WHAT IS KNOWN.

Returns Are Very Un satisfactory.—Hermann's Majority.

PORTLAND, June 8.—Enough is known to be almost certain who has been elected. Hermann's majority in the first district is already over 4000. Ellis in the second district will have close to 2500 majority. Moore's majority for supreme judge is much less and will hardly exceed 1500. Chamberlain now leads Webster by 500. From present appearances the legislature will stand—Senate, Republicans 18, Democrats 12; house, Republicans 36, Democrats 24.

PORTLAND, June 8.—The count of Multnomah will not be finished before Thursday morning.

MORROW COUNTY.

HEPPNER, June 8.—The returns from 11 out of a total of 14 precincts give Ellis 455, Luce 220, Slater 313. It is conceded that Ellis carries the county by 150. Eight precincts give A. S. Bennett 75 majority over Moore, and Chamberlain 53 over Webster. The complete returns will increase Bennett's majority to 125. J. N. Brown, Rep. was elected by about 150 majority over Thom 390, Dem. The Alliance party polled about 200 in the county, but elected no officers. The Republicans elected half the county ticket.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY.

OREGON CITY, June 8.—Twenty-one out of thirty-five precincts give Hermann 1253, Rork 643, Veatch 638, supreme judge, Bennett 699, Moore 1143, Walker 676; attorney general, Chamberlain 1010, Webster 1306; circuit judge, McBride 1065, Har 785; state board of equalization, Wingate 1408, Crandall 951; Hayes, Rep., elected state senator.

OREGON CITY, June 8.—Twenty six out of thirty-five precincts give for congress Hermann 1413, against 1488 two years ago, Rork 860, Veatch 816. Supreme judge Moore 1280, Bennett 831, Walker 801. Attorney general, Webster 1510, Chamberlain 1237; circuit judge, McBride 1935, Har 1614; board of equalization, Wingate 1612, Crandall 1180, Hayes Rep., is elected a senator and the three representatives are probably Republican. The county ticket is Republican except a school superintendent.

The Latest.

PORTLAND, Or., June 8.—Returns from the state are very meagre, and few received do not materially change the situation. The vote is not all counted yet in this county. Indications are, Webster's majority in the county will not exceed six hundred. People's party in Josephine county have probably elected a representative. The county ticket is still close and will take complete returns to determine the result. Kelly, Independent, for sheriff, is probably elected.

Oil City—Titusville.

OIL CITY, Pa., June 8.—Mayor Hunt issued a proclamation yesterday calling upon all business men to close their establishments so that all could engage in the work necessary to recover from the present condition of the city. That many of the victims will never be found is certain. The swift current has carried many away, the flames have turned others to cinders, and the crumbling banks have made their grave.

TITUSVILLE, June 8.—Railroad tracks are washed away above the city for a distance of fifteen or twenty miles and travel both north and south is cut off for the present. The facilities for caring for the dead are limited, and sixteen unrecognizable bodies placed in sacks and laid aside until they could receive further attention. Coroner Strauss empaneled a jury and viewed the remains. He said the verdict could be nothing else than an "act of Providence." Every bridge in the county, with the exception of three railway bridges, is swept away, and the roads are so badly torn up that it will cost an immense sum to repair them. Hundreds of families are homeless and great distress prevails.

OIL CITY, June 8.—Seven unidentified victims of Sunday night's fire and flood were buried this morning. The relief fund in this city and Titusville now amounts to \$63,500. Seven hundred people have already been aided. It is believed the number will run up to 800. The people have recovered from the stunning effects of the blow and the work of removing the ruins is being actively executed, 500 men are at work.

