

of imprisonment. Justices Drake, Brown and Walker were unanimous in opposition to the appeal. Greer, it will be remembered, laid claim to lands decided by the courts to belong to the Canadian Pacific railroad, on which Greer's home was built. When the deputy sheriff came with a writ of execution to force through the door, the shot taking effect, Sam Greer goes to jail to serve his sentence today.

Sieve Munson, a trader of China, Hall, North British Columbia, arrived down yesterday morning with the skeleton of John Cowper, shot by Indians sixteen years ago, it is supposed by Peter and Jim Starr. The former is a medicine man or native doctor, who had a grudge against him. The Starrs were put on trial at the time, but as the body could not be found, there was no proof that a murder had been committed.

The most important outcome of the Heisterington-Robinson matter is contained in two interviews held yesterday with two men whose positions give weight to their statements. They are Commander Woods, of her majesty's ship Mercury, and Paymaster Calvert, of the United States ship Alert. The latter says that since the affray the American and British colonies in Yokohama have taken sides, the Britishers contending that Heisterington's action was a foul murder, while the Americans say he was simply avenging his honor. This has brought the matter to a serious crisis between the representatives of the two nations in the Japanese city, and every day, before Calvert left, things were getting warmer. The feud had so far progressed that even business relations, where the matter might naturally be supposed to be forgotten, are badly strained. Calvert expects that, unless something happens to avert the animosity, the feud may have a lasting effect, Commander Woods, who, of course, takes the opposite standpoint is still in accord with all Calvert says regarding the existing feeling, and states matters are getting very touchy. The feud has spread beyond Japanese ports south to the Chinese, where British and United States officers are metaphorically at daggers drawn over the unfortunate affair.

A Chance for a Duel.

New York, March 24.—The steamship Majestic, on board of which are Messrs. Drayton and Burrows as passengers, arrived yesterday. Clubmen all over the city are unanimously of the opinion that the principals must or forego all claims to a reception at any club in the country. The decision of the French jury of honor is not accepted as binding, having been made ex parte and on a hypothesis which assumed as a fact matter immaterial and disputed. So great is the fear that a quarrel may be precipitated that agents of the White Star line will put a strong guard of detectives on board the steamship at the earliest moment. A lawyer of the Astor family applied to the collector for permission to take ashore a passenger who is believed to be Drayton. About twenty tugs, containing friends of the parties, are already at quarantine.

MINTYRE HAS FRIENDS.

Tacoma Believes the Alleged Robbers Innocent.

TACOMA, Wash., March 24.—J. R. McIntyre and W. D. Stewart, charged with the theft of \$2550 of Wells Fargo funds, arrived here at midnight yesterday, and were met at the depot by fifty of their friends. They were immediately released on bonds of \$1500 each, which were signed by eight prominent citizens. It is believed here that the young men are innocent, and that their reputations have been unnecessarily smirched. All their friends knew that they went to Portland in response to a telegram from Mr. Shelby, and were not fugitives from justice. Monday, Agent W. F. D. Mercer, of the Pacific Surety company, swore out a warrant charging them with robbing the express company. Previously, one of Sullivan's men made a futile effort to induce the Tacoma police to have Portland officers arrest McIntyre and Stewart. The Webb & Clark company, of Portland, of which McIntyre is the Tacoma representative, has instructed their Puget Sound manager, R. J. Park, of Seattle, to render McIntyre all possible assistance. McIntyre's Anderson Island property is valued at \$4000, and his close friends say his assets exceed his liabilities.

THE SEALS.

What the United States Is Intending to Do.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The instructions to the naval officer assigned to the vessels intended for the protection of the seal, are not yet wholly complete, but it is evident that the operations of the vessels will this year be extended not only to Behring sea, but also to the waters within the three-mile limit along the Alaskan coast on latitude 53° to Eulachin Pass, south of Behring sea. Nearly 25,000 seals were caught in these waters last year. The revenue vessels Corwin and Albatross have already gone to Alaskan waters, and will soon be followed by the Rush and Bear and several naval vessels.

