About seven persons attended the meeting at the Willamette at 2:30 p. m. For an annual meeting of a society of sixty enrolled members, for so good a cause as the American Humane society work this is not creditable to Salem. If half the people who have lodged complaints with the officers of the society during the past year and had them looked after would attend there would have been a large attendance. The work should not be dropped now. At considerable expense it has been introduced in the public schools and several clergymen have had their sympathies awakened. Let there be a good attendance Friday at same place at 2 p. m., to which time the meeting adjourned. A city of this size should not be without a well-organized, strongly-supported Humane society. The annual election of officers and payment of dues, Friday at 2 p. m.

THE SPEED ASSOCIATION

Decide to Incorporate and a Committee Appointed to Solicit Subscriptions of Stock.

H. W. Cottle was placed in the chair, and Secretary B. O. Vonbok, klen read the minutes. Articles of incorporation are being prepared, providing for a capital stock of \$2500, or 100 shares at \$25 each. Dr. Keene stated that the law required one-half the stock to be subscribed. Messrs. Cottle, Irwin and Claggett were appointed as a committee to prepare articles of incorporation. The gentlemen interested are going ahead to arrange for holding a spring race meeting. Mr. Vonbok klen said the name should be changed to give it more than a local name, and upon motion the name Oregon Breeders and Speed association was adopted, the intention being to take charge of the annual stallion and colt shows, as the organization is now completed, and stock is being subscribed. A special program is being arranged, and a lease will be completed with the state fair board, so as to advertise the meeting as early as possible. Messrs. Vonbok klen, Hatch and Whitley were appointed a committee on drafting by-laws.

WORKING REPUBLICANS.—The working Republicans of Marion and other counties, who believe in a Republican victory at the polls should buckle on their armor and circulate good Republican papers. THE BALLOT LAW.—Under the Australian ballot law the secretary of the Republican county convention is required to make out certificates of nomination for each candidate nominated. This has to be sworn to before a notary by the secretary, and also by the presiding officer of the convention. L. F. Conn has carefully prepared the certificate of the nominees and forwarded it to Mr. Toole at Woodburn for his endorsement under oath. The law requires each candidate to file an acceptance within 15 days with the county clerk, and notice will be sent to the nominees to that effect. The complete official county ticket will appear in the next JOURNAL.

A CRYING EVIL.—A vag and a drunk got five days each of the city recorder this morning. These men will cost the city \$1.00 a day each for board at a restaurant, and it is a shame that these men are not put to work on the streets, as the city council has repeatedly ordered to be done. There must be some solution of this problem. At present the game is not worth the powder, and drunks and vags might as well be let alone as to be a source of expense to the taxpayer. They are not worth a dollar a day to work for the city, but a rockpile to work at would deter a good many from becoming subject to arrest.

SCARLET FEVER.—In a mild form this disease has made considerable progress, mostly in North Salem. Attendance at the schools has run down over fifty per cent in some rooms, and many persons think the schools should be closed. Some action should certainly be taken to prevent this disease so dangerous to children becoming epidemic. There should be some public steps taken to restrain intercourse among children before it is spread to all parts or the city.
