THE RIGHT OF FILIBUSTERING.

National Economist: If the recent decision of the majority in the house of representatives that filibustering is a right, too sacred to be denied to any man, be accepted by that party as final, then and in that case the Democratic party will be powerless to pass any legislation, good or bad, until it again gets to be a minority party. This sounds ridiculous, but it is absolutely true. The doctrine that the right of a minority, however small, is too sacred to set aside by the rights of the majority, however large, unavoidably carries with it an indisputable fact, that not the majority, but the minority, is entitled to the credit for all good laws passed, and the censure for all bad ones. And since one man can filibuster and prevent the passage of a measure indefinitely, it follows that the majority cannot pass anything without the unanimous consent of the minority. This is carrying the doctrine of Democracy to a violent extreme that can lead to nothing but anarchy. True Democracy recognizes the rights of all, and would place upon each the responsibility of faithful discharge of the rights and duties of citizenship. The anarchist in his blind zeal for individual rights would subordinate every other duty and responsibility to that one principle, the sacred rights of the individual. He would have no laws, because every law calls for some concession of personal rights or liberties. Carried to this extreme the doctrine of individualism is complete, the individual is the sovereign, and there can be no laws restraining the strong, whether he be an individual of extraordinary strength or ability or be represented by trusts, pools, combinations or corporations. This precedent of the acknowledgment of the supremacy of the minority makes the individual rights of robbers, gamblers, rings, pools, trusts and combines too sacred to be interfered with by law. This is the logical result of the position taken by the Democracy in the house of representatives upon the silver bill; its fallacy is apparent, its tendency is evil and brutal, and the result must be unsatisfactory to the people.

FRANCE ALARMED.

They Are Making Preparations for Trouble.

DYNAMITE AND BLOOD.

Anarchists Will Likely Cause Riots on May Day.

PARIS, April 30.—It is still thought by the authorities, despite the recent occurrences, that there is no likelihood of any troubles in France in connection with the May-day demonstrations. May day falls on Sunday, and although the municipal elections are being held throughout France, except at Paris, there appears no probability that they will lead to a disturbance. Paul Lafargue, the workmen's deputy, says if the socialists do not carry the day at the municipal elections they will at least out a prominent figure. It is not the intention of the socialists to resort to violence to attain their ends. They will remain within the law, and whatever manifestations they may make will be of a purely peaceful character. "I have seen," said Lafargue, "the president of the council and Minister of the Interior Loubet, and assured him nothing is to be feared from the working class, at the same time I expressed to him a hope that no agents be put forward by the police to provoke the people. Loubet told me," continued Lafargue, "he did not intend to take any special measures. There would be no appeal to the military and no greater display than was necessary to preserve peace." Jules Guesde, chief of the Guesdist division of the socialist party, said: "In Proven manifestations will be confined to gaining seats at the municipal elections. We intend to put candidates forward for election in various town councils and are certain of obtaining socialist majorities at Calais, Roubaix, St. Etienne, Armentieres, Fournies, Montlouson, and Rouen, Cate, Carmaux, and perhaps at Lille and Commeny. At Troyes, Bordeaux, Toulouse, Lyons, Marseilles, and Beziers we shall be well represented. Culline, who is now undergoing a long term of imprisonment as a scapegoat for the unlawful acts of the military at Fournies, will be selected mayor of that town. The programme of our socialist town councilman will be to obtain a working day of eight hours without a reduction of wages. There will be no manifestations in connection with the elections. Beyond this, the electors will meet at a certain spot in each town and march by to the town hall to record their votes. There will be no red flags. At Paris there will be a single general meeting at the Chateau d'Eau theatre, to which the members of the workmen's syndicates and various socialist groups will repair without flags." In reply to a question as to whether it was the intention of the socialist party to attempt this move by purely peaceful actions or not, Guesde said: "At present, yes. I do not know what the future has in store for us. The party may have to resort to force if it does not obtain what it considers its rights by peaceful proceedings, and there will be nothing in that. Every form of government in France for the last century found its birth in violence, and a disregard for the established law." The recent dynamite outrages have, however, caused a feeling among the people, despite reiterated assurances of the authorities that no trouble will occur, that the 1st of May will witness rioting and bloodshed not only in Paris, but in various labor-embodying sections throughout the country.

Though the authorities have reportedly said no trouble was anticipated in this city, they nevertheless are taking the most extensive precautions to repress disorders on May day. At the municipal elections throughout France, outside of Paris, it is feared the crowds, excited by partisan feeling, may fall an easy prey to anarchistic agitators. In Paris the trouble is not political, as there is no election, but it is feared the anarchists will try to incite the workmen to riot. A large military force has been put in readiness to suppress any violent demonstrations. The garrison has been reinforced by two regiments of cavalry, and six more regiments are stationed within easy distance and homes are kept ready added. The police have made another raid on the anarchists. The managers of the large English and American shops near the Grand Opera received letters declaring every house not
