A fine audience was present Tuesday evening at the M. E. church to witness public interest in the Oregon Institute for the Education of the Blind. State Superintendent McElroy, and many prominent people were present. The teachers in the literary department, who are E. S. Bollinger, Supt., and Miss M. J. McFadden, and Miss Pearl Scott in the musical department have a hard year's work behind them, and certainly can feel proud of the result of their labors.
