The system not only develops the children rightly, but helps the parents as well. There should be no finish to our educations. Mrs. Treat's remarks were of a general character, as she is going into the details of work in her afternoon class meetings. She speaks at the Yew Park school at 2 p. m. Monday, at the W. C. T. U. rooms Tuesday at 2 p. m. The regular class meeting will be at the Congregational church Sunday at 4 p. m. and each day next week. Mrs. Treat has also consented to speak at the rose fair this evening.

STREET RAILWAY WAR.

The Electric Begin Work—Injunction Issued by Judge Boise.

Considerable interest was awakened yesterday when City Surveyor Culver began work surveying the route for the electric line to run up State street. This was considerably intensified when this morning it was discovered that a crew of 25 men was at work throwing dirt on this new extension near the state house. Reports were rife that the work would be stopped with injunction proceedings from the horse car company, and immediately after dinner Deputy Sheriff Wahl served the papers on President Simpson, of the electric company, and on City Recorder Goodell.

The horse car folks claim this extension is an infringement of their rights, that it wrongfully destroys their property, and that the electric people have not sufficient authority to build, as there was no ordinance passed, but simply a permit. Their officials propose to fight the case to the bitter end.

At 2 o'clock President Simpson gave orders for the men to quit work, and now the case will have to be settled either by the council or in the courts.
