ASYLUM FIGURES.

The monthly report of Dr. L. L. Rowland, superintendent of the state insane asylum, for May, was received yesterday by the state board and the following summary is copied from it: Number of patients, April 30th—males, 521, females, 237; total, 758. Number received during May—males, 25, females, 5; total, 30. Number returned escapes—males, 5; total, 5. Number under care and treatment—males, 551; females, 242; total, 793. Number discharged, recovered—males, 8; females, 1; total, 9. Number discharged, much improved—males, 1; females, 2; total, 3. Number discharged improved—females, 1; total, 1. Number discharged, unimproved—males, 3; females, 1; total, 4. Four males died and six elapsed. The number of discharged, died and elapsed is: Males, 22; females, 5; total, 27. Number of patients remaining May 31st—Males, 529; females, 237; total, 766. Average number daily, 758 18-31. Number of officers, 94. Average monthly and daily expenses of the institution was per capita monthly, \$11.03 9-10; per capita daily, \$0.35 6-10.

One school in Chicago, requires every teacher in its faculty to take at least one year in Kindergarten training. Froebel did not claim to originate any new thing but gathering the best thoughts of former educators, and by a patient observation of the best people he arranged his system for developing child life.
