REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.
 Protection Strongly Endorsed In

THE PLATFORM.
 Completed by the Committee on Resolutions.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 9.—The following is the substance of the platform as completed by the committee on resolutions: The representatives of the Republicans of the United States, assembled in general convention on the shore of the Mississippi river, the everlasting bond of an industrial republic whose most glorious history is the record of the Republican party, congratulate their countrymen on the majestic growth of the nation under the banners inscribed with the principles of the platform of 1888, vindicated victory at the polls and prosperity in the fields, workshops, and mines, and make the following declaration of principles: We reaffirm the American doctrine of protection; we call attention to its growth abroad, and we maintain that the prosperous condition of the country is largely due to the wise revenue legislation of the republican congress; we believe that articles which cannot be produced in the United States, except luxuries, should be admitted free of duty, and on all imports coming into competition with the products of American labor there should be levied duties equal to the difference between wages abroad and at home.

We assert that the prices of manufactured articles of general consumption have been reduced under the operations of the tariff act of 1890. We denounce the efforts of the Democratic majority of the house of representatives to destroy our tariff laws by piecemeal, as is manifested by attacks upon wool and lead ores, the chief product of a number of states, and we ask the people for their judgment thereon. We point to the success of the Republican policy of reciprocity under which our export trade has vastly increased and new and enlarged markets found for the products of our farms and workshops. We remind people of the bitter opposition of the Democratic party to this practical business measure, and claim that if executed by a Republican administration our present laws will eventually give us control of the trade of the world.

The American people, from tradition and interest, favor a bimetallic currency, and the Republican party demand the use of both gold and silver as standard money, with such restrictions and under such provisions to be determined by legislation as to secure the maintenance of the purity of the two metals, so that the purchasing and debt-paying power of the dollar, whether silver or gold shall at all times be equal. In the interest of the producers of the country, its farmers and workmen, we demand that every dollar of paper or coin issued by the government shall be as good as any other. We commend the wise and patriotic steps already taken by our government to secure an international conference to adopt such measures as will insure the parity value between gold and silver for use as money throughout the world.

The demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot in all public elections, and that such ballot be counted and returned as cast; that such laws be enacted and enforced as will secure to every citizen, be he rich or poor, native or foreign born, white or black, this sovereign right guaranteed by the constitution. The free and honest popular ballot, just and equal representation of all people, as well as their just and equal protection under the laws, are the foundation of our constitution, and the Republican party will never relent in its efforts until the integrity of the ballot and the purity of elections shall be fully guarded and protected in every part of the country.

We denounce the continued inhumanities perpetrated upon American citizens for political reasons in certain Southern states of the Union.

We favor the extension of our foreign commerce, the restoration of our mercantile marine by home-built ships and the creation of a navy for the protection of our national interests and the honor of our flag; the maintenance of the friendly relations with all foreign powers, but entangling alliances with none, and the protection of the rights of
