

Vice-Consul Blacklock will act as agent. It is rumored that the steamer will be discontinued calling here, it being stated that it does not pay them to make the stop. The steamer company are quoting rates on freight much lower than the steamer line at present, but it is expected the former company will finish its labors here by the end of the year, leaving the transportation field clear to steamers.

The Trouble in Buenos Ayres.
RIO JANEIRO, April 15.—The state of siege in this city has been raised, all further danger of immediate trouble having passed away, owing to President Peixoto's energetic measures. The arrest of Conde Leopoldina is confirmed. Viscount Mello was taken into custody at the same time. The state of Matto Grosso has announced that it is a new republic, and has assumed the name of Trans-Atlantic. With the exception of one battalion, all troops in the river squadron are in favor of the revolutionists. The new republic sent envoys to Argentina, Paraguay and Bolivia to ask recognition of its independence. The insurgents are well supplied with food, arms, money and torpedoes, but are wanting in discipline in their army organization.

The Behring Sea Claims.
OTTAWA, April 15.—G. E. Y. Giesendorf, of the Imperial Treasury department, and A. J. Rose, assistant secretary of the National Marine Insurance Company of London, who have been appointed commissioners to examine into the claims for compensation due to the operation of the Anglo-American modus vivendi in Behring sea last season, will remain here until Monday. A majority of the sealers have already filed claims at Victoria, but as the time for entering the claims does not expire until the 28th inst., the commissioners do not propose to reach Victoria much before that date.

New Cable Line.
WASHINGTON, April 15.—The Thetis will sail from San Francisco about Saturday next on the work of surveying a line for the cable between the Pacific coast and the Sandwich Islands. The Thetis goes out to complete the survey begun by the Albatross, which was taken off for duty in the Behring sea. She will lay down the two lines, and is expected to return to this country in the course of the next two months. The transfer of the Albatross to the Thetis has caused some delay, and those in charge of the work expect that the completion of the survey will be further delayed by the substitution of the Thetis, which is a much slower ship than the Albatross.

RESERVATION OPENED.

The Race for Land and Town Sites.

TO THE STRONG.

Opening of the Sisseton Reservation Today.

ST. PAUL, April 15.—Reports from the Sisseton reservation indicate the weather is all that can be desired for the opening today, but the conditions under foot are most unfavorable, the whole country is a sea of mud and water and the race for choice selections will be to the strong instead of to the swift. Sunrise disclosed long lines of homes and town site boomers, stretched along the boundaries of the reservation, held back only by the guns of the soldiers and fear that their claims will be thrown out if they crossed in advance. Promptly at noon signal guns gave the word to go. Barnard, a bugler, announced it at Brown Valley and as the note resounded from the hill top, the rapid firing of musketry along the line carried the word to the eager multitude who started off at break-neck pace for the promised land. Last night a party of nearly two hundred under the leadership of Oklahoma Charlie, attempted to cross Lake Travers in the darkness and gain the reservation. A drunken member of the party let the matter out, a detachment of soldiers met them as they landed and confiscated their boats, drove them from the reservation.

NEBRASKA DEMOCRATS.

They Have a Stormy Time in Convention.

OMAHA, April 15.—The Democratic state convention ratified the nomination for delegates made by the congressional districts, and then proceeded to the selection of delegates at large. Governor Boyd was elected to head the delegation by a practically unanimous vote. The committee on resolutions then reported, declaring a steadfast adherence to the Democratic platform of 1884 and Cleveland's tariff policy; denouncing the McKinley law; favoring liberal pensions; and the regulation of railroad and telegraph rates by the state.

At the conclusion of the platform, Congressman Bryan offered a resolution favoring free coinage of silver. An uproar ensued. Congressman Bryan spoke in favor of the resolution, supported by delegates from the eastern part of the state, but other leaders of the party were against him. After a hot debate, lasting three hours, the roll was called. When Chairman Beatty announced the defeat of the resolution by 247 to 229, pandemonium broke loose. The silver men made a rush for the stage, and mounting the recorder's table shrieked that they had been beaten by fraud. Finally quiet was restored, and the result of the vote verified. After selecting alternates for the national convention, the convention adjourned.

