

Norman a strong following, and Hill but few friends.

Depew, of New York, will nominate Harrison, and Col. Henry M. Duffield, of Michigan, will probably present Alger's name.

The Republican national committee will begin its sessions this morning and arrange details for conducting the convention. But the national committee will make up a temporary roll of delegates entitled to admission, and there are more contests this year than ever before. In more than eighty cases two persons are fighting for the same seats. The South furnishes a large number of disputes. The most bitter northern disputes come from Fort Wayne, Ind., where a McDonald man declares Harrison's delegates were not elected. Bets were made this evening of \$1000 even on Harrison's nomination against the field.

One of the liveliest contests to come before the convention will be the Gentle and Mormon factions of Utah, which are contesting for exclusive recognition. A confidential letter sent out by Utah Gentiles addressed to all delegates to the convention warns them against the Mormons and asks to have the contesting delegation denied admittance to the convention.

WOULD NOT MARRY HIM.

He Shot Her Twice, Then Ended His Own Life.

ELK, Cal., June 4.—Yesterday morning while Mrs. Scott, a widow with five children, was getting breakfast, William Harris, a laborer, went to the kitchen door and asked her to marry him, and upon her refusing, drew a revolver and shot her twice, one shot striking her in the left shoulder, the other in the right shoulder, dangerously wounding her. It is feared she will not recover. He then placed the revolver against his own side and shot himself fatally. He died two hours afterwards. Mrs. Scott is 27 years of age, having lived here for six months, moving from Cuffey's Cove to escape the attentions of Harris, who has been annoying her some time, trying to get her to marry him. Harris is a young man of good family, 25 years of age, and has lived in this vicinity all his life.

CENSUS INVESTIGATION.

Some Evidence That Has a Bad Look for the Superintendent.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—In the census investigation yesterday J. H. Wardell testified that while engineer in the bureau, he, by order, destroyed hundreds of thousands of official envelopes already addressed. Also that he burned five or six hundred feet of lumber for which the bureau paid from \$5.50 to \$6 per hundred. Superintendent Porter appointed persons who were generally known about the city as bad characters. Clara D. Boswell testified that while employed in punching enumerating slips the employees were told that speed, and not accuracy, was necessary, and they were driven like animals, many fainting under the strain. Favoritism was shown certain female clerks, and they were always young and pretty.

A TERRIBLE TORNADO.

Throws an Engine and Train Over an Embankment.

VIENNA, June 4.—The Agram-Brod mail train was wrecked by a tornado near Nowaka station Thursday night, and the passengers had a fearful experience. Suddenly complete darkness fell upon the train. The engineer and fireman crouched upon the floor of the engine. A terrific gust lifted the engine, weighing seventy tons, and five carriages, and threw them over an embankment into a cutting half full of water. The station at Nowaka was converted into a hospital for the injured, twenty-three in number.

BLAINE HAS RESIGNED

The Situation at Minneapolis Today.

James G. Blaine, of Maine. WASHINGTON, June 4.—Blaine has resigned.

Resignation Accepted. WASHINGTON, June 4.—Blaine's resignation has been accepted.

THE CORRESPONDENCE.

Between Blaine and President Harrison.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The following correspondence explains itself. "Department of state, Washington, D. C., June 4, '92. To the president. I respectfully beg leave to submit my resignation of the office of secretary of state of the United States, to which I was appointed by you on the 5th of March, 1889. The condition of the public business in the department of state, justifies my requesting my resignation may be accepted immediately. I have the honor to be, very respectfully, your obedient servant, James G. Blaine." "Executive Mansion, June 4, 1892. To the secretary: Your letter of this date tendering your resignation of the office of the secretary of state of the United States has been received. The terms in which you state your desires are such as to leave me no choice but to accede to your wishes at once. Your resignation is therefore accepted. Very respectfully yours, Benjamin Harrison." "To Hon. James G. Blaine."

How it Was Received at Minneapolis by the Blaine Men.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 4.—The news that Blaine had resigned and his resignation had been accepted by the president had created the wildest excitement here. The Blaine men are crazy with enthusiasm, cheer after cheer greeted the announcement in the West house. Clarkson Platt, Fassett and a score of other Blaine boomers insist this means Blaine's nomination on the first ballot and it really appears to be Blaine's stampede among the delegates and others. The Harrison managers for the first time lost their composure and declare they have got enough delegates to nominate Harrison and propose to do it anyhow.

Both Sides Confident.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 4.—The supreme confidence on one hand and the serene assurance on the other, expresses the presidential situation today. The problem is one which can only be solved in the convention. The announcement by Blaine that he will write no more letters is accepted as conclusive by all, and strange to say, both factions seem to find in it a source of congratulation. The Blaine men say it means he is in the hands of his friends, while the Harrison leaders hold it means any further expression is unnecessary, and that he stands by his letter to Clarkson withdrawing from the contest.

