The Platform Adopted and Ticket Put Up.

PENNOYER ENDORSED.

A Big Convention and Fairly Harmonious—Notes on the Proceedings.

The convention met at 3:15 after adjournment.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.
The committee recommended that delegates to the state convention be elected by a vote of the convention, each delegate being placed in nomination before the convention.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.
The report of the convention was adopted as follows:
Committee on order of business reported recommending that the nominations be made in the following order: Sheriff, clerk, judge, commissioner, recorder, assessor, treasurer, surveyor, coroner, justice of the peace, legislative ticket, delegates to state convention, chairman county central committee, school superintendent.

PLATFORM.
The report of the committee on platform made its report.
Mayor D'Arcy expressed surprise at the report and moved that a plank be added endorsing the administration of Governor Pennoyer. Carried unanimously as amended.

CREDENTIALS.
By the report of the committee on credentials the following were named as entitled to seats in the convention. The committee's report recommended that no proxies be admitted unless held by residents of the precincts which they represent. The report was amended striking out this objectionable clause, and the report was adopted.

Resolved, That the Democrats of Marion county are in favor of making the office of clerk and sheriff salaried ones and are opposed to the pernicious laws which allow exorbitant fees to the clerk and sheriff as at present and which have a tendency to corrupt and demoralize the politics of the county.

At 1 o'clock the convention adjourned.

The state work was very gratifying to a certain class of politicians, who are always ready to array the county against Salem. It will please them, but they are not very numerous.
