IT WILL BE A MISTAKE.

So far Chairman Lotan of the Republican state central committee has recognized no Republican paper in Oregon by sending it the call for the Republican state convention to publish. Of course, every newspaper at all enterprising has printed that call as a matter of news. The only official authorized publication of the call has been in the Portland Oregonian, and many Republicans do not regard it as a good Republican authority.

It is well known that the Oregonian allows no opportunity to escape to abuse and belittle Secretary of State Blaine, and National Chairman Clarkson. While all Republicans believe in free speech and freedom of criticism of all candidates, after men are officially recognized as great leaders there is a limit to the extent of attacks upon them, and it certainly does not establish a newspaper's republicanism to make personal attacks upon such leaders without attacking their public policy or record.

While the Oregonian persistently attacks these leaders it is said to be a fact that nearly every office in Portland that has any patronage attached to it was secured by the Democrats through the committee of one hundred with the influence and co-operation of the Oregonian. Its pets are largely foreign capitalists, free traders and anti-Blaine maniacs, and under all the circumstances it is a mistake to make the Oregonian the only official organ for publishing the calls of Republican conventions.

THE JOURNAL does not believe that the Oregonian at heart represents or desires to represent the true interests of the masses of the people. Neither it nor its little ring of echoes that always send back their feeble sneezes when it takes snuff, are in sympathy with the masses. In fact they despise them. True Republicanism is in full sympathy with the wants of the people, has confidence in the intelligence of the people and respects the interests and feelings of every element of American citizenship.

It will be a mistake to attempt to carry Oregon Republican in the great battle of next June and expect to do it through the Oregonian and the few papers that chime in with it on every occasion. Republicanism that is for the people will repudiate that kind of management of the state central committee. THE JOURNAL voices the sentiments of the rank and file of the party in this protest against autocratic assumption of one-man or one-newspaper power. Oregonian victories are not the people's victories.

A LEGISLATIVE TICKET. What will Salem Republican business men who are interested in a good working delegation in the next legislature do to secure that? There is no senator to elect and no politics enters into the contest so far. If a good Republican ticket is put up it will probably be elected. But Salem has a vital interest in the kind of men who shall go there. Salem will get no benefit from sending any unprogressive or reactionary delegation to the legislature. All the kickers alive cannot help Salem. Men who favor low taxes but an aggressive affirmative policy of making this a great city in the shortest time should be selected from Salem. Our city should be pushed to its destiny to be the leading second city in Oregon. It should be put to the front by the same methods that are employed by cities of its own rank with which it must compete in its development.

The legislative delegation will determine this matter.

Delegates to the Republican County Convention. MINTO TICKETS DEFEATED AT SALEM.

Details of the Struggle Over the Different States.

The Republican primaries Saturday brought out a large vote and as a rule were conducted fairly and honestly. At several polling places a public appeal was made to confine the voting to Republicans.

The precaution was not necessary as very few, if any, Democrats or third party men attempted to cast ballots. At all the Salem precincts, except North Salem, the contest was understood to be between the friends of Jasper Minto and John Knight, candidates for sheriff. Both were well organized and brought out a full vote, and in each precinct the Knight ticket carried the day. The contest was a friendly test of strength between Republicans, conducted in the best of spirits and is so accepted by the defeated. The result of the primaries is given below, as far as ascertained.

Mr. Patton of Macleay says the fight there was square—Minto and anti-Minto, and was carried anti-Minto two to one. But he says the delegation is divided on sheriff between three candidates. He says Stayton and Sublimity are for Wrightman.

At Brooks there was a red hot fight over the primary. There was a fight or two, some bloody noses, a struggle to shut out Democrats and non-residents and as a result two delegations.
