THE COUNTY CONVENTION.

Candidates Who Are in the Field for Office.

SOME FINE LISTS TO SELECT FROM.

Only One Has a Walk Over—An Exciting Convention Thursday.

There will be the biggest nominating convention in town Thursday that has ever been held at Salem. Delegates have been coming in a day in advance and the city is full of the buzz and noise of the Republican party. There are a few of the county politicians here too.

The convention as a body is going to be a very fine lot of men. The results at the primaries indicate that there will be a very large element present of the independent order. The number of unpledged men is very large. There have also been some very strong expressions of preference for various leading candidates.

It will be one of the most interesting and exciting political gatherings ever held here, and of course THE JOURNAL will have a very complete report of all that is said and done. That so fine and so largely an unpledged body of men will put up a good ticket, no one can doubt for a moment. That it will be a strong and winning ticket, all familiar with the temper of Marion county Republicanism can readily believe. The candidates are numerous and the fate of some of them at least will be affected by the temporary organization. The convention will be called to order at 10 a. m. Thursday, March 24th by John Knight, chairman of the Republican county central committee. Then will come the struggle over a chairman. The chairman will appoint the committee on order of procedure, on appointment of delegates to state, judicial and congressional conventions and on platform. Whether sheriff or clerk shall be nominated first affects very seriously the result of one of these offices.

MR. BRIDE FOR PROGRESS.

He Favors Bonding the City and Permanent Improvements.

A JOURNAL reporter had a short talk with Hon. Geo. W. McBride, secretary of state, on the subject of the best policy for pushing Salem and securing the rapid development of the capital city.

Mr. McBride has been in high public office a long time, is a close reader and observer of affairs in adjoining states, and is a progressive man. He believes in Oregon, and in advertising Oregon's resources to the world. He is also a large property owner in Salem and its surrounding territory. Speaking of improvements, he said:

"You can put me down for a policy of permanent public improvements for Salem. We want better streets, more factories and street car lines. I could see no objection to having a street car line, electric or motor system, on any other street. Portland is all torn up with these lines and no one offers such objections to them as are offered here in Salem."

BONDING.

"This city should use its credit to build fine streets right through as advertised in THE JOURNAL. \$200,000 or \$300,000 long time, low rate, bonds are considered nothing by California or Washington towns half the size of Salem and unless Salem is prepared to do this sort of thing Salem will drop behind the procession."

"When I was in California, a promoter of a beet sugar plant, told me at the Palace Hotel that for a bonus of \$100,000 we could get a \$500,000 beet sugar factory. I found, however, that we could not raise it at Salem, so I dropped the matter. But those are the things we want and must have. I favor building state institutions and state public works on bonds, instead of taxing the present generation to pay the whole bill, and I favored an amendment to the constitution to that end. I trust the delegation from Marion to the legislature will be made up of progressive men and solidly Republican. With the aid of the people's party the Democrats expect to capture the legislature and they would only bring reactionary influences to bear on all state affairs, if we can judge from the way those who are in office express themselves."

The girls were aged fifteen, fourteen and thirteen, and belong to respectable families of this city. Their lark consisted of running away on foot Tuesday afternoon. They had very little money, some food and a little extra clothing. Starting northward they were soon in the country, following the railroad track to Brooks, where they were overtaken at a church, where they had tracked them out, and found where they had stopped at one farm house, and tried to borrow a pair of shears to cut their hair off.

These girls are almost if not fully developed young women, and have caused their families great sorrow by their conduct. There may be no benefit in publishing their names, but as it has already been done, no further harm can come from repeating it here. The girls are Mattie Smith, who resides with her mother on Court street, near Liberty, Etta Williamson, a stepdaughter of Wm. Holcomb, of South Salem, and Lizzie Dunn, of East Salem.
