CANT FOOL THE PEOPLE.

The People's party has nominated a ticket, not with any hope of electing a single man upon it, but to show independence of the old parties. The principles they advocate, with few exceptions, have been championed by the Democratic party for years, and whenever that party has been in control the reforms have been carried out.—Eugene Guard.

The People's party people know what they are about. They possess common intelligence, and if what the Guard claims were true, there would be no need of any People's party. How about a Democratic congress with 150 majority defeating a free silver bill? Is that the way you carry out People's party reforms?

How is it in Linn county? It has always been Democratic, and on a straight issue is so yet. In fact, it is entitled to its claim of being the "banner" Democratic county, though on occasions Umattila has even beaten Linn in Democratic votes.

If what the Eugene Guard says is true there would be no need of a People's party in Linn or Umattila counties. But there is a very strong third party there. The Portland Telegram complains because the people of Linn county do not seem to rest content with the kind of a deal the Democratic ring at Albany gives them.

It says: Notwithstanding the exceptionally good record of the Linn county Democracy, there are some men up there who are dissatisfied, who want something new, who have gone off into the third party movement. A good many of them are, or have been, Democrats.

Is it wise? Is it necessary? Would it not be better to keep the good, safe, economical government they have so long enjoyed rather than take chances with the Republicans?

The people of Linn county do not seem to be aware of any "good, safe, economical government." THE JOURNAL does not question the wisdom of the people up there in Linn, or Lane either, in organizing or voting a People's party ticket. These are Democratic counties. The false assumption that if you only will put the Democratic party in power you "will get good government, is so weak and silly that it cannot stand alone. It is antiquated partisan r.t.

It is just as ridiculous to pretend or claim that good government must always result by putting Republicans in power. It is a relic of the dark ages to assume that any one political party is a guaranty for good government. THE JOURNAL, while it welcomes and encourages all such movements, whereby the people trample upon the schemes of politicians, wrest the government from them and restore power directly to the hands of the people. We welcome the People's party movement in Marion county if it will help the people to lower taxes, reform our county government and assist in electing good, clean, honest men. We do not endorse any of their cranky notions nor political impossibilities by which they flitter away many of their opportunities for doing the good which they might. No sensible man can endorse them and only the irrational, unthinking theorist can or does. But we despise the assumption of the Eugene Guard that by merely putting the Democratic party in power and keeping it there every thing will be all right. This old assumption of divine wisdom on the part of any party, or of wisdom superior to that of the people, is a part of the rotten and decaying lie of the divine right of certain ones to govern. It gives the lie to the whole theory of our government, that self-government by the people is possible. A reform in our politics becomes impossible the moment that idea is allowed. The true and only right theory for any man to hold in regard to a political party is that it is a means and not an end and that he endorses it only so far as it is true to the welfare of the masses. As THE JOURNAL has repeatedly expressed itself, it has no use for any party—not even the Republican party—any further than it is now and in the living present useful to the people. When a party ceases to serve the common interests of the masses it has only one divine right and that is to die.

ABOLISH THE GOVERNMENT MONOPOLY OF ENVELOPE PRINTING.

The Typothete of Portland, at a meeting held March 15, 1892, instructed the undersigned to communicate with the employing printers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, on the subject of this great injustice to the printing trade. We call attention to the government monopoly of the envelope printing trade:

As is well known any person can, upon making application to a postmaster, purchase 500 or more stamped envelopes with his name and business address printed thereon as a "return card," and have same delivered at his postoffice by the government without other charge than the schedule rate for the plain stamped envelopes—in other words no charge is made for their printing. The extent of this practice has reached enormous proportions, and a careful computation places the quantity thus supplied at 250,000,000 annually.

This is a clear deprivation to the printers of this country of an annual revenue of \$50,000 computing the value of the printing at \$1 per 1000. This advantage to the mercantile community, to the injustice of the printers, cannot be defended upon the principle of governmental advantages for the people, inasmuch as it is made use of principally, if not entirely, by firms and corporations who are better able to pay for what they get than are the smaller concerns which do not, and in some cases cannot, make use of the privilege.

The government has no right, under the authority granted it, to set up opposition to private enterprise, and to invade the field wherein private industry works for its daily sustenance.

THE JOURNAL takes pleasure in uniting with the Portland Typothete in asking the Oregon delegation to favor a repeal of this law. The job printers of the country are entitled to this business.

FROM HONOLULU

And Items From Other Parts of the World.

FEARS OF A REVOLT.

Preparations to Barricade the Royal Palace at Honolulu.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—Various rumors which have appeared at different times lately in the American papers received an apparent outward confirmation here on the morning of Monday, March 28, when the curbing surrounding the royal palace was found piled breast high with sand bags. The situation was explained by the statement that the barricades were placed there as a protection against an expected raid from a party of malcontents under the leadership of Robert W. Wilcox, who has heretofore made a record in that line. Early risers had also seen guns in position, and the rumors were magnified to such an extent that considerable uneasiness was felt among the local people and a large number of visiting strangers.

Your correspondent visited the place at 7:30 a. m., and found sand bags to the number of about 1200 placed in position along two sides of the protecting curb of the palace, and on further close investigation found two Kuapua breach-loading cannons concealed beneath tarpaulins at either side of the steps leading to the basement of the palace. Inquiry of Minister of Foreign Affairs Parker and of Governor Cleghorn elicited only the information that they knew nothing of the preparations for defense and had no knowledge of any intended revolution, and absolved themselves from all responsibility in the affair. Governor Cleghorn, father of Princess Kaiulani, was very indignant as was also Minister Parker at what they termed as these unwarranted preparations, and blame was laid on Marshal Wilson, the head of the household troops.

THE FREE WOOL BILL.

The Minority Led by Burrows, of Michigan.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The Republicans of the house, for the first time this season, resorted to filibustering yesterday, and the enormous Democratic majority of two-thirds found it impossible to overcome the skillful tactics of Representative Burrows and force the wool bill to a vote. It has been rumored for some time that the Democrats would attempt to pass the Springer bill before the close of the legislative day in order that it might have political effect in aiding the Democrats to carry Rhode Island. Whatever intentions there may have been some days ago of rushing this bill through the house, there is no doubt that the plan was finally abandoned before the departure of Chairman Springer on Monday for Virginia beach. It has been generally understood by members that it had been agreed by the committee on ways and means, Democrats and Republicans alike, that immediately after the house went into a committee of the whole a vote should be taken without debate on it. Burrows' amendment was pending, to strike out words from the first section, and the effect of this amendment is intended to strike out the sense of the bill, but when McMillin closed the debate on the first section, and the debate being limited to one hour, the Republicans moved that two hours be accorded. Pending discussion of the question, Speaker Crisp spoke sharply to Burrows, in a manner which that gentleman resented, and compelled Republicans to resort to filibustering to accomplish their ends. Under the rules the Democrats were powerless, and the house finally adjourned. There is no intention on the part of the committee to resort to cloture, and