STANDARD OIL COMPANY.

Rumors Current of a Very Big Undivided Surplus.

New York, March 24.—Report is busy in Wall street with Standard Oil affairs since the dissolution of the trust. There has been rumors of a big undivided surplus, and it was learned yesterday that it is reported to be as large as \$36,000,000 over and above the capital of \$95,000,000 in outstanding certificates. Part of this surplus, it is said, would go as additional capital to the minor companies into which the trust was broken, and the remainder would go as a cash return to the certificateholders. Another report was that there would be but twelve linked companies remaining when the trust was readjusted.

ELDER DILLON'S REVIVAL.

States That He Is Willing to Meet His Accusers.

FOREST GROVE, March 24.—This protestant religious town has been even more so the past two weeks. A revival, under the management of Rev. Aldrich, of Brownsville, closed at the Methodist church Sunday, with good results, and this week Elder B. J. Dillon is conducting one at the Christian church. This is the same Elder Dillon who was mentioned as having been charged with improper behavior at Palouse and Spokane recently. Mr. Dillon states that he is fully prepared to meet his accusers. The scandal has been the talk of the town.

GOT FIVE YEARS.

The Tramps Who Attacked Father Metayer.

ALBANY, March 24.—Frank Wilson, and J. D. Baker the young tramps who committed the assault upon Rev. Father Metayer last Friday night, were each today sentenced to five years imprisonment in the state penitentiary.

Bodies Recovered.

DUNBAR, Pa., March 24.—Twenty-three bodies of miners who lost their lives in the Hill farm mine disaster, June 10, 1890, were brought to the surface for burial today. Six more of the unfortunates cannot be recovered until all the water is pumped out. Bodies were contorted in ghastly shapes, indicating that the miners had suffered the most horrible torture before death. The owners of the mine have expended \$100,000 in accomplishing the rescue of the bodies.

The Silver Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The galleries were again packed when the silver debate was resumed and a very full attendance on the part of members. Bland announced he would postpone the motion for the previous question till 5 o'clock this afternoon, giving an opportunity for a greater debate. Williams then opened the debate in favor of the bill.

CANADIAN PACIFIC.

All Quiet and Men Are to Be Re-instated Without Prejudice.

MONTREAL, Que., March 24.—Vice President Shaughnessy, of the Canadian Pacific, made the statement that "everything is quiet and running smoothly today." The basis proposed is that all men who have been discharged, and who have gone on the strike, and any employee who has been discharged for refusing to take the place of any of the strikers, or who has voted to strike, will be reinstated without prejudice.

THE GERMANS.

Von Caprivi to be Prussian Minister of Foreign Affairs.

BERLIN, March 24.—Reichsanzeiger, the official organ of the government, announced that Chancellor Von Caprivi will be relieved from the presidency of the Prussian ministry but will retain the position of Prussian minister of foreign affairs. Count Von Eulenberg, grand marshal of the court, succeeds Caprivi as president. Dr. E. Von Bosse, is appointed minister ecclesiastical to replace Count Soltitz Truchseer.

THE BEHRING SEA.

Treaty Recommended For Ratification.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The senate committee on foreign relations have decided this morning to recommend the ratification of the Behring sea treaty.

The Sealing Fleet.

St. Johns, N. F., March 24.—The Labrador, the first of the sealing fleets to return, has arrived; her cargo consists of 18,500 skins. She reports the Ranger has 27,000 skins; Dina, 28,000; Isoland, 23,000; Wolf, 25,000; Leopard, 15,000; Eagle, 22,000; Kile, 5000; Esquimaux, 25,000; Hope, 10,000 and Neptune, 30,000.

Instructed for Harrison.

CHAMBERLAIN, South Dakota, March 24.—The Republican state convention has selected delegates to Minneapolis and instructed them for Harrison.

