TURNER TABERNACLE.

Opening Last Evening, Dedication Sunday.

The great Tabernacle erected at Turner by George Turner and sister, to the memory of their parents, was opened last evening. It will accommodate about 4000 people. It is 100 x 150 feet with a rostrum of 16x40 feet.

THE PRESENT MEETINGS.

The convention for 1892 was opened last evening at 7.30 with song service, and at 8 o'clock there was a sermon by Rev. W. R. Williams, pastor of the Christian church of Salem.

10 a. m.—Bible reading. "What must I do to become a Christian?"

11 a. m.—Sermon.

2.30 p. m.—Devotional, led by L. F. Stephens, Portland.

3 p. m.—Sermon.

7.30 p. m.—Devotional, led by H. A. Johnson, Salem.

8 p. m.—Sermon.

On tomorrow (Saturday) there will be services at the same hours.

On Sunday there will be a big Sunday school at 9 in the morning, led by C. A. Schibred, of Roseburg. There has been much preparation for this.

Rev. David Wetzel, of Portland, president of the state board, will preach the sermon dedicating the tabernacle at 11 o'clock on Sunday. It is expected there will be 4000 to 5000 people, or more, on the grounds on that day.
