THE JUNE RACES.

Two Special Purses Secured—Other Business.
At the meeting of the Oregon Breeding and Speed Association held last evening two special purses were provided for. As there were not sufficient entries for race No. 10, it was decided to give a grand free for all special trot, three in five, on Saturday, the entries to close the evening before.

A special trot for two year olds was fixed for Friday, with mile heats, best two in three. A purse of \$150 is provided, and entries will close June 1st.
W. J. Irwin and W. D. Claggett were appointed a committee to put the track in ship shape which insures its good condition.
Capt. J. T. Apperson, J. L. Hall and D. N. Loomie will be asked to serve as judges, and these gentlemen will no doubt act. A committee was also appointed to canvass for the sale of season tickets in the interest of the association. The admission fee has been fixed at 50 cents, ladies free.

The association feel sure the people will sustain this effort to establish regular June races at Salem, and earnestly solicit a liberal patronage.

SCHOOL TEACHERS.—The school board will now be engaged employing the corps of teachers for the Salem schools for 1902-3. About \$15,000 to \$20,000 will be paid out for teachers this coming year, and as the second city of the state, Salem will no doubt again have a fine corps. The people are entitled to have the very best teachers that the money set aside for that purpose will engage, no matter where they come from. As we understand it, teachers from all over the state and coast are free to apply upon equal terms with local teachers.

THE THIEF DISCOVERED.

J. W. Eves' \$800 Was Stolen by a Hotel Porter.
Jno. Dietrich, for some years porter at Hotel Willamette, was arrested Monday night at a house of ill-fame charged with larceny of \$800 lost by J. W. Eves, May 5th, who had trouble with his wife at that time in Salem.

Mr. Wagner had suspected the fellow for some time of having the money, and when Sunday it was given out by Dietrich that he had drawn a \$900 prize in the Louisiana lottery, where he had been investing his spare change in blanks for some time. Mr. Wagner located the thief, Landford Wagner had also discovered that he had \$500 on deposit at Anderson's saloon. After notifying Anderson to hold the money, they turned the case over to the Salem police.

ARRESTED.

Marshal Minto found his man at a ferry street bagnio. He has been spending money freely at the saloons for some time and had been under the eye of the police. When arrested he at first denied the theft, but after awhile broke down and confessed the crime. He took the money, according to his statement, on the morning after it was thrown under the washstand, having stolen it while Mrs. Eves was out of the room.

MRS. EVES
no doubt had the money in her mind and knew where it was when she had her husband arrested at the hotel, but Dietrich got there ahead of her.
It will be remembered that Eves first deposited his money in the hotel safe. He then withdrew it and took it to his room. While on a spree it got away from him. He either threw it under the wash stand or his wife did, and it disappeared. The woman seemed at ease about it at first, but later claimed all knowledge of it and now appears innocent, and Eves was innocent so far as hiding it from her.

Dietrich no doubt got his eyes on it when Eves drew it out of the hotel safe and followed it successfully.
Dietrich was brought before Judge Goodell this morning, and bound over in the sum of \$1000, to appear before the grand jury. He is now in jail.

ROSES AND STRAWBERRIES.

The Date for the Annual Fair at Salem Set for June 9, 10, 11.
The first strawberries are ripening and the committee of the Marion County Fruit Growers' association in charge of the annual show have decided on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 9, 10 and 11 as date.

TURF TOPICS.

Millard Sanders will exhibit from Frou and Fausta, the champion yearlings, now 2 years old, in the east this season.

Jay Bird, foaled in 1878, is the young sire of a 2:10 trotter. Allerton entered that exclusive list when his sire was but thirteen years of age.

Sprague Goldstein, that made a record of 2:16 1/4 at Buffalo in August last, and went lame the following week, will be campaigned again this season.

Attempts to deceive in pedigree, when discovered, are met with promptness in England. One Hopkins manufactured a pedigree for a hackney, and was sentenced to three months in jail at hard labor.

The well known California turfman, Monroe Salisbury, says that almost any trotter can be made to pace, and that frequently horses having no speed at the trot will when taught to pace develop a speed of 2:20.

The dams of many of the fastest horses in the world have been low priced mares. Oliver K was sold with his dam for \$150, Jack's dam for \$75, McDool's dam for \$140, Allerton's for \$200, and Axtell's dam cost \$150.

Up to the time that Mr. Robert Bonner purchased Dexter and retired him no horse had ever appeared that could give him a race. He retired with a record of 2:17 1/4. What his real capacity was will never be known.

If the present trouble among foals of 1893 continues there will be a shortage of trotting stock when the animals that were foaled this year should naturally come into the market. In all parts of the country there has been a high death rate among trotting bred foals.

RAILROAD JOTTINGS.

Germany possesses 24,613 miles of railways; France, 21,396; Great Britain and Ireland, 19,211; Russia, 17,823; and Austria, 15,443 miles.

Captain Joel B. Sawyer, of Denison, Tex., is supposed to be the oldest locomotive engineer now living in this country. He ran an engine on the Boston and Worcester road in 1825.

The Virginia and Carolina railroad was sold at public auction for \$75,000. It was purchased by the city of Pittsburgh, which held \$100,000 worth of first mortgage bonds, with about \$20,000 interest.

All the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western passenger trains are being equipped with whistle signals connected with the engineer's cab for use instead of the bellcords. They are operated by compressed air.

General Traffic Manager John Taylor, of the Philadelphia and Reading, announces the appointment of John H. Jones as general agent to cover all lines owned, leased and controlled by the company, with office in Manhattan Life building, Philadelphia.

On southern roads, especially in the extreme southern sections, the old custom of burning oil in dingy, smoky lamps still exists, not only to the discomfort of travelers, but in the face of the constant danger that always attends the use of oil on railroad trains in case of accident or fire. The press of the south has taken the question up and demands gas lighted cars.
