THE GOSSEON.—The scenery of Carroll Johnson's romantic Irish play, "The Gosseon," which appears here tonight is declared by the critics to be far out rival anything of its kind ever attempted in the Irish drama. It is a matchless scenic masterpiece. Its mounting is said to be magnificent. The first act shows the lakes of Killarney in summer time, with the silvery water flashing in the sunlight, the roses in bloom, and the purple mists enshrouding the green hills like a large fairy crown. The same scene in mid winter is shown in the third act. The white mantle of silence envelops the country, and the sunset effects are beautiful. Killarney by moonlight is another beautiful scene, with the silver stars twinkling overhead and the aroma of the sleeping flowers seems to fill the atmosphere of the theatre. The second act is a marvel of scenic beauty. On the stage is represented an exact facsimile of the world-famous Ross Castle at Killarney, with its ruined turrets, portals, arches and cornices. The ivy and the moss fondly cling to it as does the memories of its long departed glory. The scene is a moonlit one, and the soft flood of silver light make visible the lakes in the distant background, and the cascade of real water tumbling over the cliffs and gently gliding away under the old ruined bridge. The scene is a beautiful one, and it has that delightful and dreamy haze of enchantment that always characterizes romantic surroundings. The unruffled of the cabin in act three is said to be one of the most soul-stirring effects ever presented on the stage.

The Business Meeting—Elocutionary and Academy Exercises.

Tuesday, at 9 a. m. the board of trustees met. The usual business was transacted, and the work was not finished until late in the evening. The financial status is very good, and the deficit for the year not so large as was feared.

Dr. L. L. Rowland, M. E. Miller and John Albert were elected trustees for three years. General W. H. Odell was elected president of the board; F. R. Smith, vice president; A. N. Bush, treasurer, and W. T. Chapman, secretary.

In the afternoon at 3 p. m. the elocutionary contest was held for the prize, offered by F. S. Dearborn, the bookseller. The introduction was Beethoven's "Overture Egmont," by Misses Krebs, Hubbard, Bushnell, and Mrs. W. H. Bagley.

The invocation was by Dr. N. Daane, of Portland.

Misses Hepburn, Frizzell and New-some sang a touching solo, "Where Shall We Find Our Home."

Miss Bushnell executed a piano solo, and Miss Lulu Sargeant sang "Thou My Life and My Delight." Miss Edith F. Frizzell recited "The Return of the Witches," Floyd Fell, "Author of Nature," Miss Z. Cook Wantzall, "King Robert of Sicily," John W. Reynolds, "Daniel O'Connell," Miss Ollie J. Rounds, "The Boat Race," John H. Whitaker, "Darius Green and His Flying Machine." We have refrained from commenting on them individually, nevertheless we consider that each exhibited much earnestness, talent, training and desire to develop the thought contained in the selection to its fullest extent. Their efforts reflect honor on them and their instructor.

Dr. W. P. George, of Seattle, Rev. Robt. Whitaker and Mrs. C. E. Pentland, were appointed judges, and the lady and gentleman who receive the prize, will be announced Thursday, at commencement.

The societies cleared about \$50, for which they thank the kindness and liberality of the generous people who interested themselves in their welfare.

GRADUATING EXERCISES.

Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock the graduating exercises of the University academy began. The class consisted of six members and the motto was "Out of the Bay into the Ocean." The University conferred on graduates from the teachers' course the degree of Bachelor of Scientific Didactics (B. S. D.) for the first time, being the same degree conferred by the state of Oregon for a similar course in the Normal schools. The overture, "Zampa," (Herold) was rendered by Misses Ingersoll, Beamer, Sargeant and Mrs. Sharp. Prayer was offered by Rev. S. P. Wilson. The quartet, "O Restless Sea," by Misses Beamer and Harris and Messrs. Parvin and Austin was beautiful vocal music. Miss Myrtle Benedict, B. S. D., chose for her subject, "Advantage of a Course of Study for Common Schools." Such a course throughout the state would assist in making the work more effective. There should be primary, intermediate and grammar grades, each of three years. The advantages to the pupil, the teacher, the school and the community were then discussed. The essay was systematic and thoughtful. Auren A. Stafford, (classical) delivered an oration on "The Will." The will is a distinguishing characteristic in man. Right or wrong are determined by the conscience but deeds are the results of will power. The human mind is immature and a determining force. The oration evidenced sound consideration. The violin solo by Miss Krebs was executed as finely as usual.

Mr. J. H. Robnett (business) spoke an oration on "Special Training." The question is how to use the power we attain. Our fitness for a position is a surety that the position awaits us. The world needs specially trained men, and those unemployed are largely unskilled. Special training should be taken after a college course. The oration was carefully prepared.

Miss Hattie Gunn, B. S. D., recited an essay on "We Launch Our Boats, Where Will They Land?" A nice illustration opened the essay. Do well the duties of today even if small and the great things will come in due season. Those who desire a life useful in benefiting mankind are truly noble. The rudder to our ship is "The Right." The essay was very good. Miss Mabel Adair sang a delightful solo, "The Nymphs Polka Song." Miss Anna Alderson,

B. S. D., chose as her subject "Progress." Progress is an universal desire though often sought by incorrect methods every advanced step makes another necessary. The more thorough our education, the more learning and training we desire. The essay was very excellent and nicely illustrated. The last speaker M. S. Wilson, B. S. D., spoke an oration on "Concentration of Forces of Character." Thinking to a special end develops depth and width. Never enter upon a profession unless you have a special inspiration. A good character makes a man useful and active in aiding melioration of mankind. The oration was evidence of much thinking on the subject.

The class was presented to the president by Rev. J. N. Dennison of Portland. The roll was called by the secretary of the faculty, Prof. S. A. Starr, and the graduates were awarded their diplomas. Dr. Whitaker delivered a short and instructive charge to the class.

The solo "Requiesce D'Auvergne" was executed nicely on the piano. Benediction by Dr. W. S. Harrington.

The trustees met at 8 a. m., Wednesday to continue their work.
