The German Empire.

The case of the Grand Duke of
Hesse and his brother potentates
forms one of the most interesting
phases in the German situation of
today, and one must know some-
thing about it in order to understand
the current of German affairs. Ger-
many, as well as the United States,
has a dual system of government,
though hers is in other respects very
unlike ours. There the big state of
Prussia has three-fifths the area of the
whole, and in round numbers about
thirty millions out of fifty million
population.

Her king is at the same time Ger-
man emperor. Consequently Prus-
sia is the cock of the walk in Ger-
many, and behind her come tagging
along with a more or less degree of
dignity some twenty-five states, of
which three are kingdoms, ranging
in importance from Bavaria, which
has the population of Belgium or
Holland and the area of both, whose
capital, Munich, is one of the finest
cities in Europe, down to the prin-
cipality of Schaumburg-Lippe, which
an active Kaeskaian could come
very near jumping across.—Louis-
ville Courier-Journal.

The Grave of Penn's Surveyor.

In a little clump of woods just off
the line and to the eastward of the
Burlington branch of the Pennsylvania
railroad, one mile from the village of
Holmesburg, lies the body of Thomas
Holmes, the man who, as surveyor
general for William Penn, laid out the
city of Philadelphia. The little cem-
tery in which the body of Holmes lies
is so isolated and so unfrequented
that a stranger could not well find it
without the aid of a guide. In it,
besides the body of the great sur-
veyor, there are a hundred or more
graves of those of his descendants.

In the center of this acre and a half
devoted by the Holmes family to the
burial of their dead stands a little
white marble monument, erected by
private subscription in 1863. The in-
scription on this monument reads:
"In memory of Thomas Holmes, died
1695, aged seventy-one years. Sur-
veyor general of William Penn. He
drafted the plan and laid out the
city of Philadelphia."—Philadelphia
Record.

Lightning Doesn't Strike Indians.

In the course of his New Haven
lecture Rev. Thomas S. Dana, an
educated Indian, made this singular
statement: "The Indians never cook
anything in the house. They always
cook outside, giving as their only rea-
son that if they cook inside the steam
will collect in their clothing and
draw the lightning. Whether this is
truth or not I do not know, but I do
know this: No Indian wigwam has
been struck by lightning since the
dawn of history, and no Indian has
been killed by lightning for more
than 100 years."

THE FORD KILLING.

Hill is Still in the Field—Mis-
cellaneous News.

WHY FORD WAS KILLED.

Had Murdered His Slayer's Father
and Brother.

JAMESTOWN, Colo., June 11.—That
Bob Ford was killed to avenge some
wrong deed, there seems to be no
doubt. Edward A. Kelley, his
slayer, came from Harrisonville,
Cass county, Missouri. A couple of
years before his death, when James
James and Bob Ford were partners
in crime, they went together to Kel-
ley's homestead to rob the family.
They killed the old man and one of
his sons. They pulled out Mrs. Kel-
ley's toenails in an effort to make
her tell where her money was hid,
but, as near as can be learned, were
not successful. It is said that Ed-
ward Kelley swore to avenge the
death of his father and brother, and
the outrageous treatment of his
mother. This is believed to be the
true motive of the killing yesterday
by all those who knew both men in
Missouri. At midnight last night,
a man called "French Joe," was ar-
rested as an accomplice in the murder
of Ford. He has been identified
as the man who rode up on horse-
back and handed Kelley the shot-
gun. Ford will be buried in Creede.

No Peace for the Irish.

NEW YORK, June 11.—The Federa-
tion of America has for some time
been corresponding with the leaders
of the National party of Ireland,
with a view of securing united ac-
tion between the two factions at the
general election. The proposition
not to contest seats where the con-
stituency was Parnellite was dis-
cussed by the executive board of the
Federation of America, and for-
warded to McCarthy for considera-
tion of his party. The outcome of
the correspondence is shown in the
following dispatch from Dillon to
Redmond: "The proposed terms
are impossible, and not honestly
meant. The constituencies would
revolt. We have gone as far for
peace as the country will stand.
The country now must decide at the
polls."

He Sold His Wife.

PALMER, Mass., June 11.—The
proprietor of the Nassawanne house
has caused the arrest of H. O.
Daniels, who said he was a cousin of
one of the waitresses, Mrs. Snyder.
There was a Mr. Snyder in the
house, claiming to be her husband,
who gave information against
Daniels. Daniels was angry, and
said that the waitress was not Mrs.
Snyder, but Mrs. Daniels. Five
months ago the trio were at a hotel
in Sherbourne, Mass., and one night
Daniels saw Snyder coming out of
his wife's bedroom. Thinking that
she preferred Snyder's company to
his own, he told Snyder that if he
would give \$150 in cash, and a note
for \$500 to be paid in four years and
nine months, he might have his
wife. To this Snyder agreed, and
papers were drawn up to that effect
and dated February 9, 1892. Snyder
and Mrs. Snyder have been arrested.
The woman was released, as she was
in delicate health.

Attempted to Murder His Wife.

WACO, Tex., June 11.—Mrs. Peter
MacClelland has filed a bill for di-
vorce, in which she charges her
husband, Peter MacClelland, with
seeking to procure her death by
poison and soliciting a woman to aid
him in his designs. She made the
further charge of his seeking to
cause her death by placing a loaded
shotgun, full-cocked, near her head,
signaling, apparently, to have it go
off and accidentally shoot her. Mr.
MacClelland is the largest real estate
owner in Waco. He has left the city.

Hill Still a Candidate.

TROY, N. Y., June 11.—An after-
noon paper prints an interview with
Hon. Edward Murphy, who declares
there is no truth whatever in the
published statement that David B.
Hill has written him a letter autho-
rizing the withdrawal of Hill's name
as a candidate for the presidency.
