THE STATE CANVASS.

How it Appears to a Portland Politician.

ENDS IN REPUBLICAN SUCCESS.

No Doubt About the Election of Hermann and Ellis for Congressmen.

PORTLAND, June 6.—The campaign has ended so far as public meetings are concerned, and managers of both parties spent the remainder of the time in perfecting details. Speaking Saturday evening about the probable outcome of the election Chairman Boise of the Republican state central committee said: "The Republican plurality in the state will be at least 7500 and may reach 10,000. The canvass of congressional candidates has been principally on tariff issue, and the vote for these candidates will be the true index to party strength in the state. Hermann and Ellis will both receive good majorities, and there has not been a doubt from the first about their election. The contest for supreme judge and attorney general, on the other hand, has been a personal one, and Democrats have made a strong fight for the latter offices. The fact that the People's party have named no candidate for attorney general may throw a portion of that vote to the Democrats and thereby diminish the plurality of Webster for attorney general." Mr. Boise expressed the opinion that the People's party will cast from 10,000 to 12,000 votes in the state. It is understood that the Democrats have given up all hope of electing any of their men with the exception of attorney general.

INTERVIEW WITH BLAINE.

He Tells Why He Resigned From the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—In an interview with Secretary Blaine late Saturday he said the resignation was not occasioned by the near approach of the Republican convention and would not affect his action to the slightest extent. The question of his candidacy or acceptance, if preferred, the nomination did not influence him in deciding to retire from the state department. His only object was to obtain personal freedom and peace. Then he proceeded to indicate the reasons why he resigned. He felt superfluous because of the constant discussion of his name in connection with the presidential nomination. To this was added the annoyance of the sensational rumors constantly placed in circulation as to his being secretly working to accomplish Harrison's defeat, and at the same time encouraging his friends to a similar course. Without any reference to the truthfulness, plausibility or practicability of these reports, they apparently had a perceptible effect upon the president's personal friends and most intimate advisers. The feeling daily grew upon Blaine. He was regarded with suspicion and distrust, and the friends of the administration practically considered him guilty of duplicity, and even his associates in the cabinet seemed to look upon him with silent reproach. There also seemed to be a constant desire to humiliate him by urging the necessity of a further public declaration that he was not a candidate for Republican nomination. These thoughts and suspicions constantly preyed on upon Blaine's mind until the worry and annoyance became intolerable and he determined to resign, and having fully decided upon the course he desired a speedy settlement of the whole matter, in order that he might enjoy the rest of a private citizen, which was denied him as a part and parcel of the administration.

Colored Men Organize.

CHICAGO, June 6.—A large majority of the delegates to the Minneapolis convention passed through Chicago today. Interviews with them did not develop anything interesting in the political situation. A large number of colored Republicans from Texas, Ohio and Illinois met in this city Saturday. The meeting was called for the purpose of adopting plans for a redress of the wrongs which the colored people of the South are said to be subjected to. Long proambles and resolutions were presented, the former reciting the alleged grievances and wrongs which the colored
