

SALEM BOARD OF TRADE.

May Take Action Tonight in Regard to the Astoria Railroad.

The session of the Salem board of trade tonight may be a very important one. President-elect Cottle is to announce his new standing committees for the year, and eastern advertising is to be placed.

SECRETARY WAGNER says there is now a chance for Salem to lead in pushing the Astoria railroad project. A railroad crossing the valley here, connecting with another transcontinental route would go far to double Salem's population in one year, and is worth making a great effort for. If the subject is in shape to be taken up, Salem should be placed in immediate circuit with the projectors of the Astoria road.

STAYTON.—The city election occurred at that city on last Monday, and was a very exciting contest, nearly every vote in the city being polled. The license ticket won by a vote ranging from fourteen majority for the mayor down to five. The total vote was 190. Following was the successful ticket: Uriah Whitney, mayor; W. H. Holston, J. Richardson, J. P. Davy, and O. C. Wimer, councilmen; Jerome Grayser, recorder; Taylor Smith, marshal; J. P. Thomas, treasurer.

PIONEER PHYSICIAN DEAD.

One of the First in the State—Funeral at Salem Friday.

Dr. W. C. Warriner, one of the best known physicians in Oregon and an old resident near Salem is dead. He is about 80 years old and was in the city only a few days since. He had suffered severely from an attack of grippe, from which he was bravely recovering. He died at Portland and the remains will be brought to Salem for interment, on the 11:30 train Friday. The services will be at the Christian church immediately after the train arrives, and will probably be conducted by the Masons. Deceased was a graduate of Jefferson Medical college, Philadelphia, and for many years lived on a farm at Bethel, Polk county. Mrs. Gillingham, of Salem, is his daughter.
