MILLS AND GREENWOOD.

Monday Evening's Initial Meeting a Success.

THE GREAT REVIVALIST ARRIVES.

Salem Worked Up to the Top Notch of Excitement.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE met at the M. E. church parlors at 2:30 Monday to conclude all arrangements. \$203 was reported subscribed, but \$50 more will be needed to defray extra expenses.

Mr. Mills and Mr. Greenwood received no compensation and no collections will be taken at any of these meetings for these gentlemen. They receive gratuitous gifts from such persons as feel prompted to give. The executive committee also authorized F. N. Gilbert to procure 250 more chairs and also to make ample provision for an overflow meeting in the lecture room, to be conducted by an able speaker and with good music. The two rooms on each side of the choir are also to be floored, and will seat fifty each. J. H. Rook, James Aitken and Wm. Benson are in charge of that and when complete the church will seat one thousand people.

THE EVENING MEETING was well attended. It was an experience meeting for the twenty-five ushers who began to practice on packing people in like crackers, beginning in the corners and nearest up in front and filling every seat as they came back. All but three back rows were filled Monday night. MR. GREENWOOD'S SINGING was the feature of the evening, besides a fine exposition of James IV, 17, by Rev. Williams, of the Christian church. The speaker is logical and scriptural. Mr. Greenwood is above 35, slender in build, and wears a short beard, a tenor singing with a very sweet voice, playing his own accompaniment. He sang only one piece, "Eternity," arriving only just before the meeting closed.

MORNING MEETINGS. There were nearly fifty at the first 8:30 a. m., meeting for men only. These meetings are made a great feature of the revival work everywhere and probably will be here.

THE AFTERNOON MEETING is at 3:30 and is for men and women and is just as important as the evening meeting. Mr. Mills' first appearance at this meeting was warmly greeted. He was an ordained Congregational minister, and served as such nine years, his last pastorate being at Rutland, Vt. Mr. Mills goes from here to Tacoma, then to Oakland and San Francisco. He is a very pleasant spoken man, with a keen face and brilliant eyes, and greets reporters and everybody in a frank and happy manner. Messrs. Mills and Greenwood are at the Willamette.

TONIGHT the doors will open at 7 o'clock, meeting begins at 7:30.

DAILY PROGRAM. 8:30 a. m.—Prayer meeting for men only. 2:15—Ladies' service. 3:30—Sermon by Mr. Mills. 6:45—Ushers' prayer meeting. 7:30—General meeting. Doors open at 7. Singing by the large choir at 7:20.

No one will be admitted during prayer or while Mr. Greenwood is singing. No one will be permitted to leave at close of service until the benediction has been pronounced.

FOR CLERK TOO.—A reporter found Wm. Chambers at Hotel Willamette this morning, and asked him if he was a candidate for sheriff. THE RAILS ARRIVE.

The Astoria Railroad An Assured Fact.

FOUR SHIPLOADS OF RAILS AT ASTORIA.

The Property of Huntington to Build Connections with the Southern Pacific.

A report was flashed over the wires and caught by a vigilant JOURNAL reporter early Monday morning to the effect that four shiploads of rails had arrived in the Columbia for the new Astoria railroad.

All efforts to trace it down to headquarters were unavailing. The nearest that could be learned were the rails were the property of S. P. Huntington and would be used on his lines from Woodburn across the valley and possibly to Astoria.

The Salem board of trade Tuesday night heard the following letter read. It was addressed to the chairman of the railroad committee, and dated Astoria, March 30.

H. W. COTTLE, Esq.,

Salem, Oregon. Dear Sir:—Your favor of the 25th inst. in regard to railroad and matters noted. I have not yet had opportunity of time to consult with our committee on railroad subsidy, so as to give your people answer at this time. Therefore will write you further in a few days and give you the views of our representative men on the subject. I consider your people are on the right track. Yours truly, I. W. CASE.

The Astoria railroad is creating quite a boom in that town. Spokane has just given a million in lands and money to get the Hill system in there, and is also enjoying a big boom. Whether Salem follows suit depends much upon local activity. Many people are sighing for a B. Bay Mills to revive interest in a trans-valley road.

TURF TOPICS.

Second to Longfellow on the list of winning sires for the year of 1891 comes imported St. Blaise.

An Australian jockey has been fined in a Melbourne police court for cruelly whipping his pony in a race.