TITUSVILLE, June 8.—About forty funerals will be held here today. The work of searching for the bodies is being actively carried on. It is supposed many have lodged under piles of rubbish. Disinfectants are being freely used to prevent the spread of disease. Many are already sick through the excitement and exposure.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—Telegraphic instructions have been received from General Thos. H. Ruger, now inspecting the department of Columbia, relieving Batteries A and C of the Fifth artillery from duty in this department, and ordering them to proceed as soon as possible and take station at Fort Canby. The arrival of Batteries A and C at Fort Canby will relieve from duty Batteries L and D, and they will be returned to this station.

Republican Convention.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 8.—It is said the committee on credentials will not report before tomorrow, and the ballot will not likely be reached till Friday. Up to 11 a. m. the committee on credentials had not passed on a single one of the contested seats.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 8.—At 11:45 a. m. the convention was called to order. Committee on credentials has not yet passed on a single contested delegation. Chairman of committee on platform says they will not report until late tonight. The weather is fine.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 8, 12:15 p. m.—The chairman of committee on permanent organization reported as permanent chairman McKinley. Great cheering. McKinley took the platform. McKinley was made permanent chairman.

McKinley in his speech said: "This is a Republican year, Rhode Island has spoken and only yesterday Oregon spoke, electing two Republicans to congress. When we get through this convention, its conclusions will be law for Republican action and assurance of Republican victory. We are for a protective tariff and reciprocity." The speaker continued at some length in eulogy of the protective tariff and rebuke of tariff reform as exemplified in the efforts in that direction by the Democratic party and was loudly and frequently applauded.

Convention Has Adjourned.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 8, 12:50 p. m.—Adjourned till 11 o'clock a. m. tomorrow.

Congress Yesterday.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The agricultural appropriation bill was reported to the house by Hatch, of Missouri, and placed upon the calendar. Several important private bills were then passed by unanimous consent, after which the house went into committee of the whole upon the urgent deficiency bill, which appropriates \$7,674,332 for the payment of pensions and \$14,000 for miscellaneous house expenses. After an explanation by Sayers and a statement by Dingley that while there appeared a deficiency of about \$7,500,000 of pensions, there was an unexpended balance of \$8,000,000, the committee rose and the bill passed, after which the house adjourned.

IN THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—After notice by Peffer that Monday next he would address the senate on the bill introduced by him to increase the currency, the senate proceeded to consider the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill amendments recommended by the committee on

FROM MINNEAPOLIS.

Both Sides Confident, No Change in the Situation.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 8.—No significant change in the situation this morning. Both sides are apparently confident. Alger is still in the field, and half a dozen other candidates are mentioned as a compromise. Harrison people claim to have made gains the past twenty four hours, especially in New York, where they claim twenty-nine votes on the first ballot. The best information obtainable, shows that the Blaine and Harrison forces are almost equal in strength, but the Blaine people have the advantage of organization, both in convention and committee. McKinley's selection as permanent chairman, has added to his boom, and there is a movement "to some quarters to spring his name as the dark horse, if found advisable. Rusk, Sherman, Allison, and others are mentioned as possible candidates. A committee of Associated Traders of New York have arrived, to press the re-nomination of Harrison, claiming he is the originator of the bi-metallic conference, and the only Republican who will be supported by Eastern merchants or bankers, or the farmers, working classes and free silver men of the southwest. The committee represents eleven trade and labor unions of New York, and claim the workmen through the state favor Harrison.

It is said the committee on credentials will not report before tomorrow, and the ballot is not likely till Friday.

Blaine managers do not under the moral effect of Harrison gain in New York where it is said 29 delegates have signed an agreement for Harrison, but declare that until last night Blaine forces were unorganized now they propose under the leadership of Warner Miller, Boutelle and Foraker to conduct a systematic canvass of delegates. The Harrison managers say the Blaine forces are evidently working for delay, knowing if a ballot was taken now they would be defeated by over a hundred votes. Harrison men, after a reasonable time propose to push for action, they declare that Blaine is practically abandoned by the opposition who are skirmishing for candidates, Michener, of Indiana claims, 521 tied votes for Harrison which includes only 20 from New York.