BOLD TRAIN ROBBERY.

Daring Plunder of an Express Car in Louisiana.

NEW ORLEANS, April 15.—A daring and successful robbery was committed last night when seventy-five miles of this city. When passenger train No. 2, of the Illinois Central, north-bound, reached Hammond station, a man boarded the engine, thrust revolvers in the faces of the engineer and fireman, and ordered them to go ahead. The command was obeyed and the train ran into Independence, where a switch was taken up and No. 3 passed. The south-bound train had scarcely flitted by when two confederates of the individual on the engine jumped on board, and at N. S. some miles the engineer was ordered to halt. The engineer and fireman were instructed to go to the express car and order the messenger to open the car, which they complied with, and an entrance was effected by the robbers. The safe was emptied of its contents and the robbers disappeared in the darkness, leaving the mail and passengers undisturbed. The train proceeded on its way. Superintendent Fisher, of the express company, said the robbers would hardly get \$3000. A posse with bloodhounds is searching for the robbers.

THE RAUM INVESTIGATION.

Extraordinary Testimony Given by Pension Attorney Morgan.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—There were many discrepancies in the testimony of J. P. Morgan, the Indian pension attorney, before the Raum investigating committee yesterday. Although he testified he received a telegram from his wife saying her sickness was more serious and asked to be excused on that account, he was compelled to admit that he had not received such a telegram. J. P. Greenwalt, special examiner of the pension office, denied the commissioner had directed him to connect Cooper with the printed slip matter, and said he thought of nothing out of deposition he thought material, nor excluded any statements because they tended to exonerate Cooper. The committee adopted a resolution calling the attention to the extraordinary character of the testimony of Morgan, but made no recommendation.

Government Paper Mill Burns.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Secretary of treasury has been notified that the paper mill at Pittsfield, Mass., at which the distinctive paper used by the government in printing the paper by which the currency is manufactured, was burned last night with nearly all the stock on hand. The stock paper now in the hands of the government limited and A. P. Huntington, Chief of Division of Loans and Currency, has gone to see about starting another mill and to prevent any of the unburned paper getting into unauthorized hands.

Terrific Hail Storm.

COLUMBIA, S. C., April 15.—The most terrific hail storm that ever visited this state occurred at Bennettsville yesterday. Some hail stones said to have been two inches in diameter covered the ground to a depth of six inches. Many chickens and hogs were killed, all the windows in town broken and great damage was done to grain, vegetables and small fruits.

Georgia Republicans.

ATLANTA, April 15.—The Republicans wrangled almost all night over the permanent chairmanship, with much tumult. The convention nearly all is composed of negroes. At about 5 o'clock, D. H. Lock, postmaster at Macon, was chosen. The convention then chose delegates at large to the national convention. They are still in session, awaiting the report of the committee to select the state central committee.

Russia Preparations.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 15.—The council of the empire has adopted a series of drastic measures which indicate that preparations are being made for war. All private railways and steamers will be taken by the government in case the troops are ordered mobilized. Severe penalties are provided against giving information of the plans of the government abroad.

Charged With Murder.

ROSEBURG, Apr. 15.—Arthur Wright, a 15-year-old boy, was brought down from Riddle and lodged in the county jail charged with murdering Chester Pogue. The boys quarreled on the way from school, separating at Cow Creek bridge. Wright dared Pogue back to the bridge. The latter returned and a fight ensued, in which Wright stabbed Pogue several times in the abdomen with a large pocket-knife, from the effects of which he soon after died.

Porter Ordered to Rome.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 15.—Minister A. G. Porter has received a telegram from Blaine this morning, instructing him to return to Rome, as the difficulties with Italy are settled. He leaves Saturday or Sunday.

Black Small Pox.

VIENNA, April 15.—An epidemic of black small pox is raging in Poland, especially on the Galician frontier, the disease is very virulent, most of those attacked dying on the third day.

Women's Suffrage.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 15.—Assembly has passed a bill giving women the right of suffrage at all state elections.

Requested to Resign.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Secretary Foster has requested the resignation of John E. Millholland, chief Inspector of the Immigration bureau, New York City.

Became a Sleet Storm.

BALTIMORE, April 15.—The rain storm of yesterday and last night became a sleet storm this morning.

