WITH COLORS FLYING.

Stars and Stripes Float From
Another School House.

THE PARK SCHOOL FLAG RAISING.

School Children, Veterans, Wo-
man's Relief Corps and
Citizens Too.

Amid wild flowers, in a natural
forest, and surrounded by neat new
cottages stands the Park school
fully a mile from the postoffice and
Friday afternoon it was surrounded
by an army of school children with
banners, to witness the impressive
ceremony of a flag raising over the
new Park school. It was a very
impressive occasion long to be re-
membered by every child present.

IN THE ROOMS.

In the first primary room, Miss
Carrie K. Bentley teacher, there was
a regular rose show, and each scholar
held a flag. Mrs. McAdams who
teaches the third primary had her
room decorated with flowers, draw-
ings on the blackboard of a flag and
President Harrison. Pictures of
President and Martha Washington.
In the second primary Miss Cros-
sett had flags, flowers and a picture
of Washington and drawings on all
the boards. The children rendered
the Boat Song from Mother Goose
school melodies for the benefit of
the reporter. It was nicely rendered,
and then the bell tapped to the great
relief of all the urchins, as a signal
that they were to march out and
join in the festivities.

MARCHING COLUMNS

of school children came from each
direction of the compass, led by
their generals, the teachers. The
North school was first on the ground,
the Lincoln school followed, coming
through Pleasant Home addition.
The Central arrived and when the
East school poured in solid ranks of
nearly a thousand the crowd was
complete. City Superintendent
Grubbe arranged the schools in
platoons.

THE VETERANS.

Sedgwick post turned out nearly
a hundred strong, headed by Com-
mander Batchelor, and a host of
officials, and ex-officials. The Re-
lief Corps, who are also entitled to
be called veterans, were out in full
force.

ON THE PLATFORM.

which was beautifully decorated
with wild flowers and evergreens
there were gathered the board of
education, the committee of the
Grand Army, state officials and over
all a wreathed picture of President
Harrison. At 3:30 the little ones in
gala dress marched out to drum
taps, the platoons coming up to the
front steps and then all was ready.

The children sang "America," as
usual, the little ones leading and
dancing all competitors, for which
they were heartily applauded. The
same children then sang without
accompaniment in excellent time
and fairly good expression "The
Battle Hymn of the Republic."
Leslie Campbell recited "Barbara
Fritchie," the valorous old lady of
Fredricktown who defied Stonewall
Jackson, in a spirited manner. The
"Red, White and Blue" was sweetly
represented by three little misses in
costume. They were immense
sashes, waved flags and spoke well.
Ralph Williams spoke a patriotic
piece and was followed by Clyde
Pattie, who also waved the stars and
stripes.

THE PRESENTATION

address, by J. H. Albert, who found
it inconvenient to be present, was
read by Mrs. Supt. Grubbe. It was
warmly applauded and so were the
fitting words spoken in addition
thereto by Mrs. Grubbe. Mrs. Mc-
Adams accepted the flag on behalf
of the Park school in a short speech
of response that was also warmly ap-
plauded.

THE FLAG RAISED.

Cheers rent the air as a deputation
of veterans sent the beautiful bar-
ner flying in the breeze. The little
fellows nearly split their throats and
many a veteran swung his hat as
the wind caught the folds and whip-
ped them out in the stiff western
breeze that came over the coast
range from the boundless Pacific
ocean.

MORE FLAG

was now displayed by the Park
school children in a responsive
chorus. Then followed a chorus
recitation by Miss Bentley's room.
It was all flags, hurrahs, patriotism
and the little ones seemed never to
tire of it.

ly standing by the flag. He stirred
the blood of old and young by his
patriotic sentiments. Hon. E. M.
Waite for the board of education
thanked the children and the citi-
zens for being present and especially
the G. A. R. men.

The children now sang "Colum-
bia." Only two verses were to be sung,
but after the children got started they
sang it right through and nobody
could stop them. The Park flag
raising was a highly successful af-
fair.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOL MONEY.

The Salem schools have been
quite fortunate in having a good
class of men for a board of educa-
tion. They have built up a fine sys-
tem of schools, and are affording the
children of the people good public
school facilities. No one will pre-
tend that perfection has been reached
who really understands the nature
of our public schools, springing as
they do, from the heart, brain, and
patriotic impulses of a great free
people. The schools will develop
and progress with the devel-
opment and advancement of our
civilization. It is this great fact
that underlies the growth of nor-
mal schools and all progress in the
science of education. It is a fact
that there is a growing demand for
professional qualifications on the
part of the teachers for our pub-
lic schools. This is more true in
the larger cities, and the time in
Salem when persons can be hired to
teach for any feelings of kindness
or charity has long since past.

For several years the Salem board
of education has sought to employ
as far as possible only profession-
ally equipped teachers—teachers
who have gained by years of experi-
ence, or equipment at normal
schools, that constitutes them compe-
tent professional
