**THE NAVAL BILL.**

Debate in the Senate on the Appropriations.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—In the senate yesterday the naval appropriation bill was taken up, the pending question being a provision for increase of the navy.

McPherson, who on Friday last, offered an amendment to strike out the house provision for an armored cruiser, and the senate provision for a battle ship and provide for three, instead of one harbor defense double-turret ship, monitor type, modified his amendment, leaving the number of monitors at one.

Higgins, of Delaware, favored an increase of the navy, even if it involved an increase of the national debt.

Vilas, of Wisconsin, said the amount of the naval appropriation now imposed might not improperly be described as appalling, and he did not think the senate should set further towards increasing the navy under present circumstances than the house bill provided.

West, of Missouri, said he would vote against the proposed increase in every shape and form.

Allison, of Iowa, chairman of the appropriation committee, asked the democratic senators to indicate what statutes they would repeal in order to reduce the appropriations now necessary.

West replied that he would repeal the sugar bounty law and the postal subsidy bill.

Allison calculated the amount this would save at about eight millions, and said the country is asked to elect a Democratic president and senate in order that the sugar bounty and postal subsidy laws might be repealed.

Allison referred to the condition of the public treasury, and among other things, said to the senators who are distressed about a sinking fund at this time, "there will be twenty-five millions surplus in the treasury on the first of July next."

Hawley, of Connecticut, said none of our warships could go out to the open sea for battle. They are splendid chasers, and probably splendid runners, but what was wanted was at least a few of the old kind of 1812 and 1855 and 1860.

Finally a vote was taken on McPherson's amendment, and it was rejected, yeas 18; nays 30.

Morgan, of Alabama, offered an amendment providing that if harbor defense ships be put on the Pacific, an allowance of 3 per cent. may be made on its cost to the contractor in addition to the contract price, to cover the cost of transportation of material. Agreed to without division.

The question recurred on the amendment reported by the committee on appropriations. Without coming to a vote on the question, the senate adjourned.
