TWO MORE PARDONS.—Governor Penney yesterday pardoned John C. Barnes, who was sentenced to the state prison on February 25, 1885, to serve a term of twenty years for the crime of rape. Barnes was committed from Multnomah county and his sentence was commuted upon the recommendation of fifty signers to a petition for his release. Barnes committed rape upon the person of his 10 or 11-year old half sister. The other commutation was granted to Reuben L. Gilchrist, sentenced from Grant county on May 21, 1891, to serve a term of two and a half years for the crime of arson. Gilchrist's pardon was recommended by the district attorney, as was also J. C. Barnes' pardon.

HARRISON INSTITUTE.

Commencement Exercises—Large Number of Visitors Present.

The number of visitors yesterday at the commencement at the Institute was larger than was expected. Flowers and evergreens tastefully intermingled, gave the platform a cheerful appearance. Over the entrance hung the class motto: "Reach Up as far as You Can; God Will Reach Down the Rest of the Way."

Rev. G. M. Irwin opened the exercises by prayer and an address to the graduating class. He was followed by the graduates, who were: Oliver Lindsey, of Idaho; Agnes Whitley, Martha Washburn, Josephine Allard, of the Sound; Robert Wilson, Warm Springs reservation; Joseph Adams, of Siletz; James Flannery, of Alaska; Frank Lowery, of Rogue river; William Miller, of California; Adda Irwin, of Salem. The essays and recitations of the graduates were of a high order. One of the nicest features of the afternoon's entertainment was the extraordinarily good instrumental and vocal music rendered by the students. Another thing of interest was the class drill by the little girls of the school.

After the last number of the afternoon programme had been rendered the visitors were invited into the school building, where industrial exhibits of all kinds and of superior merit were to be seen. The work was done by the students and there was everything from the finest of embroideries and crochet work to large well-built farm wagons and buggies.

The art exhibit consisted of some excellent blackboard work of penmanship and freehand drawing. In another place was exhibited clothing made by boys and girls. One boy of 16 had made a pair of trousers which would compare with any.

There were shoes also which were made by the pupils and were not lacking in quality or finish. J. Staiger, the head shoemaker, has offered a prize for the best work, and the awards will be made as soon as possible.

A Washington boy had on exhibition a model of the boys' gymnasium which it is proposed to build. The appropriation for that purpose has been cut down to about \$500.

Two young ladies, noted for their cooking, exhibited several cakes that would do credit to any pastry maker. Several sets of especially good harness were for inspection. There was an exhibit of linens of excellent workmanship which had been made in the school. Numerous other pieces of work showed that all repairs needed on the immense farm could be made by the students. Wagons, buggies and plows are all made there and they will compare favorably with those made elsewhere.

There are some very creditable work by the little folks, such as map work and kindergarten exhibits.

THE EVENING EXERCISES.—The programme rendered in the evening consisted of a number of selections of instrumental and vocal music. All of the numbers were excellent and so was the rendition of each, and it is to be regretted that many were compelled to leave before "Good Night" had been reached. The acreage of cultivated ground has been increased this year to double the amount heretofore and everything else has been advanced in proportion. Many improvements will be made from time to time as opportunity and money warrant. The superintendent is very courteous to visitors and will show them about the school any day in the week when

the shops are open and the school rooms are filled. The number of students is 260 this year.
