Y. M. C. A. RECEPTION.

A Grand Social Success—Inaugurates the Work in Salem.

There is no hall big enough for popular public assemblages any longer in Salem.

That was the comment of all at the reception Wednesday night.

The decorations were very appropriate and reflect great credit on the committee. The program was begun with singing and Mr. Gile, the Salem president, called the vast assemblage to order, and introduced a speaker from Portland, who had been telegraphed for to address the meeting.

N. H. Jacks said 400,000 young men embracing eighteen nationalities, with 1200 associations in this country, and \$15,000,000 of property represented this order. George Williams, of London originated the Y. M. C. A., which had captured this city. Two things were necessary—a good secretary and good rooms. He eulogized the selection of Mr. Wetherbee for secretary, and asked that he be given hearty support. He spoke of the benefits of the gymnasium, and made a very pleasant address and made an eloquent appeal for a helping hand to save the boys of the city.

The singing of the evening consisted of renditions of "Beautiful Moonlight," and "What is the Swallow Saying," by Misses Grace Flake and Marie Messick, who were escorted and sang in a most pleasing manner. Miss Harris sang "The Blushing Day" and Thomas C. Moody sang "The Little Old Red Shawl My Mother Wore." Both were heartily received and responded with encores in a happy manner. Mr. Wetherbee gave an illustration of gymnasium work.

Then refreshments were then served to the great jam of people present. The elegant reception room of Dr. Smith was used as a ladies' retiring room and contributed much to the success of the evening.

THE MAYOR'S POSITION.

Sustained Mainly by Non-Residents and Those Opposed to City Improvements.

The mayor has gone into print to defend his veto. He is not sustained by his own party and there are those who say that the petition sustaining the veto was got up after it was printed. But the matter is not to be decided in that way. It should rest upon its merits. There are poor people who live upon the street and who will be oppressed by the cost of the improvement. Such will always be the case and is not an argument against street improvement. It is not necessary to name them.

THE JOURNAL is managed by persons as much in sympathy with poor people and working people possibly as the mayor is. This is not a question between the mayor and THE JOURNAL, although the mayor has tried to introduce personalities and politics. It is a question of public right.

There are fifty-eight owners of frontage on the street to be improved. The mayor rests his case upon the following:

There are twenty-nine names in the above list, including Mr. Willis, who is not in the list of persons assessed as shown in the ordinance. Of the twenty-eight Mrs. E. Shepard, H. W. Cox, G. W. Webb and Mrs. Eldridge are non-residents, and at least one is signed for by another party. Napoleon Davis and the First National bank, and T. E. and Mary Caulfield should not be counted but one each. While all these persons have a right to sign a remonstrance, too much weight should not be given to the presence of their names upon the remonstrance. The public policy of this city cannot be shaped entirely to suit the wishes of remonstrants, although the mayor seems to think it.

THE JOURNAL will not go into a

detailed analysis of the list of names the mayor offers in his support. A number of them are large holders of suburban property who have no interest in improvements within the city proper. We leave it to fair-minded people to say whether upon the mayor's showing of his backers he has a majority of the owners of frontage on that street upon his side? It must be evident that he has not.

Accident at Marion.

On May 4th about one o'clock p. m. Mrs. C. M. Skeels and her daughter Mary, who is about 15 years old, started to Jefferson in a cart; when they were near the blacksmith shop the horse became frightened at the south bound freight train and run away with them running about 40 rods crossed the railroad and just after crossing it the cart struck a chunk of wood throwing them both out with great force against a pile of wood. Mrs. Skeels escaped without much injury except a sprained wrist but Mary was badly hurt it is thought the left shoulder is dislocated or broken. She was taken home on a chair carried by four men and Dr. Hawk, of Jefferson was sent for.

The horse immediately after the ladies were thrown out broke the harness and got loose from the cart and was caught four or five miles south of Jefferson.

Later: Dr. Hawk arrived and found Mary's shoulder dislocated and the collar bone broken, also that some of the small bones of Mrs. Skeels wrist were broken he reduced all the broken and dislocated bones and it is thought they will both soon recover.
