How CAUSED.—Many will be curious to know the cause of Hon. R. P. Earhart's death. The best authorities say his death was due to Bright's disease, with dropsical complications. For the past two years Mr. Earhart has been failing in health, but for twelve months the disease has been making rapid and steady inroads on the diaphragm of life. When unable longer to leave his room and bed, he continued to sign all official papers and to look over the accounts that were sent up to him. Tuesday he sank into a comatose condition from which he never rallied.

A DEFECTIVE LINK.
 Causes a Pile Driver Accident that Nearly Kills a Man.

At 4:30 Wednesday evening as Peter Curtright, foreman at the little pile driver on the South Commercial street viaduct, was standing in front of the machine, when the chain by which the pile was being lowered broke, and he was knocked off the platform, falling about 18 feet onto a crib of rock which rests on the crossbeams of the flume. The pile struck him when it fell, causing him to lose his balance, and some of the workmen think, stunned him. He fell heavily on the crib of rocks and was picked up as some thought dead. He was put on a stretcher and carried to Fry's drug store where Dr. Jeffries dressed his wounds. The calf of one leg, the fingers of one hand, the side of his head and back were badly bruised. He became conscious soon after he was picked up and when taken home soon revived.

The injured man lives in North Salem and has a family. The accident was caused by breaking of a chain which had been used to hoist nearly all the piles driven. The chain was a strong log chain but by some extra strain one link gave way. Everything will be done by Contractor McCoy to render the injured man comfortable.

MOTOR LINE PROSPECTS.
 Salem Street Railway—What Will be Done—About the New Franchises.

Before the next city council meeting there will come several propositions that involve Salem street car property and possibly motor line extension.

THE ELECTRIC LINE
 will ask to have its present franchise on Ferry street to the S. P. Co. depot changed to State street and Twelfth, and will seek to occupy those streets alongside the present horse car line. They ask this to save expense of heavy grades on Ferry street.

THE HORSE CAR LINE
 claims to have an exclusive franchise on State and Twelfth streets, and will resist the Electric going upon that street. They will on Saturday proceed to put their lines in better shape, put on uniformed drivers, and advance their pay to \$1.50 a day. The track will be put in good order also.

A FRANCHISE
 will be asked at the next council meeting to operate a steam motor from Chemeketa street to the fair grounds. If that can be obtained the company will at once ballast the track and order several noiseless motors, in time to run cars to the June races. This will cost \$12,000 to \$15,000. If the council will not grant this Mr. Cottle says they will proceed to electrify the whole line and build extensions. This will necessitate almost a complete reconstruction of the present system and will cost \$60,000. But the company are prepared to build an electric system if they cannot operate motors.

A NATION OF STAIR CLIMBERS.

The Berliners Have a Fondness for Living in "Top Story Apartments."

I called upon American friends. It was just in that hour when solid midnight sets in here (6 o'clock), and when, in response to a ring, the heavy iron door opened with a soft click, there were revealed a few steps, and beyond there was darkness. I did not know on what story my friends dwelt, having only the number of the house. After striking several matches it appeared that those sought did not dwell on the first or second floors. Move matches were struck, and at last the name appeared. There was nothing to say about so strange an adventure. It is the way of the town. One has to get the hang of the dark stairways or stay in first class hotels.

A friend related a similar experience. He was making a call in a fashionable quarter, and after lighting his way to the fourth story of a large house, and he counted the steps—there were 102 of them—he entered an apartment that was brilliantly lighted and found a charming circle of ladies in lovely evening costumes. He expected some explanation of his passage up the stairway, 103 dark steps, but it was not regarded as remarkable in any respect. The people upon whom he was calling were Americans with a superfluity of money, and abroad for personal repose and educational facilities. The people are used to the climbing of stairs, and regard it as a form of necessary exercise.

A residence is not a house, but a series of apartments, connected and separate from others. There is a common stair, and it is guarded by a porter, who watches the one front door, behind which, at various elevations, are half a dozen well established families. There are probably four floors, with room for a family, perhaps two of them, on each floor. You come to an iron and glass door, say fifteen feet high, and ring a bell. You are at once under inspection from the lodge of the invisible porter, and if he regards you as eligible he pulls a lever or turns a crank and the spring latch is withdrawn.

Then you ascend to the floor where your friends are at home and ring another bell and you can enter a private hall, though often on this hall there are several parties who merely know each other as neighbors. This is the way to concentrate population and encourage architecture.

I know a young man who has not been in Berlin long, and has a fancy for counting the steps he climbs to see his friends. The number of steps ranges from 53 to 111. The average height of eligible apartments is about 70 steps. There are fine accommodations in abundance at the height of 125 steps.—Berlin Cor. Pittsburg Dispatch.

Poor Venetians Have No Salt.
 Salt does not enter into the food of the poor Venetians. They never taste it, and the hospital for the scrofulous children at Lido is filled with those who have not had this necessary article in their food. Every evening I have noticed a poorly dressed woman, accompanied by two small children, a boy and a girl, go to a point on the river and lean over the edge of the wall and fill a bottle with the salt water. Becoming curious as to the use made of it, I approached her, with an apology for the question, and asked her what she did with the sea water. Turning upon me a sweet, sad face, in which traces of beauty were still visible, she replied that this was the only way she had of giving her children the taste of salt which they required. The tax levied upon this article by the government placed it entirely beyond the reach of the poor.—Venice Cor. Omaha Bee.

Crossing the Andes in a Coach.
 Don Benito Resquejo, accompanied by his wife, has crossed the Andes in a coach, drawn by three mules, from Salta to Cordoba. The distance between the two places is 120 leagues, and the journey was performed in eleven days. In many places the vehicle had to be lifted bodily over obstacles by the owner and his men, and in others a road had to be cut. It was an arduous undertaking, necessitating no small amount of endurance and pluck. Forty years or so ago the late Mr. George Brower, a native of the United States, crossed the Cordilleras in a coach by a pass in the province of Atacama.—Chilian Times.

The Kamchatkan Bighorn.
 The Kamchatkan bighorn stands on the average about 40 inches at the shoulder, and is a little over 5 feet 6 inches in extreme length. The largest head we shot bore horns measuring 35 inches around the curve. Their circumference at the base was 14 inches and the distance from tip to tip 5 feet 6 inches. The animal is very bulky in build, and the chest girth, which varied very little in the different specimens, was only 2 or 3 inches short of 5 feet. In spite of this it is as agile as a chamois, and makes nothing of the most perilous paths.—Blackwood's Magazine.
