**EASTERN FLOODS.**—The eastern press and travelers tell of the awful damage done by rains and floods in the Mississippi valley. Sioux City and Des Moines, Iowa, have suffered greatly, the personal losses at the former place are estimated at \$346,000. After giving a list of the dead bodies recovered the Journal of Sioux City, May 21, says: "The day opened with the wind blowing a gale. At 7:30 it began snowing, and instead of a mere freakish flurry the storm steadily increased, until at 10 o'clock it was almost a blizzard with driving wind and cutting particles of fine hard snow. **COLUMBUS DAY, OCTOBER 12, 1892.**  
To the Teachers of the American Public Schools, the Executive Committee of the Columbian Public School Celebration sends the following Message:

The 400th Anniversary of the Discovery of America will be the most important of the Centennial observances through which we have passed. It will be marked in Chicago by the dedication of the Columbian Exposition grounds; and should be celebrated everywhere in America by fitting exercises.

To the Public Schools this Day presents a great opportunity. It is in their power to make themselves the centers of all local demonstrations.

This leadership by the Public Schools was first proposed by "The Youth's Companion." The World's Congress Auxiliary of the Columbian Exposition, through its President, followed with a request that the Day be celebrated systematically throughout America, and suggested that the Public Schools lead in each local celebration.

The department of superintendence of the National Educational association, at its annual meeting in February, 1892, endorsed the proposal and appointed the state superintendents of education as a general committee to lead the celebration in their several states. An executive committee was also elected to prepare a uniform program for use in every locality in the Republic, and to take charge of the movement.

The striking fitness of such a public school demonstration will appeal to every patriotic teacher.

It will give worthy prominence to the common school as the fruit of four centuries of American life. It will bring before the eyes of our nation and the world, on a scale of proper magnitude, what North American civilization owes to free education. It will also be a valuable lesson in intelligent patriotism to over thirteen millions of pupils in the public schools.

On September 1st, the official program will be published, uniform for all localities. It will be simple; but impressive and worthy of the day. It will provide for a morning celebration in the school houses, especially for the pupils; and for an afternoon celebration in the largest hall, designed for the public generally; and at which the older pupils will be present by delegation or en masse. This afternoon celebration may be preceded by a grand procession.

The official program will provide that one of the exercises at the school houses shall be raising and saluting the flag. No school should be without its flag on that day. Schools yet without flags will be aided in obtaining them if they address the chairman of this committee, Francis Bellamy, Boston, Mass. Care of Youth's Companion.

"Aaron said I should come home in two years, but our first baby was born about that time an I couldn't come then, an somehow or other there wasn't no time after that when I could come. But I ain't blamin' Aaron. He'd been willin' fer me to come if I could of got off. Aaron, he's been back twice. It was easier fer him to git away than fer me."

"I'll find changes! La me! yes. There's skanky any one left that I know, but I've got an own sister an a brother who'll be glad to see me. An the old house I was born in is still standin'. I know just how it looks. Some things'll be jist as natchrel. There don't nobody know how glad I'll be to git back home. I'll be home in the mornin'. Here you, Mr. Porter, mind that you git me upairly. But, la me! I ain't likely to oversleep so high home."

But she was not awake in the morning when all the other passengers were up and dressed. The porter called her, but there was no response, and one of the ladies in the car parted the curtains of the old lady's berth and stepped back with a frightened look, saying in a whisper: "She is dead!"

**Danger in Smoking Rooms.**  
Remaining in closed rooms in which smoke is sometimes so thick that one cannot see is particularly to be avoided by people who are subject to weakness of the heart, even if they do not smoke. Dr. Vallin has recited before the Society of Medicine three conclusive facts in this respect. One told of a young officer who had given up the use of tobacco who three months before, and who was overcome with a suffocation similar to angina, after having passed two or three nights in his room where his friends had been in the habit of coming to smoke.

The case recalls an epidemic of the same disease observed by Dr. Golincau among some sailors who were crowded in the hold of a tramp steamer. They were obliged during a storm to cover the hatchways and smoked to excess in order to have something to do. Even those who themselves did not smoke were stricken like the others, for they had inhaled the same poisonous air and subjected themselves to the action of nicotine upon the lungs.—Jules Rochard in Revue des Deux Mondes.

**Odors of Sicknes.**  
In gout the skin secretions take a special odor which Sydenham compares to that of whey. In jaundice the odor is of musk; in opipilation, of vinegar; of sour beer in scrofula; of warm bread in intermittent fever; the smell is of hay or rather of acetone, being due to mixture, in variable proportions, of these two bodies.—Doctor.
