OREGON'S COMMISSION.—Hon. Robt. Clow of Junction came down today to attend the meeting of the railroad commissioners. There was no quorum and the regular meeting will be held next Monday. Mr. Clow went to Omaha and was largely responsible for the settlement of the suits with the Union Pacific officials. He there met with General Supt. Thurston, discussed the whole situation with him and as a result an adjustment was reached that took the whole matter out of the courts and gave the people reduced rates. He believes the same thing could have been done if the commission had gone to San Francisco in the S. P. Co. rate case. But he says the commission were afraid of the charge that they were sure would be made that they were merely on a junketing tour, and so did not go. The commission is rapidly gaining ground in the confidence of the shipping public and has done hard work the past three months.

HORSES AND COLTS.

Better Exertions to be Made to Bring Out a Big Colt Show.

Saturday afternoon after the station show, the annual meeting of the Willamette Valley Horse Breeders' association was held. The election of officers resulted in a re-election of the old ones: T. C. Shaw, president; Ab. Hodson, secretary; and H. Fletcher, treasurer. The executive committee consists of the president and Messrs. Beckwith and Tanner. W. J. Simeral, county stock inspector and Ed. T. Judd were elected members of the association.

May 28th, the last Saturday in that month, was set for the day to hold the colt show, all colts under 3 to be eligible.
J. A. Tanner and J. T. Beckwith acted as marshals Saturday in a satisfactory manner. The unfavorable weather cut down the attendance, but the managers had every reason to be satisfied with the result, as the quality of the horses shown was fine.

BIG CASH SWEEPSTAKES.

The executive committee was unanimously instructed to ask each owner of imported draft horses to give \$5 for a sweepstake for the best colt of that breed, also that owners of grade draft horses be solicited to give same amount each for that class. The money is to be paid to the committee by May 21st, and the age of the colts will be taken into consideration. Owners of French coach and standard bred horses are asked to do the same.
