### EQUAL JUSTICE TO ALL.

The Business Men of Salem Organize for Their Own Protection Against Dishonest Debtors.

That "union is strength" is a demonstrated fact, as shown by the union of capital and confederation of trades. Statistics show us that more than 90 per cent. of the country works on the credit system. Statistics also show us that 90 per cent. of the business ventures result in failure, and it is probably equally true that 90 per cent. of such failures result from bad debts.

The actual cost of production and transportation may be learned, and the possible sales can be ascertained, but the question which confronts the merchant is, "will the custom pay?"

No wise merchant can afford to take the chance of the man's paying him when, to his knowledge, he has not paid other merchants. The credit business throws certain risks onto his shoulders anyway, such as are out of work—or the sickness or death of his credit customers. In work, in health and in life, these would pay. But, with no employment, if they had been fair customers, the merchant must carry them—likewise in sickness; while if death overtakes a debtor, he leaves no assets, and they must charge the account up to profit and loss. This is risk enough to carry without attempting to carry those who have the reputation of not paying. Many men, naturally honest, grow into confirmed "dead-beats" though an indiscriminate business. The merchant trusts on and on so as to evade the risk of offending what may be a good customer or of driving trade to his rivals until the load grows so heavy that he can no longer carry it.

That the merchant may continue to do business the cash customer must take up the loss, therefore heightening the price of living and imposing burdens upon those who are honest and pay their debts.

It is for this reason that the merchants of Marion county have organized and become members of the Merchants' Retail Commercial Agency of Chicago. This agency extends almost entirely over the United States and Canada, and if the "dead-beat" owes a bill on the shores of the Atlantic, that bill, if a just and honest one, must be settled before our merchants can or will give him a dollar's credit, and he who owes us can find no new fields by leaving us, for over 150,000 merchants east of the Rocky mountains have agreed with every member west of them that the man who owes a bill here must pay before he can obtain credit in their states.

The same law governs every member of the organization, and that is the law of justice—that he who has been accommodated and helped when he needed help and does not appreciate such help enough to pay an honest bill for which he has had value received, is unworthy of any credit or indulgence by other business men.

Since the Salem branch has been organized there have been the most gratifying results to its members. Accounts contracted years ago and given up for lost, which could have been bought for one cent on the dollar, have been promptly paid in full; not through the execution of any one man, but simply by all business men adopting the same rule all over the United States—that the debtor must pay his honest bills or pay spot cash for what he buys in the future.

The methods of this agency are built on a rock and a foundation of right and justice, not only to the merchant, but to the debtor as well. The object of the association is for the protection of all and the oppression of none.

That objectionable feature of what is termed as black-listing a poor but honest man is eliminated from the methods employed by this agency, for if a man disputes a bill or shows a willingness to do right in regard to his account, he has the right, and is requested to appear before our executive board, and this body is bound to act with fairness and impartiality.

The officers of this board are: President, James Aitken; vice-president, Jos. Myers; secretary, Lot E. Pearce; treasurer, Geo. E. Good; executive board, G. B. Gray, W. L. Wade, E. C. Cross, I. L. Patterson and Wm. Brown.

Moved and reorganized that the above be published in the daily papers of this city. Motion carried unanimously.

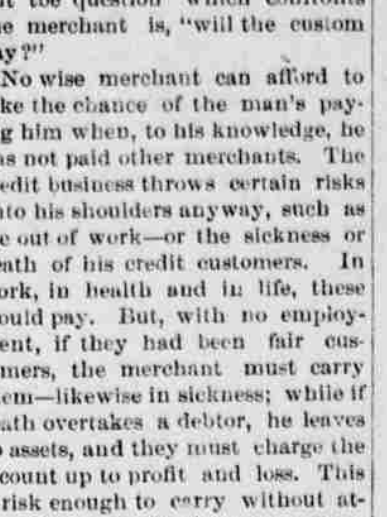
