The Latest Flying Machine.

Another new flying machine of a most
remarkable and novel design has just
been completed by a firm in Coventry,
England. When the order was placed
with this firm about a year ago, the
machine was modeled after the anatomy
of the flying bat, but after nearly com-
pleting a machine designed on these
lines, the inventor discovered that the
anatomy of the flying fox contained
some very superior advantages over that
of the bat for flying machine purposes,
and accordingly ordered the design of
his machine to be changed, so as to con-
form to the fox's anatomy.
The wings are of immense size, meas-
uring 17 feet 6 inches by 8 feet 6 inches
over the widest part, and are slightly
convex. They are to be covered with a
special double woven silk, which will
be in one continuous piece over the
body and both wings. The body, which
is a careful reproduction of the shape of
a flying fox, and which is to contain the
motor, is composed of welded steel
tubes, to which the wings are hinged.
These have a sweep of twenty-four feet,
and are to make fifty strokes a minute.
Together their weight is 340 pounds, and
the necessary power is expected to be
furnished by a three horse power motor.
Wheels are placed on the bottom of the
machine, so that when it alights it will
run along the ground.—New York Tele-
gram.

Trafalgar Veterans.

For the two last Trafalgar veterans to
die within a week of one another is a
curious coincidence. Scarcely have we
time to notice the end of Louis Carigny,
who was in his 101st year and served in
1803 on board the Redoubtable, than the
news comes from Spain of the death of
a fellow centenarian who shared his
honor in having been present at Trafalgar.
A Madrid correspondent writes:
"At San Fernando, in the hospital for
naval pensioners, died this week Don
Gasper Costela y Vasquez, the last sur-
vivor of the Spanish sailors who were
present at the battle of Trafalgar. Born
in 1737, the veteran was 105 years old,
and preserved his mental faculties to the
last days of his life. He was always
proud of relating his adventures in the
famous sea fight."—Army and Navy
Gazette.

Potatoes Growing Like Pease.

Wellbought and Cheaper in their
explorations in the Colombian Andes,
have discovered a species of potato,
the vines of which were covered
with well developed tubers growing
in the open air like pease or toma-
toes. Each potato is protected by a
thin film or membrane, not unlike
that which envelops the "ground
cherry." They do not grow in clus-
ters, each being given plenty of space
in which to thoroughly mature. The
natives say that during the dry sea-
son the membrane surrounding each
potato is filled with water, which in
a measure protects it from the rays
of the sun.—St. Louis Republic.

From Fron, 22514, the champion year-
