AN INSANE PASSENGER.

Tries to Jump from the Car Window After His Clothes.
New York, May 17.—When the Chicago limited express on the Pennsylvania railway arrived in Jersey City, Sunday, the crew turned over to the local police a man whom they said was insane. He was evidently a man of refinement, and about 40 years old. He boarded the train at Chicago and kept aloof from the other passengers. When the train drew out of the Philadelphia station he suddenly jumped up from his seat and began yelling at the top of his voice. Then he hurriedly took off all his clothing, except his underclothes, and flung them out of the window of the car, and was about to follow the train when he was restrained by one of the passengers. He was held a prisoner until the train arrived at Jersey City. At the station house he said he lived next door to Sarah Bernhardt, in Chicago. He would not give his name, but from papers found in a valise which he carried it is supposed that he is Joseph Bissel, of No. 4927 West Madison street. Bissel is a partner of J. R. Mayer, of 175 Dearborn street. The man is apparently a civil engineer or lawyer, and has been at work on the plans of a railroad, which were found in his valise. He was locked up as a disorderly person.

GRANITE LOCKOUT.

Building Operations in New York and Other Cities Stopped.

New York, May 16.—The lockout of granite cutters throughout the New England states was declared yesterday, throwing twenty to thirty thousand men out of employment, at the same time a number of strikes have been ordered in sympathy with the stone cutters. It is estimated that fully 30,000 men employed in quarrying and stone building works are now out. The immediate effect in this city will be to bring to a standstill all building operations, with the menace of a still more far reaching effect, as many other trades will undoubtedly be influenced if the struggle is protracted. The men say they have the means to continue the contest indefinitely, and believe the urgency of contracts will compel employers to surrender. Commissioners of public works Gilroy, upon whom the men rely to bring the employers to terms by insisting that the paving contracts now under way shall be filled, said yesterday morning that he saw no way in which to bring about an understanding between the men and employers. He declared he could not make any calculation as to when work would be resumed. Pickets of granite cutters watch every boat load of stone brought to the city, and in every case where it comes from a quarry the owner of which is a member of the granite manufacturer's association, workmen will be warned not to handle the stone.

New York, May 17.—Secretary Grant, of the paving cutters' national union, has received a dispatch from Secretary Dyer, of the granite cutters' national union saying: "The lockout all along the line means 15,000 men locked out, and the only quarries now in operation in the New England states are those of Swan's Island, Maine; Ann, Oneo and Materville, Conn."

Champion Bridge Jumper.

MEMPHIS, May 17.—At 4 o'clock last evening, Thomas A. Madden, of this city, made a phenomenal dive, 149 feet, from the great bridge into the Mississippi river, compelling Steve Brodie's leap from the Brooklyn bridge. Madden did not drop as the professionals do, but leaped down feet first.

THE CONFERENCE.

They Come Out Boldly on the Negro Outrages.

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Denunciations of the Outrages of Colored People.

OMAHA, May 17.—Bishop Bowman presided at this morning's session of the Methodist conference. The committee on itinerancy reported in favor of the abolition of the five-year limit on appointment of pastors, and it was recommended that bishops be permitted to appoint pastors every year without reference to the places to which the ministers had been assigned the previous year. The report was made the special order for tomorrow morning. The committee on the state of the church reported in a report fairly bristling with denunciations of the outrages practiced on the negroes in the South, and calling on the great Methodist church to stand firmly for the rights of the colored people. The report was unanimously adopted by a rising vote. Dr. Sanford Hunt and Dr. Homer Eaton, were elected officers of the book concerns, etc.

California Democrats.

FRESNO, Cal., May 17.—The delegates to the Democratic convention, which opens today, continue to arrive. It looks now as if the Cleveland men were going to have the scraps of their antagonists at their belts within the next forty-eight hours. The Cleveland sentiment seems to be in the air. The general opinion is that the Democrats of the state want him, and are going to force things in his interest. They have the Hill men already on the run, and it looks as if they would keep them going. The struggle will hinge upon the selection of a chairman, and the issue will be squarely joined in the contest between Barney Murphy and Senator Ostrum. From this it must not be understood that the Cleveland men are all for Ostrum, but it is a fact that all the Hill and anti-Cleveland men are at the back of Murphy in a solid column and are working for him like boomerangs. They form his principal element of strength. But then Murphy is a man of personal popularity in the party, and will get many votes on that score alone from all over the state. Santa Clara will be for Murphy to a man, as will also Monterey and San Mateo. His friends reckon upon ninety votes at least from San Francisco, with a solid delegation from Alameda. San Diego is claimed for him and the majority of Los Angeles, but this is mere talk thus far, and it is doubtful if the result will verify the assertions. San Bernardino, which is reckoned upon for Murphy, is surely divided, and it is not believed that San Diego will go as a unit for him. The north is for Ostrum almost to a man, and his friends say that if he gets anything like a reasonable vote from San Francisco his name will go through with a whoop.

Dr. Briggs, the seminary would stand by him, regardless of the consequences.

Will Not Run With Woodhull.

New York, May 17.—Mrs. Emma Beckwith to whom has been offered the nomination for the vice presidency of the United States on the Equal Rights ticket declines while she would accept the position with either Belva Lockwood or Frances B. Willard as the nominee for the first place, she would not run on the same ticket with Victoria Woodhull.

Prominent Men Arrested.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., May 17.—Geo. L. Taylor and D. F. McConkey, prominent lawyers at Forsyth, Lancy county, are in jail here, on the charge of killing Deputy Sheriff Williams, and participation in the lynching of J. W. Bright, a wife-murderer, on March 12th last. Other arrests and highly sensational disclosures are expected.

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LANIER, Wyo., May 17.—A successful jail break was made here last night by which all the prisoners escaped. The deputy sheriff who attempted to recapture them was fatally wounded. Among the escaped prisoners were Bliss and Collins, two of the most notorious horse thieves of the West.
