A BEAUTIFUL SKY.—Monday evening at 6 o'clock could be seen one of those beautiful sights where all the terrors of the storm are blended with the soft beauties of nature's art. At 6 p. m. a black thunder cloud rolled over the city from the foothills of the Cascades. From the beetling brows of the Ethiopian storm king hung a snowy drapery of descending rain. The white curtain of falling mist waving to and fro as it was swayed by the wind. The sun broke out in the west and two perfectly brilliant rainbows arched the sky from northern to southern horizon. A belt of dove-colored sky lay between the two seven-hued arches of flame, above all was black, below was the white moving drop curtain of descending rain. There was an accompaniment of low, rolling thunder and an illumination of mild flashes of sheet lightning, when all passed off into night.

IN JUSTICE COURT.—An action was begun Monday afternoon in which one W. A. Howell charged two unknown parties who upon arrest were found to be the Heninger Bros., with assault committed Sunday evening. The facts in the case as stated by one man are that R. L. Heninger, and two brothers J. W. and R. T., and a blacksmith were walking on the sidewalk north of Wade's store when four men ran against them in the dark, with a yell. They got a warm reception from the Heningers and ran away in the dark. No prosecuting witnesses appeared when the case was called at 2 p. m. before Justice Applegate. It was continued to Thursday at 1 p. m.

ROAD ITEMS.—The attention of Frank Kaiser, the North Salem street commissioner is called to the impassable condition at the Grant place. There are such gullies in the center that teams crowd the fences on either side tearing them down, in their efforts to get past. Out on the Garden road some one has filled chuck holes with soft mud from the roadside. People should report the condition of their roads more to THE JOURNAL and also poor work when it is done by a roadmaster. The people pay cash now for road work and have a right to demand good work.

THE CITY CREDIT.—Public business, (in the disposition of \$20,000 city bonds at a discount when a premium was offered), was transacted in a very loose manner and it is not too late for the mayor and council to redeem the credit of the city. The bonds are not issued and there are evidently parties willing to take them at par or a premium.

A LOCAL INSTITUTION.

Prof. W. L. Staley Buys the Capital Business College.

The Capital Business College has been added to the list as another Salem institution. Heretofore the school has been conducted by Prof. A. P. Armstrong, as a branch of the Portland Business College. Owing to the time required of him in looking after his home school, and a text-book on which he is at work, he decided to dispose of the Capital Business College. Saturday last, Prof. Staley closed a bargain for the transfer of the school, and will take possession July 1st. That this is a good thing for Salem, must be a parent to all. For, while the school has been ably and creditably managed as a branch, doing thorough work and fully satisfying its patrons it will do better as an independent institution, increasing in prosperity or falling into decay as such, having no parent stem either to give it succor or sap its strength by overshadowing it in size.

Prof. Staley is an active and experienced worker, and is already arranging for a revision of the different courses of study. He will also have his school rooms put in perfect trim during the summer, and expects a large attendance next season. In this he should not be disappointed. Salem people owe it to him and to themselves to patronize this school, now a home institution in fact as well as in name.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

Council in Caucus Monday Night Agrees to Progress.

The mayor was not present. All the councilmen were present but Hutton who did not vote for the Cheneketa street improvement ordinance.

It is understood he favors passing it over the mayor's veto.
The council will be unanimous for permanent improvement of our streets and for retrenchment in city expenses.

This is a very healthy state of affairs. The big four have become a big eight so far as a general policy of street improvement is concerned.
At the meeting Monday night it was not only decided to go ahead with Cheneketa street, but also to pave the business streets with broken rock.

WILL HAVE TO SIT STILL.

Governor Penney Declines to Take Part in the Canvass.

State Senator Veatch and other prominent Democrats were in the city Monday seeking to induce his excellency Sylvester Penney, Democratic governor of Oregon, to take part in the canvass. The visiting statesmen departed without any encouragement. Governor Penney was seen immediately after their departure and says he does not see how he can go out and make speeches this year for the Democrats without either stultifying himself or attacking the platform. He says he would like to see Veatch elected to congress but does not see how, as a free silver man he can consistently remain a candidate. The governor thinks he will have to sit still.

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THE SANTIAM RAILROAD.

Salem Board of Trade Takes Hold Vigorously for a Line to Stayton.

At the regular meeting of the board of trade on Monday night a committee of Stayton people were present, who are pushing for a railroad connection with Salem.

Messrs. Cottle, Waite and Knight were appointed a committee to cooperate with the Stayton people to secure a railroad connection.

Resolutions were adopted which stated in effect, that it was the sense of the board of trade that it would be to the advantage of Salem to secure the proposed line of road and that the board would do whatever it could to assist in raising a subsidy to encourage the Southern Pacific in building the line.

The Waldo Hill country would be tapped by this line and it is an open question whether a railroad to the east is not more important than to Astoria.

THE ADVANTAGE SET FORTH.

The great benefit of such a line is set forth in conversation had with Aldermen M. W. Hunt. Mr. Hunt said: "The action of the citizens of Stayton and our own board of trade in agitating the building of a railroad from Salem to Stayton is commendable and should not be allowed to cease until Salem has succeeded in getting a road through the eastern portion of Marion county to a connection with the Oregon Pacific. If Salem is to assist in this matter would it not be well for us to look to our best interests? Many of our people seem to think that all there is to be gained by this Stayton road is the Santiam trade and this would be the case if we assist in building a road having Stayton as one terminal point and Stayton as the other. Few of our people realize that the Waldo hill trade is of as great consequence to us as the Santiam trade. While considering the question of a road from Stayton to Stayton which would leave out the Waldo hill trade, would it not be well to consider the fact that the distance is no greater from Salem via Waldo hills, which would tap the finest grain and produce belt and

OPEN UP THE COAL FIELDS now being developed. A connection with the O.P. would be to have a road from Salem via Stayton to Stayton with Salem left out as a terminal point. Do the people of Salem realize that a road from Stayton via the Forward coal mine through the Waldo hills would tap a country producing for export at least one million bushels of grain and other produce incident to a rich producing country? Do the people of Salem know that not five per cent. of that trade comes to Salem? Let us have what belongs to us. The trade of the eastern portion of the county belongs to us. The road by way of Stayton would tap the Waldo hill trade. A road through the Waldo hills by way of Stayton would bring both sections of country tributary to us, and the distance would be no longer and would place Salem on a line of what will certainly be a transcontinental road, and would at the same time give us that immense trade."
