COUNTY ATTORNEYS.—One of the speakers at Macleay favored a county prosecuting attorney for each county. That would cost each county about \$1000, if an attorney of any ability was procured. Under the present system of a district attorney for five or six counties it costs a county \$500 to \$800 a year. The deputy attorney's fees in this county amount to from \$200 to \$300 a year. It is hard to see how a county attorney would effect any saving even in a large county like Marion. In small counties it would cost two or three times what it does at present. If a county attorney could be paid the fees fixed at present, there might be a saving, but another county office would be created.

OPEN CHEMOKETA STREET.—As was suggested in the JOURNAL a few days since, Chemoketa street should be opened out to full width, and put to grade to its full length. Many citizens are interested, and the writer is informed that the consent of property owners has been secured, also that a petition will be circulated to secure this improvement at once. ATTORNEY GENERAL.

THE JOURNAL has not joined in any of the newspaper attacks on Mr. Webster, Republican candidate for attorney general of the state. On the other hand it severely criticised the appointment by Governor Penney of our present attorney general, Geo. Chamberlain, of Albany. Under the circumstances we feel it but our duty to say to our readers that Mr. Chamberlain has made an official record that causes us most agreeable disappointment. He has proved to be a champion of people's measures and an able one.

Without disparaging the claims of Mr. Webster, and not knowing but that he will be just as good an official, we wish to call attention to the fact that Mr. Chamberlain is an educated gentleman, an able lawyer and, what is more, a clear-sighted, independent judicial adviser. He has fought to establish and uphold the railroad commission in its work of reducing freight rates and the state board of equalization in its work of equalization of taxes and placing more of the burdens of state and county taxes upon the tax-dodging corporations. On all other matters of public importance Mr. Chamberlain has been squarely and vigorously upon the side of the people's interests, and in the above cases he had the spirit and independence to differ radically from the power that appointed him. That the people should be advised of the record of such an official we deem it no more than our duty. The judicial offices should be elevated above the prejudices of party spirit and disinterested taxpayers should uphold Mr. Chamberlain who is now a candidate for their ballots.

THE JOURNAL AND HERMANN.

We wish it to be distinctly understood that no candidate for the congressional nomination in this district ever directly or indirectly suggested any of the criticisms of Mr. Hermann that have been published in THE JOURNAL. Such an impression is without any foundation whatever.