General New has a list of over 500 delegates, all of whom he claims will be either instructed or pledged to Harrison, and a supplementary list of forty or so, whom he thinks can be relied on for the president. Chairman Clarkson, however, has a list which puts Harrison's strength at just 238, while Sloat Fassett gives him 300 at the outside. Blaine's friends give no figures as to his strength but insist he will be nominated on the first ballot.

Chauncey M. Depew and T. C. Platt are among today's arrivals.

MISS BEARDSLEY'S FATE.

Her Body Found Floating in the Wishkah River.

PORTLAND, June 4.—A dispatch received from Aberdeen last night says that the body of Miss Ella Beardsley, who disappeared on May 23, was found floating in the Wishkah river yesterday. The indications point to accidental drowning. Miss Beardsley lived in Aberdeen, but was employed in a real estate office here. She went to Aberdeen on a visit to her parents several weeks ago. She intended to return to Portland on May 23. She arose early in the morning, and went for a row on the Wishkah river and was accidentally drowned. She was a remarkably handsome girl and made many friends while in this city. She was about twenty years old. The funeral will be held in Aberdeen today.

Heavy Rains in Pennsylvania. PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 4.—Advices from Pottsville, Reading and Scranton, are to the effect that heavy rains, amounting to a waterpout in some places, and in others accompanied by hail, prevailed in those regions last night, doing much damage to crops, and causing washouts on the railroads, which has blocked traffic.

Struck by Lightning.

GAINSVILLE, Ga., June 4.—Five men fishing took refuge from a storm under a tree, a bolt of lightning killed three and severely stunned the others. All of one family named Reeves.

Dynamiters.

KENSINGTON, Pa., June 4.—Dynamiters early this morning blew up the house of K. Turner, a jeweler, killing Turner and Emma Sheffer, and seriously injured Turner's wife and two children. A posse is hunting for the guilty persons.

THE PLATFORM.

What Will Probably Be the Main Features of It.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 4.—The platform, in which the Republican party will present its position to the voters of the country, is a subject of earnest consideration among the leaders. The silver plank will receive most careful consideration in order to meet the divergent views of the different sections. The declaration relative to federal elections is also a matter on which the delegates differ. The platform will begin with a general recitation of the record of the Republican party. Harrison's administration will be endorsed. The conduct of the foreign relations of the country by President Harrison and Secretary of State Blaine will be especially commended. The devotion of the Republican party to the principles of protection will be reaffirmed and the McKinley law indorsed. The reciprocity section of the bill will be the subject of special attention. The Springer free-wheel bill will be denounced as an attempt to destroy an industry of the American farmer. The silver plank is likely to be more liberal than that of other conventions, based upon the firm expectation of the administration that the approaching monetary conference will result in such agreements as will make it possible to utilize the silver product as money.

The right of every American citizen to cast his ballot and have it counted will be upheld as the greatest safeguard of Republican institutions. The necessity of the rehabilitation of the American merchant marine will be set forth, and the laws passed in aid of American shipping will be approved. The completion of the coast defenses will also be urged as necessary to the protection of the country. A careful supervision of immigration will be recommended, and approval be given to the exclusion of contract and Chinese labor. The party will renew the acknowledgment of its obligations to the soldiers and sailors who fought for the Union. The Nicaragua canal project will be indorsed, and reference be made to the important measures passed by the fifty-first congress for the good of the country. Home rule for Ireland may possibly find a place in the platform. An open declaration favoring civil service will also be made. The platform will see to it that no charge shall be made against the Republican party in connection with the Bennett school law. A vigorous effort will be made by Chicagoans to have the convention indorse the bill for government aid to the fair.

A memorial to the national committee has been prepared, asking for the following proposed sixteenth amendment to the constitution.

"No state shall pass any law, respecting the establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or use its property or credit, or any money raised by taxation, or authorize either to be used for the purpose of founding, maintaining, or aiding by appropriation, payment for services, expenses, or otherwise, any church, religious denomination, or religious society, or any institution, society, or undertaking, which wholly, or in part, is under sectarian or ecclesiastical control."

The memorial sets forth the amendment was introduced in both houses of the fifty-second congress, and is in accord with a similar one proposed in 1876 by President Grant.

FELL OFF THE BRIDGE.

And Was Killed. He Had Been Drinking.

ALBANY, Or., June 4.—William Tellea, a gardner, living across the river, in Benton county, fell off the new bridge across the Willamette last night, and was killed. He had been drinking, and had started home about midnight intoxicated. The body was found lying on the opposite side of the bank, this morning. He was aged about 50, and had no family and little means.

The High Water.

CHICAGO, June 4.—Advices to the Associated Press show that the Mississippi river is rising at and above St. Louis with a probability it will not begin to fall until the arrival of the June rise. It is giving cause for grave apprehension when that event takes place. The Arkansas and other rivers in the South, where the recent heavy rains have fallen also continue to rise and threaten further destruction to property.

