A CLOSE VOTE.

Cook For Treasurer and Hubbard Judge.

TAKES OFFICIAL VOTE TO DECIDE.

Prohi's Have About 250 Votes

And the People's Party About 500.

The total vote of the county will be 5000, which is an increase over 300 in 1890.

It is very probable, however, that Cook is elected treasurer and Hubbard judge.

Webster's majority over Chamberlain in the county will be about 200. It is 213 in twenty-seven precincts, but among the ones unreported are several that give Democratic majorities.

Moore's majority over Bennett will be 500, which is probably about the size of the Republican majority in the county.

In thirty-two precincts—all except Fairfield, St. Paul, Silver Falls and Stayton—Brown's majority is 38. According to estimates from these precincts Cook is elected by a small majority. Cook ran behind Harding in Fairfield and St. Paul and Stayton being Brown's home precinct it is a matter of extreme difficulty to make any estimates of the vote.

In thirty-three precincts—all except Fairfield, Silver Creek and Stayton—Hubbard's majority is thirty-three. One report says Harding has carried Fairfield by thirty and another says he has carried it by twenty-six. It is estimated Harding has Stayton by ten and Hubbard Silver Creek by fifteen. This would elect Hubbard by a majority of eight. But it is certain it will require the official ballot to settle the matter.

The prohibition vote in the county will be about 250. It was 217 in the first twenty-two precincts to report. The People's party polled 338 votes in the same precincts and will have 500 in the county.
