Officers of Both Vessels Anxious to Come

CHARLESTON-BALTIMORE Will be in Portland Sometime Saturday.

PORTLAND, May 13.—The United States cruisers Baltimore and Charleston leave Astoria today at daylight for Portland and will probably arrive in the evening, or at all events Saturday forenoon.

Considerable consternation was caused among Portland people in Astoria by the report that the cruisers' orders to proceed to Portland had been countermanded, and that the Charleston had received orders to proceed to sea Saturday.

The rumor, however, that the Charleston had received orders to proceed to China Saturday, thus making it impossible for this war vessel to come to Portland, was thought best to be looked into, and upon inquiry Captain Pigney, of the Charleston, admitted that he had not received orders to proceed to sea upon that day, whereupon Captain Pope, of the centennial commiter, and President Osborn, of the chamber of commerce, were telegraphed the information with suggestions that the matter be inquired into immediately from headquarters at Washington.

This was done, and the following correspondence relating to the matter is herewith given in full, and wherein it is emphatically stated by Senator Dolph that the senior officer of the Charleston has been ordered to take the cruisers to Portland unless strong reasons exist to the contrary, and if so, that the department be immediately informed of the same.

The correspondence is as follows: PORTLAND, May 11, 1892.—To Hon. J. N. Dolph, J. H. Mitchell, Binger Hermann, Washington, D. C.: Telegram just received from the inspector of steam vessels, Astoria, says Charleston's orders for Portland have been countermanded. This is causing great excitement. Will do Portland and Columbia River great harm. Ascertain quickly the cause and secure orders for the cruisers to come to Portland. Ship Kenilworth just arrived at Portland, drawing 21 feet 7 inches, without slightest detention.
