WHERE IT RAINS.—Oregon has passed through a full six months period of alternating mists, dry days, showers, and several weeks of steady downpour. But at no time has enough rain fallen to swell the streams bank full. Letters from Iowa, Illinois, Dakota and Kansas reveal a different state of affairs. One from McGregor, Ia., May 14, says: "We have had three weeks steady rain and begin to feel blue. No corn has been planted." Another same date, Sheldon, Ia., says: "We have not seen the sun here for six weeks and the mud is six feet deep. Streets and roads are impassable." It must have rained there ever since, as a telegram from Fort Dodge, Ia., May 18, reported a flood by which many lives are reported lost. We have no such rains as those in Oregon.

A BAD CUSTOM.—The need of horses furnished in the city to draw horse carts was shown at Wednesday's fire. The horse carts and hook and ladder truck were each drawn to the fire by a single horse hitched to an express wagon that happened to be near. Men got on the wagon and on the fire apparatus until the poor beast was compelled to pull two vehicles, two loads of men, and almost a good load for two horses besides. This is over-loading one horse to say the least.

OREGON WHEAT.—While the late wet spring has kept back seedling on the lower prairies, and on Howell and French prairies they have been fairly finished sowing oats, the hill lands are well advanced in respect to grain crops. We are in receipt of a sample of fall wheat four feet high and all headed out from a sixty acre patch of C. J. Ramsden, near Macleay, eight miles east of Salem. It is the regulation Oregon white wheat and presents a thrifty growth and good color. Oregon never fails to have wheat and good wheat and lots of it.

GOOD WORK.—The general comment on the work of the Salem fire department at the Sloper fire is that it was excellently done. The building was saved and the engines responded to a second call when the alarm was again given that the smoldering embers had broken out afresh.