J. W. Marr, the well known trainer, thinks that Post Scout will be able to cope with the best horses in training next season.

J. Malcolm Forbes calls his great horse Arvon, and as this is correct, he hopes that the pronouncement will become general.

There will be a bill introduced in the legislature of Maryland this year making it a crime to enter horses in classes where they do not belong.

The Jewett stock farm pacer, Frank Smith, said to have paced an eighth of a mile in fourteen seconds, is by Coronet out of Mario Scott, 224, by Hiatoga.

Four trotters were recently sold within a month for a total of \$191,500, as follows: Arion, \$125,000; Constantine, \$27,000; Baby McKee, \$23,000; Worth, \$14,500.

J. S. Ferguson, who bought Baby McKee for Mr. Frederic P. Olcott at the recent Kellogg sale for \$25,000, remarked afterward that he was authorized to go as high as \$30,000.

In Australia at the Mitta Mitta races, on Boxing Day, a jockey named Walter Douglas rode the winner of the whole six races on the card, including the winner of a hurdle race.

Ed Geers thinks he can drive Belle Hamlin and Globe a mile double in 2:10 this year. The pole record is 2:13 1/4, and was made by Belle Hamlin and Justina, but Geers says Globe is faster than Justina in double rig.

RAILROAD JOTTINGS.

There are 382 miles of street railway in operation in Philadelphia.

The New York, Susquehanna and Western has decided to erect new shops at North Paterson, N. J.

The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy is going to establish a plant at Colchester, Ia., for producing burnt clay ballast.

Both the Pullman and Wagner Palace Car companies have withdrawn the sleeping cars that have been run through to San Francisco once a week since Jan. 1.

The Empire State express on the New York Central has a record of 147 miles in 150 minutes, including a five minute stop. The run was made between Albany and Syracuse.

The Adirondack and St. Lawrence is building a deck girder bridge with three spans, each seventy-three feet long and one span sixty-eight feet long across the Kuyahowa river, below Poland, N. Y.

A stretch of track across the pampas on the new Argentine Pacific railroad is 211 miles in length without a curve, a single bridge or opening larger than a drain or an embankment more than a yard in height.

A new viaduct over the River Lea, in Bolivia, for the Antofagasta railroad is described as the highest viaduct in the world. It is 9,535 feet above the sea level, and the height of the viaduct above the river is 4,008 feet. It is 10,497 feet long, the highest pillar is 3,738 feet, and the weight of the structure is 9,115 tons.

WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.

Denmark will spend about \$5,500 in showing, as a leading feature of its World's fair exhibit, a Danish dairy, complete and in operation.

An Ohio World's fair commissioner has estimated that the exhibitors from his state will spend upward of \$5,000,000 in the preparation of their exhibits.

The California building at the fair will be an imposing structure of the "old mission" type, 110 by 500 feet, with a dome, and costing about \$75,000. It will be surrounded by a hedge of Monterey cypress.

Vermont will have a building at the exposition without drawing on the state appropriation for the cost of its erection. One hundred substantial citizens have guaranteed \$10,000 for that purpose, each one pledging himself to pay \$100.

Chief Samuels, of the horticultural department, has returned from a trip to Florida and Cuba, where he stimulated interest in the exposition and secured the promise of many fine palms and other tropical plants, to be exhibited in his department.

Michigan's building will measure 100 by 140 feet and be three stories high. It will be constructed of Michigan material, which with the furnishings will be donated. Though but \$20,000 of the appropriation will be devoted to its erection, it will in reality be a \$50,000 building.

THE LATEST NOVELTIES.

Tall, slender and tankard shaped are the new cut glass pitchers. Yellow holds its own among the large vases for palms and plants.

A new dinner service has broken gold edges, shaded brown borders and purple flower decorations.

Small pieces of gilded furniture painted with corn flowers and carnations are among things desirable.

French salad plates with comic pictures and explanatory legends help conversation at the dinner table.

A white crystal ewer with red and gold decoration, has inscribed on an ornamental ribbon, "Mecenant sont les buveurs d'eau."

Hock glasses of cut glass are stained with yellow, red, green, purple, blue shading from the edges down to the clear white stems.

A china cylindrical receptacle which simulates the Turkish "Mecenant" is intended to hold bottled chestnuts and is called a marroniere.—Jewellers' Circular.
