HAPPY IN OREGON.

Supt. Derby of the Car Line Glad to be Back—The Street Railway.

Supt. F. N. Derby of the Salem street railway has returned from an extended tour through the East. He says: "I have been at Lincoln, Omaha, Sioux City, and in many of the best towns of Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois and Dakota, and found the most backward spring ever known there. The people are dissatisfied and crop prospects are bad, particularly the corn crop, which in the north of Iowa can not be got in so as to raise any crop. The same is true of Eastern Nebraska. A large part of the small grain is drowned out. In Illinois there is also nothing but water."

"I visited the world's fair buildings and regretted to find no preparation for an Oregon exhibit. California will make a great show. The Oregon advertising car sent through the East was a great means of advertising the state.
"I never thought so much of the Willamette valley and Salem as since my return. I left the East in a blizzard and was glad to get out of the wet and cold into the rich region and mild climate of this part of Oregon. There will not be a foot of land from Portland to the head of the valley that will not be worth \$100 to \$200 an acre within ten years. If the people here will pull together Salem can have 50,000 people in ten years."

THE CAR LINE.

"We have good rails and good cars and the lines can be converted into motor or electric system. We can not afford to tear this track all up and throw it in the river and we have been in hopes of getting permission to put on a good rapid transit motor power that would give the people a good service and enable us to extend the plant. If the council will give us a chance to do this we will go ahead and invest some money. If the council will not allow us to develop the system in the only practical way, we must leave it as it is and it will be no benefit to us and no credit to the city. We do not want to see the people handed over to one monopoly and desire to give the city a first class competing system, for which there is room."
