MORE STREETS TO BE IMPROVED

Commercial Street to Be Graded and Macadamized.

SOME ECONOMY PROMOTED.

The Electric Extension on State Street Referred.

The council were all present but Moore, who was confined at home. Many citizens were present. Alderman Hunt assisted the recorder.

BILLS ORDERED PAID.

Salem Iron works, \$1.50; J. Myers, \$74; Statesman, \$1; Ladd & Bush, \$24; Mrs. C. D. Snyder, \$2.75; J. H. Lunn, \$1.75; Gray Bros., \$9; Ira Erb, \$4.50; E. M. Waite, \$1.75; Steiner & Sonnenman, \$2; W. C. Mitchell, \$2.50; Salem Water Co., \$96.46; Salem Gas Light Co., \$105; Salem Electric Light Co., \$430; John Knight, \$41; H. P. Minto, \$282.70; R. A. Crossan, \$72; JOURNAL, \$31. The bill of E. J. McCausland for \$80 was paid. His bill for \$15 was not paid. The bill of the Salem Abstract Co. for \$50 was again laid over.

Remarks were made on the bills of several parties that were referred back for reduction.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Street committee reported favorable on petition for sewer to connect with Ferry street sewer, block 10, by E. M. Croisan. Adopted.

Committee on licenses reported on W. W. Davis, petition for rebate on saloon license, that \$90 be allowed. This was the case of the Arcade saloon which suspended for lack of business.

Lafore thought this a bad precedent as there would be more and more of this sort of business. Hunt also opposed.

Upon roll call vote was as follows: Ayes: Johnson, Collins, Moore, Hutton, 4. Noes: Hunt, Lafore, Lamoureux, 3. Absent: Moore; I. Adopted.

Petition of R. L. Penland for transfer of team license, granted.

Petition of Mrs. Lizzie S. Robinson for permit to canvass for books, rejected.

FIRE AND WATER.

Petition of G. W. Eppler to enlarge shed back of Salem soda works, reported back that petition be granted if built of corrugated iron.

Johnson reported a remodeling of Capital Engine house, and submitted a report that it would cost \$850 to make the changes.

Walter Low, chief engineer of Fire Department, was asked to explain the plan to the council. He was present and did so. An ordinance is being prepared to make these changes.

Street Commissioner Crossan submitted final report of moneys collected and paid out for past two months. Referred to committee on accounts.

A notice was read from Mrs. Hattie Easton and Chas. A. Chase, that the city was guilty of trespass in piling rocks and earth on their lot. Referred to city attorney.

MORE STREET IMPROVEMENT.—Alderman Collins reported a resolution that Commercial street and cross streets to front be brought to grade and covered with one foot of broken rock. Adopted.

Petition of E. C. Cross to tear down four wooden buildings and erect a corrugated iron buildings at rear of his shop on State street. Granted.

Chief of Police Minto reported that Officer Dille had been given a leave of absence for one month and Ed N. Edes had been appointed Confirmed.

Petition of J. G. Barr and others to lower grade a certain streets was referred to committee on streets.

ELECTRIC ON STATE.

The petition of property owners for electric extension on State and Twelfth streets was read and Hunt moved its adoption.

Hutton said this was hasty and it was unfair to allow another line. Johnson opposed haste and moved to refer to committee on streets.

Hunt opposed. The matter had been discussed. It would not injure the horse car line any more than to let it go up Ferry; a line on Ferry would kill the horse car line as quick as or State.

Lafore favored the franchise and was prepared to vote.

Lamoureux opposed one company having a monopoly of the whole city. It was referred.

NEW STREET COMMISSIONER.

The new ordinance provides the street commissioner be also an engineer.

Hunt nominated W. J. Culver. Hutton nominated E. J. McCausland, but his name was withdrawn. Mr. Culver was elected.

MARSHAL'S FEE.

An ordinance to reduce the fee of

the city marshal was read twice. It allows him fees of constable for all marshal's work; \$1.00 per night for attending council; also 5 per cent. for collecting delinquent taxes; also one-half of licenses collected.

The committee on ways and means shall provide for letting board of city prisoners to lowest bidder.

A MOTOR LINE.

An ordinance was read twice to allow use of steam motors on all streets in the city north of Chemeketa street.

STREET GRADE.

An ordinance was read twice to fix grade Commercial street south of north line of Trade street.

AN ORDINANCE.

was put upon third reading to tax all costs of street intersections at abutting property and passed.

CONTRACT LET.

A resolution was adopted accepting the bid of contractor Mason of \$3162.96 for the intersections on Chemeketa street, and that an ordinance be drawn.

Lamoureux opposed taxing the intersections to abutting property.

O. & C. RY. CO.

Hutton called attention to the fact that this company's tracks on Twelfth street were too high by two feet, and that street commissioner be ordered to fix the grade.

The former street commissioner and city engineer were ordered to turn over all papers, records and office fixtures to newly elected official.

The city bills were read and the Recorder submitted his tax roll of the city, when council adjourned.

They asked for a franchise on Ferry and other streets and got it and they have let the contract for a line to the depot on that street and as soon as they are ready will build on that street.

The people of State street asked them to come over there with the line. His company had not asked for a franchise on State street. Of course it was a finer street and had more business than Ferry and they would be glad to get into that street, but were making no fight on the other company.

Old English Bookstands.

After the university scholar the best customers of the booksellers during the Middle Ages were the clergy, and one of the favorite places for a bookstall was the church porch. This custom has left an abiding mark upon the trade. Readers of Boileau's "Lutrin" may remember that the ammunition for the fierce battle between the contending ecclesiastics was supplied from a bookseller's shop in the neighborhood of La Sainte Chapelle. St. Paul's churchyard makes a yet greater figure in the history of the trade. The surviving names of the streets in which the old stationers of the city of London carried on their business indicate the character of their stock.

OLD ENGLISH BOOKSTANDS.
