CHEMEKETA IN THE SOUP.

Mayor Vetoes the Improvement of That Street.

GIVES HIS REASONS FOR HIS ACTION.

But Unjustly Attacks Progressive and Public-Spirited Citizens.

Gentlemen of the Common Council of the City of Salem:

I herewith return ordinance No. 242, "An ordinance to provide for the grading, graveling and curbing Chemeketa street in Salem, Oregon," without my signature and approval.

The legal phases involved in the passage of this ordinance I do not deem it expedient at this time to discuss.

One of the greatest objections to the approval of this ordinance is that the grade which has been established on Chemeketa street is an impracticable one and the ordinance establishing it should not have been passed by the council, and this alone is sufficient reason why this ordinance should not receive my approval.

In improving the streets of the city the first question to consider is: do the people living upon the street desire to have expensive improvements or do they wish a more moderate and economical improvement of streets than is contemplated by this ordinance? The council should never undertake street improvements of a permanent nature unless a majority of the people living upon a street desire the same to be made. None of the citizens living upon this street filed a request with the council to commence this improvement.

Another serious objection to the improvement of this street is that the Capital City Railway company is not required to improve the street where its track is laid. It is exempted from the provisions of the ordinance. What was the object of selecting a street for permanent improvement the best portion of which is used by the said company for operating its road? This is a matter I have not been able to understand.

An objection which should demand our careful consideration is that the city under this ordinance is required to improve all the intersections of the street. This expense is quite heavy and the city at the present time is not in a condition to meet the outlay that will necessarily be incurred. The improvement that is being made by the city in building the bridge across South Mill creek and in improving South Commercial street is all that can be conveniently borne by it at the present time. Another reason for vetoing this ordinance is that judging from the past history of the work done by the city we have no assurance but the proposed improvement on Chemeketa street will be imperfectly constructed. This state of things causes a prudent person to shrink from being a party to a proceeding that will be the cause of the wasteful disbursement of our citizens' money. Under the provisions of this ordinance the committee on streets and public property are empowered to change the grade. This ordinance should not have been passed by the council with any such absurd provision.

If it is the desire of our citizens to improve our streets a business street should be selected where persons who own business property and receive rents will justify an expensive street improvement. If a system of street improvement is to be inaugurated it should be properly commenced and people who have but a house and lot and who are scarcely able to pay their taxes should not be selected to inaugurate this system.

The council should bear in mind that the first duty of every city government is to make laws that will not necessarily oppress its citizens. The burdens resting upon our city at the present time are too grievous

to be borne by our people without a protest. Our indebtedness is over (\$100,000) one hundred thousand dollars. Our taxes, including school, county and state will be nearly 4 1/2 per cent. this coming year. What inducement is there for men of means to settle in our midst with this state of things? Does the council desire to drive out of the city every person who can make arrangements to leave it? If such is the case it can be done in no more effective way than to keep heaping up great expense in the matter of street improvements in addition to our exorbitant and heavy taxes. Is the council to be whipped into this course by the hypocritical cant of certain individuals who have nothing to lose and everything to gain by excessive expenditures of the people's money?

What has caused the downfall of and stagnation of business in many cities of the United States? It has been brought about by the "booming" cry of imprudent and idiotic individuals demanding that the people bond the city for \$200,000 to carry on extravagant and useless improvements. The council should remember that it is expected of it to do its duty regardless of the "boomer." Most of the members of the council were here before he came and will likely be here after he has become so odious that he will not be tolerated longer in the community. We have a duty that we owe our citizens and we must not be cajoled or coerced into doing that which we deem unwise and contrary to public morals. Our administration of the city's affairs should be progressive as well as conservative. No "wildcat" schemes should be tolerated for a moment by us.

It would be a wholesome and proper thing for the council to frequently consider the reform measures which I submitted in my first message. Let us all do what we consider for the best interests of the city, regardless of the imbecile vapors of the visionary and impractical crank who sets himself up as the embodiment of all that is good and pure in the community. Let us beware of the pharisaical air of the "boomer" who stops you on the street and is pleased to inform you that he is "holier than thou," and takes you to task for honesty and faithfully discharging the trust reposed in you by the public.

If we are sincere and honest in a desire to permanently reform the management of the city's affairs it will be accomplished, and when our official terms shall expire we shall retire with a consciousness of having performed our duty to the best of our ability, resting secure in the thought that time at least will vindicate our course.

Snowden, A. N. Gray, Salem Gas Co., and a score more. No street in the city has so few poor people on twelve blocks as Chemeketa, even the mayor to the contrary.

NO BONDS AT A DISCOUNT.

The Bids Should be Relet and No Salem Bonds Sold Below Par.

THE JOURNAL presented its readers the facts Tuesday evening about sale of \$20,000 bonds at a discount, when there had been bids at a premium. This was the first the citizens knew of the matter. A prominent Salem business man says:

"It is not too late to remedy this loss of nearly a thousand dollars in coin and a blemish put upon the credit of the city. There is no excuse whatever for this sale of bonds at a discount and it forms a precedent that will be used by the bond dealers to place every city security hereafter scaled on the market." At the risk of incurring the displeasure of the mayor and others in authority, THE JOURNAL enters a protest in the name of the people of this city at the inexcusable and unwarrantable action had in this bond matter. In violation of the law and all financial custom and good business common sense the mayor evidently neglected to open the bids for the bonds at the day and hour advertised. The best bids came by telegraph, and the mayor had no right to defer the opening of the bids three or four days. He could have called the finance or ways and means committee to be present or the whole city council for that matter, at the opening of the bids. It was a mere technicality to not open the bids at the hour and day advertised for, because the recorder was absent. The mayor had no legal right to change the day for opening the bids without advertising anew and giving notice to all bidders. The failure to open the bids at the day and hour advertised to juggle with the bids, as was evidently done, from the facts published in Tuesday's JOURNAL.

From good legal advice, THE JOURNAL unhesitatingly declares that the award of the bonds under the circumstances is unlawful. The neglect of the mayor to open the bids at the date of the advertisement will invalidate the bonds, is the judgment of the best legal minds. The city is entitled to sell its bonds to the best bidder, and not have them hawked about at a discount when they evidently can be sold at a premium. Neglect of official duty is a luxury that should not be paid for out of the public treasury. The city should advertise anew for bids and remove the stigma placed upon its credit by culpable neglect of its officials.

RAISING THE MONEY.—The trustees of the Friend's Polytechnic institute, the college incorporated at Highland park near Salem, have begun to raise \$5000 fund to erect the building. Nearly \$3000 is already subscribed and Rev. George is making good progress among Salem business men. It is a commendable enterprise which all who can should assist. Work on the building is to begin May 1st and it is the intention of the trustees to have the building up so as to begin the school year September 1st. There are plenty of students to attend as soon as the school can be thrown open and the Friends in Oregon are pushing their college work with true western pluck and deserve encouragement.

PLEASE READ IT.—Every Salem citizen should read carefully the mayor's veto of the Chemeketa street improvement ordinance. For candidly stating his objections the mayor is entitled to respect, and his veto message if confined to the subject proper would meet with a good deal of approbation. But when the mayor goes beyond his proper sphere to lecture and belittle those who differ from him he weakens his position not a little. The mayor has evidently lost his head and his dignity in going out of his way to cast slurs at any element of our population.

BOUND OVER.—Chas. H. Smith, arrested at Roseburg the other day by Chief of police Minto, on a charge of adultery, was examined at 10 a. m. before Recorder Goodell. Several witnesses were called by the state, and defendant was bound over to appear before the grand jury in sum of \$500. Bonds were to be furnished in the afternoon.
