CANAL CONVENTION.

Meets in St. Louis. Twenty-five
States Represented.

St. Louis, June 2.—Quietly, as
became the representatives of the
country's commercial interests, dele-
gates from twenty-five or more states
and various commercial bodies of
the Union gathered this morning in
the entertainment hall of the Expo-
sition building to open the Niaga-
ra canal convention. The con-
vention chose ex-Governor E. O.
Standard, of St. Louis, as the tem-
porary presiding officer. D. H. Mc-
Adam and J. C. Broadwell were
elected secretaries. The usual com-
mittees, one for each state on
credentials, permanent organiza-
tions and resolutions were appointed.
Then Governor D. R. Francis, of
Missouri, welcomed the delegates to
the state. At the close of Governor
Francis' address, Hon. M. M. Este-
e, of California, was called upon and
explained the purposes and objects
of the gathering which had the in-
ception in his state.

LONDON, June 2.—Acting gov-
ernor Jermingham's letter to the Lord
Mayor of London, appealing for
help for the sufferers in Mauritius
says over 20,000 people are homeless,
3,000 houses in Port Louis are in
ruins. Lieut. Berkley Hill says the
scene at Port Louis on Sunday was
most dreadful, the stench from the
many decomposing corpses laying
in the ruins is sickening. The search
for the bodies is horrid work. There
is employment for 5,000 men if we
had them. All drains are blocked,
and it is feared an epidemic of vi-
olent disease will follow the stagna-
tion of the sewerage.