THE HETHERINGTON TRIAL.

Particulars of the Case From Yokohama Papers.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—The Yokohama papers, which arrived on the steamer China, contain reports of the first three days' proceedings of the trial of Lieutenant Hetherington for the shooting of Gower Robinson. In his address for the prosecution H. C. Litchfield dwelt upon the fact that Robinson and Hetherington had a quarrel on January 1, and had been separated by friends. Then the matter seemed to be dropped. Litchfield claimed Hetherington's acts showed that he shot Robinson in cold blood and that his act was premeditated. The testimony of those who witnessed the shooting was similar to that given at the inquest. The only new testimony was given by Constable McCanee, of the United States consulate, and by Lieutenant Rogers, of the Marion. The constable testified that when Hetherington came to the consulate immediately after the shooting he was greatly excited. Witness heard him say, as he walked up and down waiting impatiently for the consul general to appear: "Oh, if I had only followed my first impulse and had used that whip. I tried to scare him, only I lost control of myself." Lieutenant Rogers testified that he was a friend of Hetherington; then he added: "I went with him to the Union club on the 1st of January, and with him saw Gower Robinson. Mr. Read was there, as well as some others. We went there with the intention of horsewhipping Robinson. Hetherington was very much excited at the time, but he was pacified, and no whipping was done. In February I saw Read, and gave him to understand that Robinson was coming back, if so that there would be trouble, and asked him to keep Robinson from coming back." In cross-examination, the lieutenant said Read declared he had washed his hands of the whole matter since January 1. Read remarked that it would be better to let Robinson come back and take his whipping, as it would do him good. The trial then went over to March 31.

A New Phase of the Trouble in Wyoming.

CHEYENNE, April 15.—There is great doubt if any of the Pinkerton mercenaries, who have been smuggling into Johnson county to shoot the ranchmen, will ever come out alive. The fight in Big Horn basin is not, as has been stated, between the cattlemen and the rustlers, but between the big cattle companies and the ranchmen, who are fencing the fertile land. Some cattle have been stolen, and this has been magnified to such an extent that the people generally believe that the inhabitants of the basin are thieves. Now that the Pinkertons are in the basin, they will find it hard to get out. The mercenaries were organized in Denver and brought to this point on a special train, when they were herded into the isolated country by their masters, ostensibly to prevent cattle stealing, but really to exterminate the peaceable ranchers. The situation is desperate. Everybody knows the facts, but every man fears his neighbor and refuses to talk. Governor Barber declines to send the militia into the field, saying he has no knowledge, officially, of any trouble in Johnson county, but everybody knows that men are being killed there daily. The sheriff of the county is a man who is in sympathy with the small ranchmen. He is a man of great nerve, and if, as is clearly his duty to do so, he should call on the citizens to assist him in arresting this armed force, that has, without authority of law, invaded his county, he could quickly gather about him 200 to 300 cowboys who are familiar with the country and at home in the saddle, and in the event, there is little chance of the invading party getting out alive. While the majority of the small ranchmen are honest and industrious, they are all desperate and daring, with but very few cowards. And though this invading party may be only after a few of the worst thieves, the small ranchmen do not know whom they have on their list, so that it puts each and every one of them on the defensive.

MICHIGAN REPUBLICANS.

DETROIT, April 15.—The Republican state convention yesterday chose delegates to the national convention. The platform endorses the work of the 51st congress, and demands effective legislation by congress to secure integrity and purity of elections; approval of the forceful, fearless and dignified policy of the administration of President Harrison, who is so ably assisted by the noble, patriotic statesman, James G. Blaine. The last plank in the platform is as follows: "While the Republicans of Michigan recognize the sterling worth and ability of our distinguished fellow citizen, Gen. Russell A. Alger, whose claim to recognition as a presidential standard bearer is familiar to the people of the nation since his name was first presented to the Chicago convention in 1885, we can safely leave to the collective judgment of the representatives of the party at Minneapolis in June next the selection of a leader to lead our hosts to victory at the polls in November, pledging to the nominee our unqualified co-operation and unwavering devotion." The reference to Alger was received with enthusiasm, and the resolutions were adopted amid cheers.
