THE STATE STREET RAILWAY

Two Important Matters For the Council to Consider.

By petition of the citizens the council is asked to grant a second franchise to start a railway up State street. What are the equities in the case so far as the public interests are concerned?

Before the council grants a franchise to the Electric company up State street it should give the present owners a reasonable time to get full possession of that line, and a reasonable time to develop it and improve it. Morally and legally the council has no right to grant a second franchise on that street unless the first is forfeited or abandoned. If the horse car line had been a profitable investment the past year no one would think of laying a straw in its way. The fact that it has been losing money does not alter the duty or the responsibility of the city toward it, nor of that company toward the city and the public.

The second point the council should consider is the establishing of the precedent of granting two franchises along a fine residence street for that length. If that precedent is set the council may be called upon to grant a duplicate franchise on every residence street in the city which would not only be unfair to any company but unjust to the property owners.

STRAWBERRY-ROSE SHOW.

List of Cash Premiums Offered Strawberry Growers This Year.
 The committee on the strawberry fair, composed of E. Hofer, H. W. Savage and H. H. Ragan met this morning and arranged the premium list for the fair this year. They merely fixed the cash premiums to be offered by the Marion county fruit growers' association. There is a special committee on getting up additional cash premiums, quite a number having been offered by the Salem Cannery Co. and private citizens. In all there will probably be \$100 or over in cash premiums on strawberries alone.

RULES.
 The following rules were adopted to govern the strawberry exhibits:
 1. All strawberries exhibited must be exhibited by the grower; labeled with the name of variety and name of exhibitor.
 2. There must be at least two entries in any class before a cash premium can be awarded.
 3. A committee of one to three persons, not exhibitors, shall be appointed to judge of each class.
 4. The same exhibit of any one or more varieties shall not be entered in more than one class, nor for more than one premium, except that any plant may be entered for sweepstakes.
 5. All exhibits for premiums must be one quart unless otherwise stated in premium list; must be made on white plates to be furnished by society at place of exhibition; exhibits to be under control of society at close of exhibition.
 6. Members of the society or visitors, are requested not to touch or remove any exhibit.
 7. Orders for premiums must be signed by the Secretary, upon written report signed by all of award committee.

WHEN HELD.
 The committee decided to hold the fair Thursday, Friday and Saturday, date to be fixed by committee so as to bring in greatest number of varieties possible on the above days. Fair will open Thursday afternoon, day and night until Saturday at 2 p. m. The committee favor charging a 10 cent admission fee, all funds to be used for premiums and actual expenses of the fair.

THE ROSE SHOW
 Committee for T. McF. Patton, Mrs. W. W. Martin, and Jay Cox. They are well-known and well-liked amateur rose growers and will arrange the rose premiums so as to bring out all the roses grown here in liberal proportion.

The first day's shooting tournament opened with perfect weather at Roseburg's shooting grounds of the Salem Rod and Gun club. The electric cars were crowded all the morning and run right through to the ground.

This was considered rather poor shooting but toward the close very little crows got away unpunished and nearly all the men had their hand in. No one got so small a score but he had some company, and the fellows with a high record were few and far between.

The arrangements for the shoot are all according to the rules of the American Shooting association, and the ground are first-class. Five traps are used. The men shoot in squads by the rapid-firing walk-around system.

Wm. W. Brooks is score-keeper. Gabrielson, Glenn and Turner are referees, but so far there have been no contests, and all the sports feel they are assured of a fair deal at Salem. Quite a number of visitors attended today, and a number of ladies. Tomorrow will be the big day, and hundreds will attend.