The Silver Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Lynch of Wisconsin, Stout of Michigan, and Fitch of New York, earnestly opposed the bill. McKean, of Nebraska, said before entering upon a discussion of the bill he wished to discuss the minority report, which had about it the perfume of the banking house. He then said:

"The report was begotten of avarice and its fruit is the spoliation of industry. The cry about a 70-cent dollar is a deliberate attempt to subvert the public conscience. The standard silver dollar is 100 cents and the clasp-trap about the 70-cent dollar is simply an assault upon the dictionary. Free coinage will wipe out the disparity between coin and bullion, and the value of our silver dollar the world over will be of the same value as the metal in it. What the value of the dollar will be, as expressed in gold, may be another question. Competent students have insisted it would restore the old ratio between gold and silver bullion. The gentleman from Ohio, Harter, has sent out notices to the Grand Army posts asking them to protest against the passage of the bill. I have been an old soldier and I cannot forget I enlisted when gold and silver were the only legal tender currency. I received depreciated paper and never heard a howl from the fellows who represented the banking interests of the country. This duplicity did not fool the old soldiers. The people I represent are not anarchists; they are not opposed to the accumulation of wealth, but they believe that wealth distribution, if permitted to follow the natural laws, will be proportioned to skill, economy and labor employed. That man must be blind who does not see that wealth is becoming the great political power in this country. The people are organized and will never cease this agitation until corporations and monopolies have bowed in obedience to just laws."

THE EVENING SESSION.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—At the evening session Combs and Bacon, of New York, and Page of Missouri, opposed the bill. Livingston, of Georgia, in advocating the bill said if congress did not now hear the voice of the people the time would soon come when that voice would be heard. Speaking of the contest in the Democratic party in New York, Livingston said Hill and Cleveland meant nothing more or less than silver and anti-silver.

Harter interrupted with the query: "Do you mean to say Hill is in favor of free coinage?"

"Well, now," replied Livingston, "will you vote for him if he is?"

"No, sir," replied Harter with emphasis, amid applause and laughter. Brosius, of Pennsylvania; Hayes, of Ohio; Chapin, of New York; Wafer, of Massachusetts; and Huntington, of New York, opposed the measure, and Abbott, of Texas; Townsend, of Colorado; Whiting, of Michigan; and Layton, of Ohio, advocated it.

BEHRING SEA.

Some of the Correspondence of Lord Salisbury.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The correspondence consists, it is understood, of two notes; the first being Lord Salisbury's cable note of the 18th, and the reply from the president, dated yesterday. It is broadly intimated the implied disposition on the part of Great Britain to resist any interference by this government with vessels flying the English flag engaged in pelagic sealing in Behring sea would undoubtedly result in the rejection of a treaty in the present form.

Lord Salisbury does not in his note refuse to enter into a modus vivendi of some kind, but diplomatically speaking he fails to consent to the proposition made by this government. Inasmuch as the senate has refused to make the correspondence public, it is difficult to get a clear idea of the points intended to be conveyed, but undoubtedly the impression generally conveyed was that Lord Salisbury refused to renew last year's arrangement. It can be stated that there is nothing in the nature of an ultimatum on the part of either government in the correspondence laid before the senate. It is still considered incomplete, but underlying the formal phraseology of diplomacy is the evident intention on the part of this government to bring the matter to a point of definite determination before the sealing season is far advanced. The president's reply, it is thought, will greatly tend to the attainment of the desired result.

All Was Quiet.

NEW YORK, March 24.—James Coleman Drayton and Hallett Alton Burrows, arrived with no evidence of a sanguinary meeting as anticipated by interested persons this side of the water. Their trouble arose out of Burrows' intimacy with Mrs. Drayton, and culminated in the injured husband seeking satisfaction at arms. Shortly afterward a revenue cutter with fourteen on board left the dock, and notwithstanding orders to the contrary, when the steamer was reached the whole party clambered aboard. There was no evidence of any unusual excitement aboard. Captain Parsell, on the bridge, when questioned by the energetic reporters received them with blank amazement. "I know nothing of any trouble between these two gentlemen. They have been very quiet during the trip. I heard nothing about a duel, either aboard the Majestic or anywhere else. This is all news to me." Burrows and Milbank were discovered later. Both were greatly startled at what they deemed the intrusion of reporters. They were informed that marked attention was given to their personal affair.