Hospital Burned.

STOCKTON, Cal., June 4.—The county hospital, a three-story wooden building, located one mile from the center of the city, was burned to the ground yesterday, and but little of its contents was saved. There were 140 patients in the building, and all were rescued. The fire originated in the range in the kitchen, and with a high wind was quickly communicated with the main building. Loss, \$30,000; insurance, \$14,000.

Violated the Lottery Law.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 4.—One of the stores of this city offered a list of prizes to be drawn by holders of tickets issued to the firm's customers between this and July 4. Yesterday the postoffice officials refused to circulate the La Grande Gazette containing an advertisement of the drawing, claiming it was contrary to the provisions of the lottery law.

RECIPROCITY WITH MEXICO.

A Move to Be Made With That End in View.

MONTREAL, Cal. June 4.—From private advices received in this city it is reported that Romaldo Pacheco, United States minister to Guatemala, who is well known in this place, is soon to displace Minister Ryan as the accredited representative of the United States in Mexico. This contemplated change in Pacheco's mission is said to be due to the desire of our secretary of state to successfully establish reciprocity with Mexico. The negotiations between our government and Guatemala, which resulted in the adoption of reciprocity by the latter, were managed by Pacheco, who is of Spanish origin, and peculiarly adapted for such delicate diplomatic work. This success has inspired the administration with the belief that Pacheco can induce the Mexican government to respond to its desire for closer reciprocal relations. What disposition is to be made of Ryan cannot be ascertained. Pacheco will leave San Francisco for Guatemala on Saturday, but is expected to return soon to assume his duties at his new post.

PACHCO HAS NOT HEARD OF IT. SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—Minister Pacheco was seen at a late hour last night regarding the dispatch from Monterey. He said: "I personally have heard nothing about the matter, and therefore I think the news must be unfounded. I sail for Guatemala on the San Juan on Monday, and orders must come very suddenly to prevent my departure. You can say there is really nothing in the rumor, as I should have been sure to have been the first to be officially informed."

JIM DORSEY AGAIN.

A Noted Jail-Breaker Again in the Toils.

DENVER, Colo., June 4.—Jim Dorsey, who was arrested at the Union depot, turns out to be a noted crook. W. A. Pinkerton, head of the agency, says he is a much-wanted man. He gives as his first acquaintance with him the time he put him under arrest at Garfield Park, Chicago, four years ago. Dorsey gave bail and got away. Later he was arrested in Portland, Or., and escaped by breaking jail. He was arrested in Minneapolis later, but got away before the Portland officers reached that place. He was later arrested in Los Angeles. He then escaped by knocking down the sheriff in the courtroom, and came to Denver only to fall into the toils through the vigilance of Officer Anderson. He is held in the county jail to await the action of the California authorities.

Children Killed by Lightning.

SCANTON, Pa., June 4.—A terrible thunder storm played havoc throughout Lackawanna county. It began early in the evening and continued until 3 in the morning. Three boys and one girl were struck by lightning, two being killed outright and the other fatally injured. When the storm first came up two Polish boys, Joseph and Casimir Cholewicki, were caught beneath a large oak tree in South Scranton. Casimir was part of the way up the tree, while Joseph was standing underneath, when it was struck by lightning. Joseph was instantly killed and Casimir was set on fire by the electric fluid. He was frightfully burned before aid could reach him, and he died this morning. In Hyde Park section the 2-year-old son of Sylvester Arnold was struck and fatally injured. At Elmhurst, seven miles east of this city, a girl named Andrews, while seeking shelter under a tree, was killed by a thunderbolt.

Confesses.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., June 4.—In 1884 Chas. Crawford was convicted of the murder of Christian Bolt on circumstantial evidence, and sentenced to San Quentin prison for life. Yesterday the Times-Index received a letter post-marked San Francisco, and signed Charley Canuts, which stated that the writer, who was the principal witness against Crawford, killed Bolt himself, and that it was a put-up job to send Crawford to prison. After saying he is the most miserable man on earth, the writer intimates that he is going to commit suicide.

She Was Banished.

NOGALES, Ariz., June 4.—The Santa de Cabora, a young Mexican lady who claims divine power, arrived here yesterday under guard of twenty-five Mexican soldiers, under sentence of banishment from her native land. The Mexican government alleges that she instigated the late uprising of Mayo Indians in which they attacked Coherit, Sonora, and murdered the mayor and a few others. She claims to have divine power in healing the sick, etc. Hundreds of sympathizers met her at the line and escorted her on to American soil.

Republicans in Portland.

PORTLAND, June 4.—Republicans held a rousing mass meeting at the plaza last night, the final one of the campaign. The principal speaker of the evening was Hon. R. G. Horr, who held a crowd of several thousand people for over an hour. Other speakers also addressed the people. Democrats and Citizens also held their final ratification meeting at the tabernacle. The audience was addressed by local speakers.
