

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

Milwaukee Murderer Captured—Other News.

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An Express Train Ran into Another at Pittsburg.

PITTSBURG, June 25.—The most disastrous wreck that ever occurred in Pittsburg took place this morning at 12:30, at dock street.

The first section of the train was stopped at the Dock-street tower for water, and when it was about to start the second section crashed into it, wrecking five cars and the locomotive of the second section.

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Operator at Steelton tower is said to be responsible for the collision it being alleged that he permitted the second section to enter the block before the first had cleared.