Miners' Bodies Found.

DUNBAR, Pa., March 24.—Though denied by nine officials, it is positively reported that the bodies of twenty-two of the thirty-one miners entombed in the Hill farm mine in June 1890, have been recovered. One of the men in the rescuing party said yesterday that three weeks ago they drew out the water from No. 9 flat and discovered that fire had not done any damage in that flat, and the men working there must have died of suffocation. Within the past twenty months work has been carried on under difficulties next to insurmountable, but the end has come. Before the week is over the bodies of the unfortunate men who perished will be brought to the surface. The work has been terrible, the stretch awful and searchers have had to use barrels of lime to purify the air.

Caught Just in Time.

SAN DIEGO, March 24.—John Stetson, awaiting sentence in the county jail for burglary, was caught in an attempt to break out yesterday. He had dug a hole nearly through the wall to the yard, and in a short time longer there would have been a general jail delivery. There are a large number of criminals in the jail, including two murderers. Stetson was placed in a tank, and as he had a prior conviction against him, he will undoubtedly receive a severe sentence.

Trial of the Wife Murderer.

PERTH, West Australia, March 24.—Hearing in the case of Deeming, the wife murderer, was resumed yesterday. Counsel are trying by illegal means to prevent his being sent to Melbourne, also to prevent extradition to England for murdering his first wife and four children. However, the efforts will prove unavailing and Deeming will be sent to Melbourne for trial. It is not thought he will have to go to England, as the police of Melbourne claim to have evidence that will be beyond a doubt result in his conviction and execution there.

Three Prospectors Murdered.

BRAZORIA, Tex., March 24.—All the lower coast country is stirred up over the finding of the bodies of three men in Bernard river horribly mutilated and each of them bearing the marks of foul play. Ten days ago a party of five, one a Mexican, was seen in the vicinity prospecting. The Mexican was their guide. Their wagon was found near the river burned except the ironwork and a piece of the body on which was the

name of the owner. It is thought the prospectors were murdered by the Mexican and a white partner. The country is armed seeking for the suspected parties.

Murdered by Ruffians.

EL PASO, Tex., March 24.—Another murder has been committed in the Bosque above the city and near the spot where the two strangers were killed four weeks ago. Benito Castro is the victim this time. According to his wife's statement, Albert F. Brown, Marcus Medina, Eduardo Ortega and Virginio Gonzales appeared at the Castro house at an early hour this morning and demanded admittance. Castro's wife opened the door and permitted Brown and Gonzales to enter. Castro, who was asleep, was aroused and told to dress and accompany them. This he proceeded to do, and Brown and Gonzales joined their gang outside while Castro was getting into his clothes. His wife, fearing trouble, closed and locked the door behind them, and refused to open it when ordered to do so by the ruffians. Without further ceremony, they began shooting through the door. At the first volley Castro gave a cry and fell to the floor mortally wounded. No cause is assigned for the killing. Sheriff Hillebrand today captured all of the parties but Gonzales, who, it is feared, has escaped into Mexico.

New Jersey Cleveland Men.

JERSEY CITY, March 24.—The initial meeting of the Cleveland Democratic association of New Jersey was held here yesterday afternoon. Nearly all of the twenty-one counties of the state were represented, and delegates claimed the existence of an overwhelming demand for the nomination of Cleveland. The finance committee and treasurer were chosen, and a careful canvass of the state provided for.

A Democrat Resigns.

ATLANTA, March 24.—Colonel J. H. Estell has resigned his membership in the national Democratic executive committee, in which he represented the state of Georgia.
